No Unemployed Investigation. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 12.—Labor leaders attending the convention of the American Federation of Labor, declared there will be no general investigation this time of the unemployment problem by the federation. They think it is useless to appoint a committee to conduct an investigation and report next year, asserting that conditions are likely to change meanwhile.

### BRITISH AT SMYRNA DETAINED BY TURKS

PERMISSION REFUSED 1800 TO LEAVE CITY—SITUATION IS PANICKY.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—"The situation in Smyrna is still panicky," says the Athens correspondent of the Morning Post. "The British colony, numbering 1800 persons, wished to leave the city in a body, but the Turks refused to allow their departure. The Turks assured the American consul-general that they would protect the lives and property of all foreigners, but the populace express doubts of the value of these assurances.

"Turkish cannon have been placed on the heights commanding the town and it is rumored that the Turks plan to shell and burn the city themselves if the allies attempt to take it from the sea.

"No foreign news is allowed to enter the city except from the German local newspapers which are filled with enthusiastic accounts of German, Austrian and Turkish victories. The city is under martial law. No body is allowed on the streets after 9 p. m. The police are taking a census of foreigners and making an inventory of foreign property. The American consul protested and succeeded in stopping all requisitions of American property, but British and French property in outlying villages has been largely confiscated, according to reports.

"Three British ships in the harbor have been taken over by the Turks. The crews of these vessels have been made prisoners, but the American consul has been assured that they will be released. Many smaller craft owned by Belgians, French and British also have been confiscated."

### PARENTAL FROWNS BALK PLANS OF DAN CUPID

YOUNG COUPLE REFUSED MARRIAGE LICENSES AT CLERK'S OFFICE.

Parental frowns yesterday twice prevented Dan Cupid and Hymen from joining hands and dancing a triumphal step or two. The parental frowns were backed up by the polite refusal of Deputy Clerk R. T. Brown to issue marriage licenses to two juvenile couples who appeared first as applicants and then as supplicants.

During the morning one young couple walked into the clerk's office, faces wreathed in smiles, and implored the first assistant to Cupid to issue them a slip of paper by which they might be permitted to make conjugal vows unto one another. However, they had been preceded by a telephone message from the mother of the would-be bridegroom, said message being to the effect that the youth was only 19 years of age and could not marry without the consent of his parents. Therefore, in spite of the protestations of the young lover that he had attained to his majority and in spite of the teary pleas of the young girl, Deputy Brown refused to issue the license.

The second couple were preceded by the mother of the youth in person. She requested Mr. Brown to break the news to her son when he presented himself for the license that she had not been able to secure his father's consent.

Thus were the plans of the gods of love and matrimony thwarted. But both have whispered, "We'll get you yet."

### ST. JOHNS MAY BUY CITY WATER PLANT

ST. JOHNS, Ore., Nov. 12.—A committee consisting of Mayor Vincent, City Attorney T. T. Parker and Councilman J. W. Davis of the water and light committee, is expected to present at council meeting a report on the price named by the St. Johns Water company for the sale of its plant to the city.

City Recorder A. E. Dunsmore said "I believe that if the city owned its own water plant, it would furnish the city with a source of revenue which would materially reduce taxation if under proper management. It should be made independent of any change of the city administration to avoid its use for paying off political debts. It should be conducted by a commission, which would be entirely independent of the city council."

Mayor Vincent has already expressed himself in favor of municipal ownership of the plant if it can be purchased at a reasonable price.

### N. Y. Curb Market Open

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—The New York curb stock market reopened for the first time since shortly after the European war broke out, Wednesday. Trading was confined to oil stocks.

### BOERS BEAT SMALL FORCE OF BRITISH

PRETORIA, Union of South Africa, Nov. 12.—The defeat near Doornburg by Boer rebels under General De Wet of a small British force commanded by General Cronje was admitted by the government.

Cronje was said, however, to have been heavily reinforced and about to resume the offensive. De Wet, with a following of about 6000 had not been seriously opposed thus far in Doornburg's vicinity. His son, Daniel, was reported to have fallen in the fight with Cronje's command.

Loyalists under Commandant Lemmers were said to have defeated General Beyers, one of the rebel leaders, on the Vet river, southeast of Bloemhof, killing nine, wounding 11 and capturing 84 rebels and losing three of their own number killed and nine wounded.

### SIX NEW DESTROYERS FOR AMERICAN NAVY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Bids for six new destroyers for the American navy were opened here. Each will have a displacement of 1110 tons, a length of 315 feet and a speed of 29 1/2 knots. The armament will include two one pound aeroplane guns.

The bids were divided into two classes. One provided for the construction of the vessels in strict accord with navy plans throughout; the other provided for alterations of machinery with the navy department's approval.

The government's navy yard at Mare Island, Cal., estimated that afternoon it could build the destroyers at least \$200,000 cheaper than the lowest bid submitted. It was reported that one, and perhaps two of the vessels will be built at the Mare Island yards.
