Has Appendicitis.
Mrs. D. T. Westover of this city is suffering from appendicitis and will probably be taken to the hospital to undergo an operation.

Word has been received here of the death in Ogden, Utah, of C. T. Meade, a member of the Pendleton lodge of Redmen. He formerly lived at Hermiton and was employed there on the project.

Will is Probated.
The will of Mrs. Charlotte Bell, who died at Stanfield last May, has been admitted to probate in this county after first having been probated in Cass county, North Dakota. The petitioner is her youngest daughter, Mrs. Edith May Ward. She left property valued at \$10,000 in this county and in North Dakota.

Stanfield Farmer Bankrupt.
Nels F. Johnson, a Stanfield farmer, has been adjudged a bankrupt and his case is now in the hands of Referee Thomas Fitz Gerald. His liabilities are given as \$8234.24 and his assets at \$1550. He has land valued at \$1500 but mortgages in that amount are held by the American National Bank upon it so that his real assets are only \$50. His chief creditor is E. W. McComas who has advanced him money in the sum of \$5224.22.

Roadmaster to Portland Also.
C. H. Martin, county roadmaster, will also attend the convention of county courts in Portland this week. He will accompany Judge Maloney down tomorrow. Mr. Martin has attended these meetings for the past three years and last year was one of the speakers on the good roads program. County Clerk Frank Salting will probably go down to Portland also, as the county clerks as well as the judges, commissioners and treasurers, are scheduled for a meeting there.

"God Save the King."
A local Scotchman, who is a veteran of the Boer war, this morning received a copy of a London paper in which was an appeal headed "Your King and Your Country Need You." These headlines were underscored by the unknown sender of the paper, the inference being that the local man should answer the call to arms. However, he is a naturalized American now and has a business to look after, and he has no intention of going across the water to join the armies of Great Britain. He thinks he gave sufficient service to his country during the Boer war.

To Address Students.
Charles Paul of London, will lecture this evening at the high school auditorium on Australia. Mr. Paul demonstrated his ability as a speaker Sunday afternoon at the I. O. O. F. hall at Heppner in a splendid address on "Co-operation for the Farmer." Mr. Paul's style is conversational but forceful, logical and entertaining and his addresses are made the more interesting as he speaks from experiences gathered from a period of about 20 years' of struggle and hardship in

overcoming the difficulties of developing a new country. He has traveled widely. His lecture this evening will be based upon his experiences in Australia among the different classes of people in that country and the conditions that are prevalent there.

In Pendleton 33 Years.
Norborne Berkeley, well known, really dealer, is today celebrating the 33rd anniversary of his advent in Pendleton. It was Dec. 7, 1881 that he came out of the east and landed in the little town which was destined to become the "biggest little city of its size in the west."

SHIPLOAD OF COTTON FOR WOUNDED GOES

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—The Holland-American liner *Sommelsdyk* sailed from here with 25,000 pounds of medicated cotton for wounded soldiers in German and Austrian hospitals. It was all sent by parcel post and was in response to a suggestion by Correspondent William G. Shepherd of the United Press, who first announced the need for proper dressing for the wounded.

There were 7599 packages, containing in 1948 mail sacks, in the shipment. The estimated average weight of the cotton in each sack was 25 pounds. Nine hundred and six of the mail bags were labeled "For the Wounded, Vienna." There were 100 bags for Hungarian hospitals, and the remainder was for Germany. The senders of the cotton represented every state in the union.

The *Sommelsdyk* will land the cargo at Rotterdam in ample time to catch special trains which will carry it everywhere in Austria, Hungary and Germany before Christmas.

A mountain lion recently killed in the Grand Canyon game preserve, which adjoins the Tusayan national forest, measured ten feet from nose to tail. Mountain lions and other beasts of prey, such as wolves, coyotes and wild cats, are killed by forest officers and game wardens because they are a menace to stock and to game animals.

SPENDING A HABIT SAVES PART OF ALMONY

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—"It is entirely the rich man's fault if his wife spends large sums of money each year. My husband always insisted on giving unique entertainments which cost thousands of dollars. If it were not for the men society women would not spend a quarter of what they do. Spending money is just a habit."
This is the opinion of Mrs. Blanche A. W. Heye, who was awarded \$20,000 a year alimony a year ago when she divorced George G. Heye, the millionaire banker. At the time she asked for \$50,000 a year alimony for herself and her two children, saying that it was utterly impossible to exist on \$20,000 a year without piling up debts. One year's experience has convinced Mrs. Heye that she was wrong. She has not only lived in style to which she was accustomed but actually saved a goodly part of her alimony during the last twelve months.

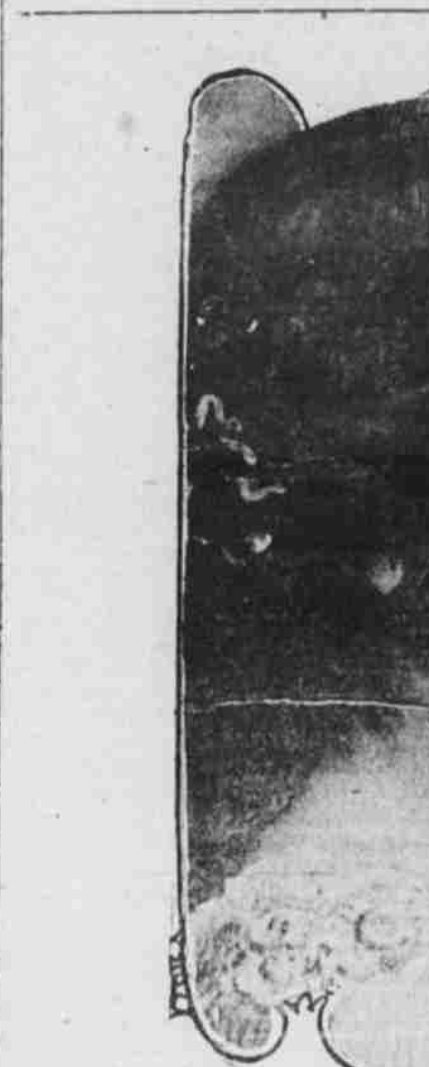

BRIDGEPORT, O., Dec. 7.—Letters were mailed from the headquarters of the United Mineworkers of America here to every local union of the mine workers in the United States and Canada, numbering 2500, and to every organized labor union in Ohio and West Virginia, approximately 900, asking for donations of money make possible purchase of Christmas presents for the children of the 15,000 striking miners in eastern Ohio. Unless donations are made, it is said, 20,000 children will receive no visit from Santa Claus. Each miner has received only 1/10 benefits from the miners' organizations since the strike was called, eight months ago.

WAR CAUSES SOWING OF MORE GRAIN IN OREGON

BAKER, Ore., Dec. 7.—War in Europe is already having a decided effect on the agriculture of Baker county. Estimates have been made that approximately double the usual amount of fall plowing is being done and has been done in Baker county this year and orders for seed wheat, oats and barley are far greater than hitherto. Baker has had dollar wheat

for almost two months and farmers who have neglected wheat raising or who have gone into it only on a limited scale have plowed up their meadow lands and wild hay lands and are preparing to turn the land to wheat crops. Heavy foreign buying of oats has had a stimulating effect on the prices of oats and ranchers are anticipating big prices next year and preparing to put in big crops in the spring.
