NOAH BUOY WAS AN INDIAN FIGHTER

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 1.—Noah Buoy, one of the best known pioneers of the upper Willamette valley, was buried near his old home at Creswell, having died at Eugene Thursday at the age of 78 years.

Mr. Buoy was born in Danville, Vermillion county, Ill., on August 22, 1856, and came to Oregon with his father, Captain Laban Buoy, in 1857. They crossed the plains with mule teams, and settled at Creswell, Lane county. Captain Buoy, soon after his arrival, became active as an Indian war fighter in several parts of the state. He was married to Susan M. Hughes in 1862. Of seven children, there are now three living. They are John W. Buoy of Eugene; George L. Buoy of Creswell, and Burton H. Buoy of Creswell.

JAILER IS LOCKED UP AND PRISONERS ESCAPE

FOUR MEN WALK OUT OF PRISON AND THROUGH STREETS OF EUGENE.

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 1.—With the jailer bound and locked in the innermost cell, four prisoners carefully locked up the county jail and escaped last night.

Scores of people saw them leave the jail and walk quietly through the business section. Fifteen minutes later the sheriff passed and found everything in normal order. Five minutes after this the cries of the imprisoned guard gave the first alarm.

The men are Forest Daugherty and James Clergy, to have been sentenced for burglary, and Joe Thomas and James Allen, hardened criminals, whom the sheriff picked up with stolen goods. Every road out of the county is watched and gunplay is expected before capture is effected.

The same men sawed in two with a broad knife a bar on the window of the jail less than two weeks ago, and were being kept in steel cages as a precaution.

Their escape was cleverly executed. The steel cage in the jail is divided into cells. These cells are unlocked from a central control in a steel box outside of the cages. One man was allowed outside the cage to prepare supper, and this man had pried open the steel box, broken the padlock holding the central control, allowing one confederate to come outside. The other two remained in their cells to give a normal appearance. But the cells were left unlocked.

The steel box was then closed, and when George Croner, deputy sheriff, opened the jail everything appeared normal. As he reached up to unlock the control box the confederate jumped on him from behind a door, the other men stepped from their cells and the four men attacked him.

The struggle lasted for 12 minutes and was a terrific fight for the possession of the officer's gun. "I got my hand on my gun and was slowly drawing it into position," said Croner. "I was within one inch of shooting position when another thrust his hand over the hammer."

DAINTY FOODS TO BE SENT BELGIAN TOTS

WOMEN OF UNITED STATES PREPARE TO SEND RELIEF TO SUFFERERS.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Boxes of assorted foods, prepared especially for babies and invalids in accordance with a food list just made out by Dr. Harvey W. Wiley of Washington, D. C. are to be sent to Belgium by the woman's section of the American Commission for Relief in Belgium, it was announced at the New York headquarters of the commission. By means of these "baby" boxes it is thought the lives of 1,000,000 babies and children who are suffering from lack of proper food may be saved.

The commission said that the food sent heretofore had been intended mainly for the adult population, and thus was not so delicate as was required for the sustenance of infants. By the new plan 36-pound packages will be prepared and marked with a white band so that on arrival in Europe they can be sent immediately to suffering children who need them. Sixty-pound boxes of ideal food for invalids or adults with blue or red bands, respectively, also will be forwarded.

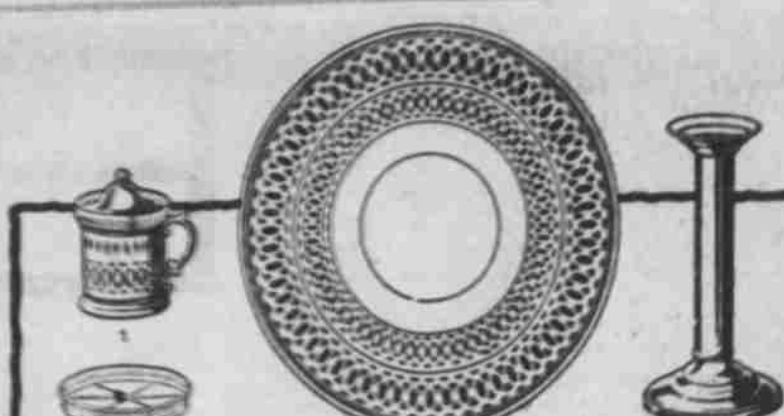
The presidents of 14 state federations of women's clubs have accepted places on co-operating committees of the women's section of the commission within the last three days. It was announced, and 15,000 Texas club women have expressed their intention to co-operate in the relief work. This brings the number of American women engaged in this work up to nearly 100,000.

FINDS RICH PLACER GROUND IN ALASKA

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Dec. 1.—George Wheeler, who has returned from the headwaters of Tolovana river, about 100 miles northwest of Fairbanks, reported finding rich placer ground on Livengood creek, one of the tributaries of the Tolovana. Wheeler said that the ground which was workable from the surface, panned 14 a foot to a depth of 30 feet, and that rich gravel was found nine feet above bedrock. Livengood creek is 10 miles long and the indications were that the pay streak extended its entire length. Other creeks in the vicinity showed good prospects. Several prospectors have left Fairbanks for the district.

TWO GERMAN VESSELS SAIL FROM CHILE WITH SUPPLIES FOR FLEET

SANTIAGO, Chile, Dec. 1.—Two German steamships have escaped from Chilean ports with provisions for the Kaiser's cruiser squadron off this coast. It was understood the Chilean government in future would refuse to allow German liners to provision in Chilean ports.

BAKER, Ore., Dec. 1.—Owen Keown, halfback of the Baker high school football team in the season just closed, was elected captain for the 1915 football eleven. Keown is a junior and has been with the team for three years. He has made an enviable reputation as an able line plunger and as a great open field runner. His work on defense has been one of the big assets of Baker's unbeaten team. Ralph Miller, Fleetwood and Gardiner, also received votes as compliments for their spectacular work in the past season. The team, however, voted to make Keown's election unanimous as soon as the first ballot was taken. All who earned their letters in the season just closed voted today.

Spies in Army Detected.

READING, Eng., Dec. 1.—Two soldiers, a lance corporal and a private in the Hanter regiment of Kitchen's army stationed at Colford, "have been proved to be German spies and have been dealt with" by the military authorities.

Copies of letters relating to the movements of troops were found in their possession.

Lumber Mill to Run Full Capacity. ELMA, Wash., Dec. 1.—Despite the dull times and bad market for lumber, shingles and doors, the big factory at McCleary continues in operation. This week the construction of a new dry kiln began. When the improvements are completed the factory will be ready to run night and day and will double the number of employees.

Ables Place New Orders.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 1.—Bids for 1,700,000 flannel shirts for the allied army were submitted by several local firms to representatives of the British war department here. It is believed the contract which is to be given early next week, will amount to more than \$2,000,000.

A contract for 7000 sets of harness costing \$175,000 was awarded to a St. Louis manufacturer today by representatives of the allies. Shipments will begin next week. Another firm announced tonight it had just shipped 42,000 suits of underwear for army use to Amsterdam and 12,000 blankets to Mexico.
