Got 19 Geese.

Rep. N. J. Sinnott Here.

En route from Washington on a rush trip home for a brief campaign tour, Congressman N. J. Sinnott reached here yesterday morning and left today for The Dalles. He made stops in Baker and La Grande also.

Are Bound Over.

Mike Lingren, charged with burglary not in a dwelling, has been bound over to the grand jury under \$200 and Gus Carlson, charged with robbery, has been bound over under \$500 bonds. These two men were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Hiram Shreckhise of Huron and it is charged that they robbed the tents of laboring men at that place.

Looking for Robbers.

Sheriff Taylor has been notified to keep his eye open for two men who robbed a work camp at Towal on the North Bank road several nights ago, getting away with \$160 in money and some clothing after they had bound and gagged all of the members of the camp and had seriously wounded the foreman. The two men had been fed at the camp during the day and had returned at night to rob their benefactors.

"Board Jumper" Back.

This afternoon E. J. Crawford, charged with defrauding a hotel keeper, is before Justice of the Peace Parkes for a hearing. The complaining witnesses are Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Copeland who conduct a boarding house here. K. H. Menke who was wanted on the same charge, settled up his account and was not held. Both men were arrested at La Grande and Crawford was brought back by Deputy Sheriff Estes.

Election Night Report.

As usual at election time, the East Oregonian will flash election returns on the street tomorrow night until midnight or later. Complete returns will be secured through the Western Union and from the East Oregonian correspondents over Umatilla county. The fastest news available will be secured and the service will be free from bias regarding any of the contest. The wet and dry vote will be secured along with news of the important contests for office. The public is invited to watch the returns as flashed on the screen on the Masonic building.

Student Assembly Held.

This morning the first monthly student body meeting as provided for under the new amendment to the high school constitution took place in the auditorium. The coming game with Walla Walla next Friday was the chief subject under discussion, and Professor Gambee of the agricultural department gave an enthusiastic speech on school spirit in which he stated that before he came to Pendleton he had heard that Pendleton high was noted throughout the state of Oregon as the most loyal, enthusiastically supported school in the state. Tickets for the Walla Walla game were distributed among the students for sale, and the first lycium attraction of the season was announced for Thursday night at the high school auditorium.

To Play for Championship.

Umatilla county has been divided into two sections, the west section, and the east section for the purpose of deciding the county high school championship in basket ball, the teams from which towns will compete among themselves for the championship of their section. The east section consists of Ferndale, Milton, Vincent and Weston, and they will

likewise compete within their section for the championship of the east part of the county. The winners of the sections will then play two games to decide the winners of the combined east and west sections and the winners of these combined sections will then compete with Pendleton high school in two consecutive games for the championship of Umatilla county. E. W. Hamman of Echo arranged the schedule for the west section and S. J. Neterer of Freewater arranged the schedule for the east section.

Services over the body of Jacob Hobbs, who died Saturday after a brief illness, were held yesterday morning at 10 o'clock at the Folsom chapel and later the body was taken to Portland for interment there today. A large number of friends of the deceased were present at the funeral.

Hallowe'en Hoodlums Do Damage.

Taking advantage of the spirit of Hallowe'en, some hoodlums Saturday evening made excursions about the city, leaving damage in their wake. At the residence of C. H. Rosenberg the fence was almost entirely destroyed and other similar work has been reported. If the offenders are caught they will be prosecuted. For the most part the youngsters of the city indulged in harmless pranks.

W. C. T. U. Corrects Error.

At a meeting of the ladies of the local W. C. T. U. this afternoon, action was taken to correct an impression which they claim has been given out regarding their officers. The officers of the county organization as vouched for at the meeting are Mrs. J. C. Woodworth, president, and Mrs. G. W. Rugg secretary, and of the Pendleton organization, Mrs. S. A. Lowell, president, Mrs. G. W. Rugg vice-president and Mrs. J. H. Raley secretary.

Identified Wrong Woman.

Although Saturday afternoon they identified Florence Seary positively as the woman who had sold them liquor, J. Curtright and I. H. Krancher this morning just as positively denied she was the woman. Accordingly the complaints charging Mrs. Seary with selling liquor without a license and keeping a bawdy house were dismissed and later similar complaints were filed against Gladys Kent, another colored lodging house keeper.

Want Guardian Appointed.

Judge James A. Fee, who has been acting as attorney for Rudolph Sheel, reservation farmer who was committed to the asylum last week, has asked the county court to appoint a guardian for the demented man inasmuch as he has valuable property. Judge Maloney has set November 12 as the date for a hearing. Sheel has been farming the William Caldwell 320 acres on the reservation. Recently he won a judgment in the circuit court for \$2,462.40 but there is a motion entered for a new trial. The petition sets forth that the defendant in the suit tried to make a settlement with Sheel after the latter had been taken into custody. Sheel has no relatives in this county.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY INSTITUTE BEFORE CLOSE

PEACE POLICY OF PRESIDENT WILSON ENDORSED BY TEACHERS.

Endorsing the peace policy of President Wilson, recommending the passage of the measure re-establishing the Weston and Ashland normal schools, going on record as in favor of the prohibition amendment and opposing the \$1500 exemption bill and the measure to have the public service corporations pay taxes directly to the state, the teachers of Umatilla county at the close of their annual institute Saturday adopted res-

olutions which bear upon the election tomorrow.

The peace plan of President Wilson is characterized as one of the great educational movements of the age, and the licensed saloon is branded as chief among the agencies that oppose the best welfare of the youth. Both the tax measures referred to above are characterized as inimical to the upbuilding of the schools inasmuch as they decrease the community revenue.

State Superintendent J. A. Churchill is glowingly endorsed and recommended for unanimous support at the election and the work of County Superintendent I. E. Young is also heartily recommended. The full text of the resolutions will be published later.

UNSUCCESSFUL HE CHARGES IRREGULARITIES AT POLLS



John A. Hennessy, who was unsuccessful in his fight to be named as a candidate for the governorship of the state of New York, has come forward with a charge that Tammany district captains practiced irregularities at the polls. He says his watchers report that Tammany men sat at tables in polling places and handed sample ballots with crosses opposite the names of the Tammany candidates to voters. Hennessy holds this to be a violation of the election law which provides that no electioneering shall go on within 100 feet of polling places.

HOLY WAR MAY BE CALLED BY TURKISH RULER

BERLIN, Nov. 2, via The Hague.—The declaration by the Sultan of a "holy war" against British, French, Russians and some others may be expected immediately, the Turkish ambassador announced. Unofficial advices indicate the Arabs in Tripoli already are attacking the Italians.

BERLIN, Nov. 2, wireless via Sayville.—German successes in Belgium and France, Austrian victories in Galicia and a generally rallying of Mohammedans to the standard of the sultan, were reported in an official statement issued by the Kaiser's general staff this afternoon.

The battle in northern France was reported increasingly favorable from the German standpoint. The statement said: "Sunday reports show the French have been driven across the Aisne near Soissons. Letters from the front describe the conflict between Neuport and Ypres as the fiercest of the war. The losses on both sides have been extremely heavy."

"Exploits of the Turkish fleet in the Black sea, which bombarded Odesa and Sevastopol, destroying two Russian warships, 19 transports and several oil tankers, have created great enthusiasm."

CHICAGO STOCKYARDS ARE CLOSED; OTHERS TO FOLLOW

DISCOVERY OF FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE LEADS TO DRAMATIC ACTION.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—The United States bureau of animal industry ordered the Chicago stock yards closed today because of the discovery of new cases of foot and mouth disease. After tonight no cattle, sheep or hogs will be received or shipped to the local market until further notice. Later Dr. Ramsey, chief field inspection of the federal bureau of animal industry ordered closed all the stockyards in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and Michigan after 10 tonight. Exception was made regarding livestock en route to Chicago. This will be handled the same as heretofore. The stockyards of Omaha, Kansas

City, South St. Paul and other smaller western meat centers were not affected by the order.

Following the order the price of live hogs jumped 25 cents per hundred. The international live stock show scheduled here for December was abandoned as the result of the quarantine.

Dutch Buy Flour Heavily.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 29.—What is said by local railroad officials to be the largest consignment of flour to a single consignee, from an American port is being concentrated here for the Netherlands government. Already 144 carloads, shown on railroad way bills as 4,722,000 pounds, have arrived. An equal amount soon will be in transit, it is said. The flour was milled in Kansas and it is understood will be transported to Europe in vessels of the Holland-American line.
