TRAIN OF RUIN LEFT BY RUSSIAN TROOPS

CORRESPONDENT TELLS SIGHTS IN TOWNS WHERE FIGHTING OCCURS.

(By Karl H. von Wiegand, United Press Staff Correspondent.) MALBA, Russia, Oct. 10.—(By Courier via Instanbul, Berlin and Rotterdam to New York.)—Today I crossed into Russia without a passport—probably the first American that has done this in many years. I am in the German lines here 15 miles beyond the German border. This afternoon I was close to the Russian outposts which are about three miles beyond Malba. This town was garrisoned by a regiment of Russian Hussars and is quite an important point on the railroad that leads to Warsaw.

Through the courtesy of the war office and general staff at Berlin I am making a tour of the Russian border, the first American correspondent in fact the first foreign correspondent, to come here since the war began. Captain Kiewer of the general staff at Berlin and First Lieutenant Skopenik of the 20th army corps headquarters at Allenstein, have been detailed to accompany me and a number of other correspondents of neutral countries. We have an escort of nine men. On each of the powerful military automobiles are two rifles placed where they can be reached the quickest. We correspondents were strongly advised to carry revolvers for we are in a country where dispersed bands of Cossacks are raiding and Cossacks make no distinction between military men and noncombatants.

What a contrast between Russian civilization and German culture and progress. Perhaps it is not fair to judge Russia by this and other border towns I have seen. We left our automobiles at Soldau. The beautiful roads which thread the rich East Prussian province in all directions like the macadamized streets of a city, come to an abrupt end at the Russian border as if the world ended there. From Soldau to Ilovo, the German customs station, thence to Malba, we went by train. The few miles went through a battlefield over which the Germans and Russians have fought back and forth again and again. Rifle pits hastily scooped out and little mounds with crude crosses, marked the route on both sides of the track while bandages, scraps of uniforms, cartridge boxes, Russian caps and other pieces of equipment, were scattered on the ground. The "road" rather the trail that answered for a road, running parallel with the railroad, was nothing but a miry bog. Ilovo is a typical German border station. Wide streets, gardens from which flowers still smile—and the buildings had been of brick—and even the ruins show the mark of the characteristic German neatness and orderliness. The Russians have destroyed practically every building in town. It was here that Lieutenant Skopenik, a typical frontier officer such as I have known in Arizona and New Mexico held an entire regiment of Russian cavalry in check for four days from August 1 to 4, with only 25 border guards.

We visited his house. The Russians had not burned it down but had demolished every piece of furniture in it. Even the iron stove had been hammered into pieces, the mattresses ripped open, the crockery broken and the house befooled from garret to cellar in an unprintable manner. From the railroad station on the Russian side to Malba proper, a little over a mile distant, we walked. The road was shaded with rows of beautiful trees but the road itself was a bog. A deluge of rain was falling and we probably saw Russian roads and a Russian town under anything but auspicious conditions.

In contrast to the German side of the line, the buildings were of wood, dirty and dilapidated. No flowers smiled from little balconies as they did even on the ruins in Ilovo. Many of them reminded me of the ramshackle affairs that many negroes live in our Southern states. The market hall—of brick and stone—and two churches, were the only respectable looking buildings in town. The Russians razed Ilovo, the German town, to the ground. The German's hadn't touched the Russian town. A German shell had brought down the tower of the market hall and two or three other buildings showed the marks of shot and shell. Aside from these no damage had been done.

The greater part of the population had fled with the Russian troops. The Jews and some of the very poorest remained—picture of misery. Unkempt, unshorn, ragged and dirty, they stood about and looked as ambitious as the people afflicted with the "hookworm" disease I have seen in the Southern states. Many of them had the drooping blood-red eyelids of the fearful eye disease "trachoma." An old Rabbi with snow-white beard and finely chiseled intelligent face, expressed his pleasure that the Germans were in town. "May God give that they remain," he remarked. Another aged Jew said "Ach Gott, if the war was only over. Business is so bad."

Major von Heid Riedinger, commandant at Malba, rode up. He said that the Russians were showing great activity again all along the line. They nearly got my two batteries yesterday," he laughingly remarked as he described the hard work of the Germans to extricate themselves from a bad position due to the unexpected arrival of a strong Russian force. A Russian scout was brought in, captured just outside of town. He was a tall fine dare-devil looking chap.

Silence Mexican Wireless, ENSENADA, L. C., Nov. 12.—The Mexican authorities ordered the closing of a secret wireless, said to have been engaged in furnishing information to German cruisers.

HOPE OF WINNING NOT A LUCRATIVE CALLING

COWBOY AND BUCKAROO CAN TESTIFY TO THIS AS STORY SHOWS

Following wild west shows in the hopes of winning a purse is not always a lucrative calling. The purse is apt to be a will o' wisp ever beckoning on the pursuers and leading them into bogs and marshes. That is the way one Round-up buckaroo found it anyway and he narrowly escaped a tenure in jail as a result of failing to get in on the money. Alvin Brassfield was the cowboy and yesterday he was tried in the Union county circuit court on a charge of non-support. The La Grande Observer tells of the trial as follows:

This morning the jury brought in their verdict of not guilty in the case of State vs. Alvin Brassfield, who was on trial charged with non-support. The defendant was a cowboy and a buckaroo. He was one of the star riders at the La Grande fair this fall. He also rode at Pendleton and Tridale, at the Round-up there. The jury found that the defendant—a boy of 22 years—had done his best to support his wife, and he promised to do better in the future, and they also found that he had made an honest effort to support her and as the young couple really cared very much for each other yet, the jury gave the dashing young "buckaroo" another chance. The young couple left the courthouse together, happy and determined to do better in the future. It was the contention of the state that the defendant should not have followed the "Round-up" to make a living as it was a "gamble" as to whether or not he would win any purses. But the defendant, through his attorney, R. J. Green, contended that work of any kind is a "gamble" and that even the farmer gambles that it will rain, when he puts in his crop, and that as the defendant had made an honest effort to support his wife he should be acquitted, even though he did follow the Round-ups for a living.

GERMAN IMPERIAL BANK RESERVE IS INCREASING

BERLIN, Nov. 13.—Information given officially to the press says: "During the past week the specie reserve of the German Imperial Bank increased 27 million marks (\$4,750,000), while the circulation of notes decreased 76,000,000 marks (\$21,500,000)."

TURKISH WARSHIP DAMAGED BY SHELL

FORMER GERMAN VESSEL SUFFERS SEVERELY AT DARDANELLES PORTS.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—The Turkish cruiser Goeben was struck by one of the allies shells during the recent naval bombardment of the Dardanelles forts and badly damaged, according to a news agency dispatch from Petrograd.

The vessel was said to have a gaping hole in its hull above the water line. The Goeben and the cruiser Breslau originally were German vessels. They took refuge, after escaping from the Anglo-French Mediterranean squadron early in the war, at Constantinople where their purchase by Turkey was announced.

Women Candidates Lose.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 11.—Of 15 women who filed as candidates for seats in the Washington legislature not one survived the joint ordeal of the primary and the general election according to complete returns. About half the women candidates were eliminated in the primaries and the remainder lost in their election contests.

Last season two women sat in the lower house—Mrs. Frances C. Axtell, of Bellingham, republican, and Dr. N. Jolidah Croake, of Tacoma, progressive. Mrs. Axtell filed this year as a progressive for the state senate, but was beaten in a close contest.

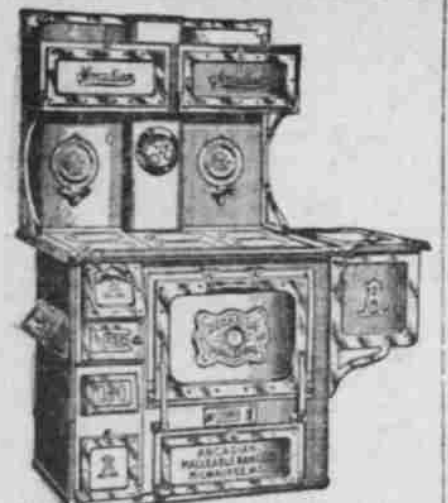

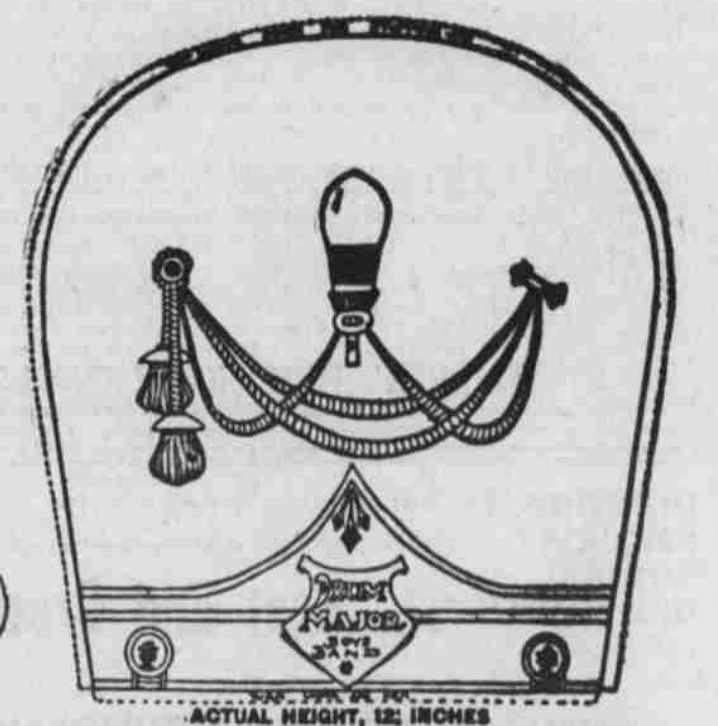
