Game Official Here.

Catron, district inspector under the biological survey who looks after the administration of the migratory game law in the northwest states, is in Pendleton today on matters connected with his office. Mr. Catron was formerly chief clerk under State Warden Finley and is well known to local sportsmen.

Over Half an Inch of Rain.

Last night during the short time rain fell .17 of an inch, according to the measurements taken by E. F. Averill, official observer. Yesterday and the night before .21 of an inch fell, making the total for the past two days almost half an inch. All day today a heavy wind has been blowing, making the day disagreeable.

Pendleton is almost a doctorless city today. Nine of the practicing physicians are at Hermiston acting as judges at the baby show being held there and their absence leaves but few home to answer the calls of the sick. Unusually Heavy Wind.

One of the strongest wind storms that has visited Pendleton for a long time blew for a half hour or more early this morning. More than one timid resident awoke with a fright to find the house rocking under the fierce blasts of old Eolus. From 2:45 until 3:15, the wind raged with a velocity of perhaps 60 miles an hour but was subdued somewhat by the heavy rain which followed. No great damage is reported from the storm. A number of telephone and electric wires suffered and loose articles about town were carried away.

HIGH SCHOOL WILL DEBATE SINGLE TAX

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 13.—The single tax question will be debated by teams from the various high schools of the state at a number of Washington cities and towns tonight. The state has been divided into four sections and debates will be held at different times, until the final winner is chosen in each district. Four prizes of \$25 each will be awarded the successful team in each district.

Wilsonville Change Due.

WILSONVILLE, Or., Nov. 13.—The postoffice at Wilsonville is to change to other hands soon. Under civil service examination Dr. Walter T. Brown got the appointment, Jacob Peters being the present postmaster.

The Wilsonville office is one of the oldest offices in the state. Originally the mail only came to the office once a month and was carried from Aurora on foot. This was when Mr. Wilson had a store here.

Dr. Brown, the coming postmaster, was one of the unfortunates in the fire, losing his drugstore. Now that he has the appointment he undoubtedly will rebuild, as he has no suitable place for the postoffice.

10 British Officers Slain.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—A casualty list dated November 2 was issued here. It gives the names of ten officers killed and 25 wounded. Among the killed are Lieutenant-Colonel C. B. Moreland of the Welsh regiment, and Lieutenant-Colonel Arthur Jex Blake Percival of the Northumberland Fusiliers.

In the list of wounded appear the names of Lieutenant-Colonel R. H. H. Boys of the Royal Engineers, and Major B. T. Pell, of the Queen's Royal West Surrey regiment.

Utah Pleads for Copper.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Nov. 13.—Representing that continued inability to ship copper to foreign countries will entirely stop the copper industry in Utah, already seriously affected by the war, the Salt Lake Commercial Club telegraphed the secretary of state asking that efforts be made to permit shipments of copper in neutral ships to neutral ports. The telegram says that 50,000 persons in Utah depend directly for their livelihood on the copper industry, which has an annual payroll of \$17,000,000 in the state.

Paroled Germans Escape.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company from Las Palmas, Canary Islands, says that 10 officers from the North German Lloyd steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, which was destroyed early in the war by the British cruiser High Flyer, who were on parole, have made their escape in a Dutch steamer, disguised as firemen. The men had been lodged on a German steamer moored in the harbor at Las Palmas.
