Top hogs easily commanded \$7 in the local yards at the opening of the day's trade. Some rather good stuff came forward and these were quickly picked up by buyers.

Greece Arouses Italians.
ROME, Oct. 30.—The report that Greece has landed 1200 soldiers at Santi Quaranta, thus taking possession of the southern part of Albania, which gives it entire control of the Corfu Channel, is causing a profound impression in Rome. As this step on the part of Greece was strongly opposed by the London conference, it is generally believed in Italian political circles that Greece will not be supported by Great Britain and France.

Paris, Oct. 30.—A dispatch from Athens to the Hays Agency says the toward march of the Greek troops, who are going to assist in the occupation of Southern Albania, proceeded in perfect order, but with great enthusiasm of the people.

One hundred men have been at work on the Sutherland and Coos Bay railroad and have five miles completed.

WAR CAUSES WHEAT RISE
Chicago Market Closes 2 3-8c Up for Day; Report of Spring Crop Sales Bullish Feature.

CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—Wheat closed 2 3-8c up. There was a run of buying at the outset. There was hedging of elevator people and general selling by pit leaders and brokerage firms for leaders who were doubtful of the advance. After a reaction of 3-4c to 1c from the best prices of the morning, a second strong swell carried quotations up to \$1.16 3-8 and \$1.22 1-4. The action of Turkey in beginning hostilities against Russia, which means the experts say, a permanent closing of the Dardanelles. Reports from the northwest that leaders there are claiming 69 per cent of the spring crop off the Liverpool cable and crop off the farms was the feature back of the excited buying.
At the best prices of session corn futures were 1c over the close of the strong rally. Firm and higher cable and the large export sales confirmed after the close Thursday seemed to more than offset the very fine map in all quarters for handling new corn.
No great swing was noted in the oats trade. Prices at the best point were about 3-4c over the close yesterday, December a shade under 49 3-4c, and May split over 53 1-8c at the best point.

If elected as representative I will refrain from introducing many bills but will pay particular attention to those offered by other members with a view of eliminating as many as possible of the useless laws which are annually added to the statute books."
