CHAMBERLAIN REELECTED, WITHYCOMBE IS GOVERNOR, STATE DRY

TURKISH FORTS IN DARDANELLES ARE BEING BOMBARDED

Allied Fleet of France and England Continue to Pound Fortifications --Much Damage Reported.

ONE WAR VESSEL CRIPPLED

Athens Report Declares That Land Defenses are Being Manned by Germans--Japs and English said to Have Silenced Another Fort at Kiao Chau--Ship is Sunk.

ROME, Nov. 4.—The bombardment by the Anglo-French Mediterranean fleet of the fortifications of Turkey at the Dardanelles was reported still in progress. Great damage was reported as having been done to the forts by the big guns of the warships. One of the attacking warships was the German Kiao Chau line of defense shell and badly damaged.

DEFENSE FORT IS SILENCED. TOKIO, Nov. 4.—The ill-fort of the German Kiao Chau line of defense has been silenced by the Anglo-Japanese bombardment and the Kaiserine Elizabeth, one of the warships in Kiao Chau harbor, has been blown up.

RUSSIAN BATTLESHIP IS SUNK. LONDON, Nov. 4.—The Turkish Black sea fleet has sunk the Russian battleship Sinop, according to a news agency dispatch from Sofia. The report has not been officially confirmed.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 4.—The Germans have resumed the offensive in the field fighting in east Prussia. Another general battle is developing. "On the east Prussian front" said an announcement of the general staff, "the Kaiser's troops are on the aggressive everywhere. The Russians have advanced at several points, however."

BRITISH SUBMARINE SUNK. LONDON, Nov. 4.—The admiralty confirmed this afternoon the report that British submarine D-5 was sunk Tuesday by a mine dropped by German ships which were being pursued by the submarine and other British vessels.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 4.—An invasion of Turkey was officially announced today and seven villages were reported occupied with heavy Turkish losses.

ALLIES CUT OFF SURRENDER. PARIS, Nov. 4.—Cut-off from the main body and surrounded between Roye and Arras, 3500 allies were reported to have fought until their ammunition was exhausted when they surrendered to the Germans.

THE FIGHTING IN THE NORTH centered about Dixmude and Ypres and in the Roye district between Lille and Armentieres.

DESPERATE FIGHTING. PARIS, Nov. 4.—Desperate fighting between the five Lys and Arras was reported by the Bordeaux war office. No where has a decisive stage been reached, however.

BETWEEN LYS AND DIXMUDE the situation was reported unchanged.

BULGARIA NEAR WAR. BERLIN, Nov. 4.—Via the Hague.—The railroads connecting between Bulgaria and Serbia was reported cut. This was interpreted as meaning Bulgaria is about to engage in the war on the side of Germany and Austria.

GERMAN FLEET IN BALTIC. COPENHAGEN, Nov. 4.—German warships were reported in the Baltic off the entrance to the gulf of Finland. It is believed they were sent on a raid on the Russian coast.

BAKER WHEAT NEARS \$1. BAKER, Ore., Nov. 4.—Wheat prices just failed to reach the dollar mark in Baker, quotations advancing to 98 cents for bluestem and 40-fold wheat and 97 cents for club wheat. These are the highest prices recorded here in many years.

EARLY ADVANCED TO \$18 A TON and farmers who have large quantities of this cereal suddenly began unloading but the market was not weakened by the big local supply.

37 PRECINCTS IN UMATILLA COUNTY FAVOR WITHYCOMBE

Indications Are That Smith Has Lost to Republican Opponent by Narrow Margin.

DRYS RUN UP A MAJORITY

Henry J. Bean Receives Big Vote—Chamberlain's Lead Over Booth Up to This Time is Nearly 600—Smith is About 300 Behind Withycombe—Lead May Be Out.

Complete returns from 37 precincts and incomplete returns from eight others give as follows: Congressman—Cleaver, 1154; Evans, 926; Sinnott, 1949. Senator—Booth, 2260; Chamberlain, 2783. Governor—Smith, 2610; Withycombe, 2952. Joint Senator—Barrett, 2345; Scott, 2458. County Judge—Gilliland, 2566; Marsh, 2706. Sheriff—Mann, 2284; Taylor, 3307. Coroner—Brown, 2341; Wombaug, 2216. Commissioner—Cockburn, 2690; Hodgen, 2291. Prohibition—Yes 2897; No, 2209.

With the complete returns from 37 precincts and incomplete returns from eight others at hand, indications are strong that Dr. C. J. Smith, Democratic candidate for governor, has lost Umatilla county to Dr. James Withycombe by a very narrow margin and that Senator Chamberlain has given a handsome majority over R. A. Booth his republican opponent. Congressman Sinnott has been given a vote almost as large as the combined vote of his opponents.

Though Pendleton voted practically two to one wet, the dry vote throughout the county was sufficiently large to overcome the lead and give the prohibition amendment a majority. Indications early last evening pointed to a strong wet vote here in Pendleton and the returns also showed Smith falling behind. The returns today have not varied much from the original direction they took when the count was first begun.

Umatilla county gave her member of the supreme court, Henry J. Bean, a big vote and the three other republican candidates, Harris, Benson and McBride, are rolling up a majority in this county. Chamberlain's lead over Booth in this county so far as heard is nearly 600 votes while Smith is about 300 votes behind Withycombe. However, as there is a big vote yet to be received from the east end of the county, the republican candidate's lead will undoubtedly be cut down. Neither Hanley for senator or U'Ren for governor figured in the race at all in this county.

BRITISH DIVER IS SUNK BY GERMAN

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The British submarine D-5 was sunk in the North Sea early yesterday by a mine which was thrown out by a German cruiser retreating before British cruisers. Two officers and two men of the submarine were saved. This information is contained in an admiralty report issued here.

MARSH LEADS OVER GILLILAND BY 170 VOTES IN COUNTY

Race is Still Uncertain and May Be Changed When Further Returns Have Been Received.

BARRETT AND SCOTT CLOSE

Brown and Wombaug, for Coroner, Race Neck and Neck—Ritter Leading the Field for Legislature—Sheriff Taylor Has Been Reelected by a Big Majority.

With more than half of the vote in, it seems very probable that Charles H. Marsh, the democratic candidate for county judge, has defeated his opponent, ex-Judge T. P. Gilliland, though the race is still uncertain and may be changed by the unreported returns. With complete vote of 37 precincts and the incomplete returns from eight others in, Marsh is leading with a margin of 170 votes. One of the Pilot Rock precincts where Gilliland is strong, is yet to be heard from but the uncounted Pendleton vote will probably offset this gain inasmuch as Marsh is carrying Pendleton.

Another very interesting race has been that between J. T. Brown and Mrs. Retta Wombaug for coroner. The republican nominee has a small lead up to date but by no means certain of victory. It seems apparent at this time that the two republican candidates for the legislature have been elected. Ritter is leading the field by several hundred votes and Hinkle is nearly 200 votes ahead of Taylor.

Sheriff T. D. Taylor has been reelected by an overwhelming majority over his republican opponent, L. L. Mann, up to date his lead being over a thousand. County Clerk Frank Saling also has been returned to office despite a heavy majority for Frazier in his home community. Taylor and Saling carried by far the greater number of the precincts. Senator J. N. Burgess has defeated D. C. Brownell by a very large majority, a lead of 1900 votes having already been rolled up. Likewise Representative R. N. Stanfield is running far ahead of G. H. Bishop in this county.

Treasurer G. W. Bradley has been returned to office by a very comfortable majority over R. O. Hawks and H. M. Cockburn has undoubtedly been reelected commissioner over Lou Hodgen. Willard Bradley is the new county surveyor, having defeated J. R. English by a large majority. Justice of the Peace Joe H. Parkes and Constable Tom Smart have defeated their respective candidates for office. Norborn Berkeley and John Heathman by large majorities. Aside from the prohibition amendment, no returns have been received from over the county on the amendment except for the universal eight hour law which was known under in this county almost 4 to 1.

WHITMAN ELECTED IN N. Y. STATE BY A LARGE MAJORITY

Republican Governor Also Chosen in Ohio Where Entire State Ticket Seems to Have Carried.

SUFFRAGE HAS BEEN DEFEATED

North and South Dakota and Missouri Turn Down Amendment to Grant the Ballot to Women According to Returns up to This Time—Suffrage Carries Nebraska.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Practically complete returns show that Whitman, republican has been elected governor by 133,000 majority and Wadsworth, republican as senator by 40,000 majority. COX IS DEFEATED. COLUMBUS, Nov. 4.—Governor Cox, democrat, admitted his defeat by Willis, republican for reelection. A republican landslide is indicated. Harding, republican is elected to the senate. The entire republican state ticket was successful. At least ten of Ohio's 29 congressmen will be republican, three will be democrats and two are in doubt.

ARIZONA IS DRY. PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 4.—Indications were that Arizona had gone dry. The democrats won a general victory. Governor Hunt was reelected and Senator Smith received a big majority. Democratic congressmen were elected. SUFFRAGE DEFEATED. ST. PAUL, Nov. 4.—Woman suffrage in North and South Dakota was defeated, according to latest returns. REPUBLICAN LANDSLIDE. DENVER, Nov. 4.—A republican landslide is indicated. Carlson, republican, was elected governor. The prohibition race is close work, a republican, apparently is elected senator.

REPUBLICAN SENATOR CHOSEN. MILWAUKEE, Nov. 4.—Early returns indicated a republican senator and eight republican congressmen have been elected. The democrats apparently have elected three congressmen. Results of two districts are doubtful. HAMMOND IS ELECTED. ST. PAUL, Nov. 4.—Hammond, democrat, was overwhelmingly elected governor. REPUBLICANS SWEEP IOWA. DES MOINES, Nov. 4.—Republicans swept Iowa. Eleven republican congressmen apparently have been elected.

DEMOCRAT REELECTED. OMAHA, Nov. 4.—Indications were that John Morehead, democrat, was reelected governor by 5000 plurality. Woman suffrage probably was adopted. Democrats and republicans each elected two congressmen. A fifth is in doubt. PLATT TO SENATE. RENO, Nov. 4.—The election of Platt, republican, to the senate over Senator Newlands, democrat, seemed probable by a small majority. SOCIALISTS DEFEATED. MILWAUKEE, Nov. 4.—Practically complete returns show three socialists including Berger, aspiring for congress were defeated. DEMOCRATS LOSE CONGRESSMEN. CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Early returns showed democrats lost eight congressmen in Illinois, the progressives lost two and the republicans gained ten.

MISSOURI DEFEATS SUFFRAGE. KANSAS CITY, Nov. 4.—The Star estimated that in Missouri the woman suffrage amendment was defeated by 100,000.

BIG WAREHOUSE AT ALBANY IS DESTROYED BY FLAMES

REPUBLICANS GAIN IN MANY STATES

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The latest returns indicated the election has left the democrats in control of congress. They gained at least one senator. In the house their majority dwindled. But they probably will have a leeway of 20. There will be at least 227 democrats, 198 republicans and seven progressives in the house. Cannon of Illinois was re-elected. The progressives assert that W. P. Martin won Louisiana and in North Carolina the republicans professed to have elected F. J. Limney and J. Britt Cyrus Sulloway, republican, was elected to congress from New Hampshire. Edward Wason, republican, was elected to congress, also from the same state. The republicans gained one seat in Rhode Island, three in Massachusetts and five in Connecticut.

DRYS LEADING IN WASHINGTON STATE

SEATTLE, Nov. 4.—In 67 precincts complete throughout the state, including 200 in Seattle and King county, the dry vote now leads by more than 12 hundred. The vote now stands: Prohibition, 49,786; against, 45,543. SEATTLE, Nov. 4.—Returns from Washington indicate that the prohibition amendment has been defeated. The vote now stands, wet, 35,340; dry, 31,869. For senator, Jones, republican, probably will be easily reelected. Returns show he is leading Black by 5700, and Hanson, progressive, by 6,302. For the supreme court, Chadwick, Holcomb and Crow are leading. For congress Humphreys, republican, Hadley, republican, Johnson, republican and Dill democrat, are in the lead. In other districts La Follette, republican and Drumheller are running close together.

DUCKPOND MADE IN BATH. NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—When Miss Jennie Libby and her sister, of Massachusetts, arrived at the Hotel Laurelton with several bags and a large box they demanded a room with a large bathroom and a proportionately large tub and insisted upon seeing the quarters before registering. The manager of the hotel later found half a dozen live ducks swimming about in the tub.

BANK CALL ISSUED. WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Comptroller of the currency issued a call for the condition of the national banks at the close of business October 31.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 4.—(Special)—On the question of state wide prohibition yesterday Walla Walla county voted dry by a majority of 1700. The city of Walla Walla voted dry with a majority of 500. It is estimated by the anti-saloon leader of the state that prohibition has carried in Washington by 11,000. The Walla Walla Bulletin estimates the dry majority in Washington will be 5,000.

JAPANESE COLONIZE ISLE. BERLIN, Nov. 4.—The following was given out for publication in official quarters. "The Japanese have sent to the Marianne Islands 1100 emigrants and have appointed a civil governor and eight officials for the islands. The officials are already there. This fact shows that the Japanese statement concerning their temporary occupation of these islands is most improbable."
