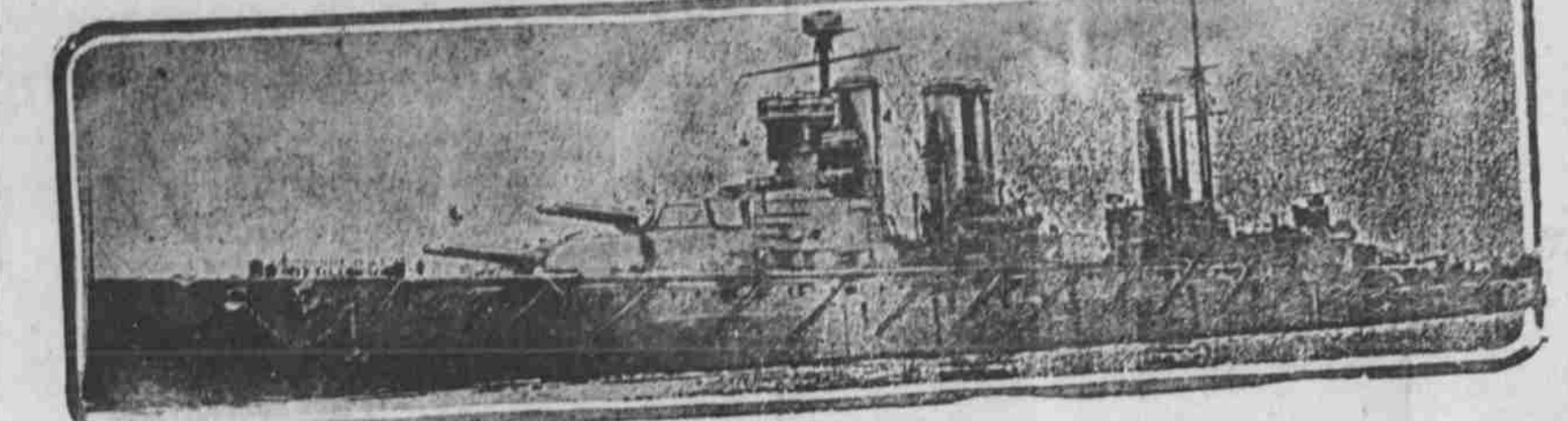

**Saloonmen Said to Have Lost Nothing in Copperfield Raid**

**PROTESTS ILLEGAL DECLARE GOVERNOR AND OTHERS IN REPLY TO SUIT.**

BAKER, Ore., Dec. 17.—Denial that the Copperfield saloonmen lost money which they would have made in the liquor business at Copperfield was made a part of the answer of Governor West, B. K. Lawson and Vein N. Walton to the suits brought by H. H. Stewart and Antone Warner and by William Wiegand for recovery of \$7500 damages for the destruction of their saloon business. The answer was filed by Frank T. Collier of Portland, attorney for Governor West.

The answer declares that the Copperfield saloonmen made money but that they did so only from the illegal business of conducting gambling parlors for drinks, etc., and that the liquor business was run otherwise at a loss.

**Business Depression Cited.**  
 The answer declares that the Copperfield saloons were battling against each other in the limited field for business, at a time of business depression and that no one was making money legitimately.

It is contended that the principal part of the business which the governor closed consisted of gambling halls instead of saloons, and that therefore the governor certainly was empowered to close them. The answer also alleges that the plaintiffs were illegally rectifying liquor which they kept in bulk and stamped fraudulently as bonded goods. It is declared that the saloonmen mixed alcohol and water with the liquors and otherwise illegally rectified them.

**PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 17.**—Don't make unnecessary noises, is the appeal made by the department of health and charities in its weekly bulletin in the interest of the public health. It says:

"The matter of the suppression of noise directly concerns the health and welfare of our people, and it is for this reason that this department has endorsed the protests is against and is desirous of co-operating with any effort to bring about a suppression of all unnecessary and preventable noises especially those which disturb the rest and sleep of the people of the community affected."

"No sensible person who lives in a large city, which is the center of so many and varied activities, expects to find the quiet and calm of the country. But every citizen has the right to expect that the period of the day that he sets aside for rest and sleep shall be disturbed as little as possible."

"Furthermore, it is really surprising with what equanimity the vast majority of our people tolerate and quickly adjust themselves to noises that are really necessary and which serve some useful purpose. The complaint is not against noise, but against the hundred and one harsh and discordant sounds for which there is absolutely no excuse."

"It must be borne in mind, too, that there are thousands of night workers in the city who must get their rest and sleep during the daytime, and that they are especially deserving of every consideration and protection from unnecessary and preventable noises."
