Owing to the large vote cast and the lengthy ballot the count in Oregon is far from complete. The election returns indicate the state has gone dry, that Chamberlain is reelected senator and Dr. Withycombe is to be the next governor. From the eastern states the returns are far more complete owing to the difference in time and the use of voting machines. The eastern returns indicate the democratic majority in the senate will be increased while the majority in the house may be reduced. In important gubernatorial fights the honors are divided between the two big parties. Massachusetts elects a democratic governor and Michigan seems to have done the same. Whitman, republican, leads in New York over Glynn, the beneficiary under the removal of Sulzer. It is apparent that both houses of congress will remain democratic thus assuring President Wilson in control and the continuance of the Wilson policies.

Ordering the Federal Reserve Banks to begin business Nov. 15, Secretary McAdoo is fully justified by conditions and the Treasury, not in the least sensational. With the approval of the Federal Reserve Board, he anticipates the opening arranged by the directors by only fourteen days. Time is valuable, but of more importance at this moment is the exhibition of courage and energy in high places.

There has been no hurry in putting the new banking and currency law into effect, and yet since Aug. 1 there have been many reasons for haste. The bill was signed by the president Dec. 23 last. Some unavoidable delays have been met, but since the organization of the local boards of managers not a day should have been lost needlessly in putting the system into operation.

Although we are changing our financial leadership in a period of great stress and uncertainty, we are embarking upon no wild experiment. In place of a control centered in the hands of a few powerful individuals, we are now to have banking and currency truly national in scope. The wealth and enterprise of the people are no longer to be manipulated. They are to be used legitimately in support of coin as the solid foundation of currency and credit.

Where there is so much timidity, much of it without justification, and so much political panic-breeding, all of it unwarranted, the administration has no higher duty than to proceed boldly with the great reform inaugurated nearly a year ago. War in Europe has afflicted us more than it should have done. We have at hand an instrumentality that will enable us to save ourselves and to be of service to the world. It was created for just such an emergency as this. The restoration of our commerce and industry depends upon the vigor with which we use it.—New York World.

**Chateau Ordered Seized.**  
 PARIS, Nov. 3.—A chateau near Breteuil belonging to the Princess Hohenzollern, has been ordered seized by the court.  
 It is estimated that the property of 25,000 acres and 100,000 individuals of German and Austrian nationality will be sequestered in pursuance of government decree.

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**Canoeists Nearly Drowned.**  
 CASCADE LOCKS, Ore., Nov. 4.—Two canoeists said to be from Boise, Idaho, almost lost their lives here when they attempted to shoot the rapids in their Indian boat. **Airmen After 2 Rulers.**  
 LONDON, Nov. 4.—A Central News dispatch from Northern France under date of Monday says that a German airman, skimming 5000 feet above the Belgian town of Furnes, apparently with the knowledge that King Albert

and President Poincare were going to review the cavalry drawn up before the Hotel De Ville, dropped several bombs which, however, missed the square and did but slight damage a short distance away.  
 The king of Belgium and the president of France arrived on the scene after the craft had disappeared. Thereafter French and Belgian aeroplanes kept the sky clear of the enemy.
