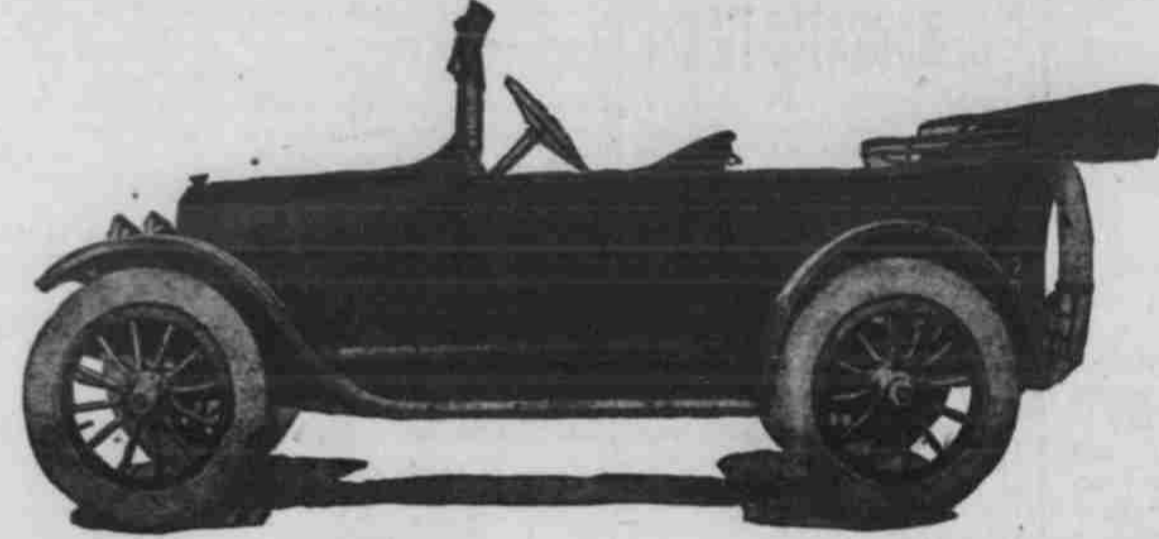
#### First White Child Here.

S. T. Phillips, the first white child born in Umatilla county, is in Pendleton today attending the annual teachers' institute and incidentally talking politics. He lives on a farm east of Weston and proposes to die in the county in which he was born. It was in 1852 that he saw the light of day at a point now known as Carnegie station. His parents were just concluding a long overland trip across the plains. A few days after his birth they continued on to the Willamette valley and settled in Lane county. In 1857, Umatilla county's first white child, now a boy of 15, came back to the land of his birth and has ever since been a resident of this county. Mr. Phillips was here to attend the Round-up and Happy Canyon and was a special guest at each show.

#### Smith Thompson Ranch Sold.

#### After Cavalry Horses.

As a result of the activities of agents of the English, German and French governments, horses between the weights of 900 and 1150 are becoming scarce in Umatilla county as well as in other sections of the United States. Horse fit for cavalry are in big demand and good prices are being paid, from \$75 to \$100 being offered. As a result nearly all of the horse raisers have unloaded. A German agent here today authorized Tracey Layne and Lee Caldwell to buy 200 cavalry horses and they are now on the lookout for them but are finding it hard to locate any.
