### CATTLE REPORTED TO HAVE DIED AS RESULT OF RABIES

### COYOTES ARE BLAMED FOR THE SPREAD OF DISEASE IN COUNTY.

That the rabid coyotes in this and adjoining counties have spread the disease among the cattle and other stock of the county is becoming apparent as reports from outlying districts come into the city. Henry Ireland, superintendent of the Whitman forest with headquarters at Sumpter, has reported the death of between 75 and 80 head of cattle in his district within the past few weeks, presumably from rabies.

From the south end of this county reports come of animals dying of the disease also. James Hascall, who has a ranch on Stanley creek south of Pilot Rock, reports the loss of four cows and a calf. Will Warner lost a colt, Brank Byrd a steer, a rancher by the name of Koontz a steer and another by the name of Cable a cow. These men all have their ranches in the same county.

When State Veterinarian W. H. Lytle was here last week, the loss of these animals was reported to him and, from the symptoms described, he pronounced death due to rabies.

## MEXICANS WILL BE FORCED TO CONTROL THEIR FIRING

### UNITED STATES ARTILLERY MAY SHELL CITY IF THEY DISOBEY.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Instructions characterized by government officials as "elastic" have been sent General Bliss, who is en route to Naco, Arizona, from San Antonio, it was announced. While it was announced no act of "aggression" was contemplated, it was explained that government officials draw a distinction between aggressive and defensive action. ### CIRCLE WORK MADE EASIER.

Two Hundred Teachers Get Outlines Offered by State University.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Dec. 10.—O'Shea's "Everyday Problems in Teaching" is the most popular selection so far among the Oregon teachers who are doing their compulsory reading circle work under direction of the state university. This is the text upon which the state examination questions in theory and practice, for a state certificate, are based. Next in demand are "Teaching the Common Branches" (Charter) and "How to Study and Teaching How to Study" (McMurry). Many teachers are asking outlines on three or even four of the books, although reading of only one is provided for under the new school law.

Two hundred teachers have received their outlines from the extension division of the University so far, but nine county superintendents have written that they wish to take advantage of the university's offer for all the teachers of their counties, and by the time the offer has been presented to all the autumn institutes, most of the teachers of the state will be working off their reading circle requirements under university direction.
