Madame Evelyn Scotney of the Boston Opera Company and the other musical artists who travel with her gave the large audience gathered in the high school auditorium an evening of entertainment such as Pendleton is seldom favored with. Every number was thoroughly appreciated, the musicians being forced to respond with encores to each selection, even the final one.

It was Madame Scotney, though, who received the greatest tribute of applause, and, seemingly, her hearers could not listen too long to her wonderful voice. She fulfilled all of the expectations aroused by her fame and advance notices. The strength of her voice, the clarity of her tones and the remarkable ease with which she reached the highest notes were the consummation of natural endowment and careful training.

Howard White, the basso cantante of the Boston Opera Company and violinist was a favorite whether he sang or drew music from his sweet stringed instrument. The numbers of Eric Hayne, violin virtuoso, proved him an artist fit for the company with which he travels and Herbert Sieler, as accompanist and in his piano solos, received an appreciation that is only accorded to a real artist.
