CANADIANS HOLD MAN FOR SMUGGLING ENEMIES

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Nov. 21.—Joseph Snyder, arrested by military authorities on a charge of treason for an alleged attempt to smuggle Austrian reservists from Canada to the United States, was held for trial by a police magistrate here. Snyder's two sons, who were arrested with him, were honorably discharged on agreement between counsel on the ground that there was no evidence against them.

JAPAN'S PROGRAM IS TO INCREASE FORCES

LARGER ARMY AND NAVY RECOMMENDED—WILL CONSIDER QUESTION DEC. 1.

TOKIO, Japan, Nov. 21.—A larger army and more ships for the navy were recommended by Count Okuma, the prime minister, at a meeting of the governmental parties called to arrange their program for the imperial diet, which will assemble December 5.

The forthcoming session of the diet promises to be of more than usual interest, for the Okuma cabinet, as a cabinet of the minority parties, must expect to meet some opposition from the Seiyukai or conservative party, which controls the majority of the seats in the house of representatives.

Two New Divisions Wanted.
The Okuma program, as outlined at the meeting of his political friends, calls for two more divisions in the army.

"After careful consideration of the problem of national defense from the viewpoints of diplomacy and finance," said the premier, "the ministry has come to the conclusion that the international situation does not permit the postponement of an increase in the army."

The premier admitted that the greater part of the money saved by economies effected in recent years which had been intended for home undertakings had to be used for war purposes. Nevertheless, the cabinet favored two more divisions in the army and an increase in the navy.

Stronger Navy Needed, Too.
"Army increase is opposed," he declared, "on the ground of our growing intimacy with Russia. The ministry is doing its best to advance this intimacy, but this satisfactory diplomatic relationship is no reason for neglecting an expedient measure of national defense. Also, we must remember that the solidarity of the Anglo Japanese alliance depends upon the strength of this empire. Stronger, as we are, our is a seafaring country, and an efficient navy is needed to maintain our connection with the continent and to fulfill our mission."

Japan, he concluded, would have an increasingly important role to play in world events, and all should be united to face problems that may arise.

Island Policy Questioned.
It is regarded as not unlikely that the Seiyukai opposition will interpellate the government on the disposition of Kiau-Chau and the islands in the Southern Pacific, including the Carolines, Marianne and Marshall Islands, which were recently occupied by Japanese warships in the war against Germany.

Already some capital is being invested in these islands, and experts from the ministries of agriculture and commerce have been sent there to study the question of exploitation of the marine resources.

JUDGE FRENCH QUITS, FACING INDICTMENT

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Nov. 21.—As a result of an investigation by the grand jury in session here County Judge J. A. French filed his resignation and indictments were returned charging him with forgery and obtaining money by false pretenses. It is alleged that, by certifying to road bills of fictitious persons and widows' pensions for widows who do not exist he has acquired in the neighborhood of \$2000 of the county's money since last May. French is a pioneer of Wallawa county and was considered one of the most popular men to ever fill a public office here. He has served as sheriff, county clerk and county judge of Wallawa county.

POLES DRILL IN QUAKER CITY TO FREE THEIR NATIVE LAND

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 20.—Twice a week, 1,200 Polish Falcons, residents of this city, undergo grueling military drill. Once a month they participate in field maneuvers. Several hundred women folk of Polish descent undergo training no less rigorous, some as nurses for wounded, some as amazons.

These are but a part of the 40,000 men and 4,000 organized Polish women in America, who are awaiting the opportune moment to strike for the freedom of Poland. Three previous uprisings of the Poles in 1830-48 and '63—failed to bring independence to Poland as a nation, and that country is now divided between Austria, Russia and Germany.

After the present war is over, the Polish leaders will present a petition signed by 3,000,000 of their folk, demanding their national independence. If it is refused, the leaders say an armed attempt will be made to gain their rights. For this reason 1,200 Poles are drilling here.

FRANCIS JOSEPH GIVES \$1,000,000 TO WAR LOAN

LONDON, Nov. 21.—A dispatch from Vienna, transmitted to London by the Amsterdam correspondent of Reuters's Telegram company, announces that Emperor Francis Joseph, of Austria, has subscribed 5000 crowns (\$1,000,000) to the Austrian war loan.

The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger authoritatively denies reports that the Duke of Brunswick has been wounded, is a prisoner or is missing.

FIVE MEET DEATH WHEN TRAIN STRIKES AUTO

PORT DODGE, Ia., Nov. 21.—Five persons were killed and one injured when an automobile in which they were riding was struck by a Minneapolis train at Halligan, 12 miles from here.

The dead are: I. T. Roush, John Berner, Katherine Roush, 18 years old daughter of I. T. Roush; 6-year-old son of I. T. Roush, all of Rockwell City, and Francis Smiley, of Jolley, Ia. Berner was the fiancé of Miss Roush.

'GREAT RUSSIAN MYTH' IS BURIED IN COMMONS

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The "Russian myth," a story which gained widespread circulation some months ago that a Russian force of 80,000 men from Archangel had been landed in Scotland, and thence moved to France was officially buried in the house of commons by a definite announcement that no Russian troops ever had moved through Great Britain for the western arena of the conflict.

GREAT BRITAIN STOPS GERMANS' TEA SUPPLY

LONDON, Nov. 21.—Great Britain prohibited the exportation of tea to all continental ports except those of the countries of the allies and of Spain and of Portugal. This prohibition is due to indications that Germany is receiving large supplies of tea through The Netherlands.

Allen Labor Estricted PHOENIX, ARIZ. NOV. 20.—Arizona Initiative measure providing that 80 per cent of the employees shall be American citizens in any business employing more than five persons was carried at the recent election by a 2 to 1 vote. Opponents of the measure have announced that it will be attacked in the courts on the ground that it violates treaty rights of foreign citizens.

The law will particularly affect railroad construction work, mining and similar lines, where much common labor is employed.

British Defeat Turks

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The official press bureau has issued the following report from the General commanding the force operating on the Shat-el-Arab River and in the Persian Gulf: "On November 17 our troops drove out of an entrenched position about 4500 of the enemy capturing two guns and many prisoners camp equipment and ammunition.

"Our casualties were three officers killed and 15 wounded and in the rank and file 35 men were killed and about 200 wounded."

PRESIDENT WORKS ON HIS ANNUAL MESSAGE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—President Wilson began work on his annual message to congress, which he will deliver in person at the opening of the regular session in December.

While the message has not yet taken definite shape, Mr. Wilson is expected to discuss Philippine independence, conservation, the Mexican question, government ownership of merchant ships and the effect of the European war on the United States.
