**Germans Give Up Gold.**

BERNE, Switzerland, Dec. 18.—The increase in Imperial Bank of Germany's gold stock from 1,223,000,000 marks (\$112,250,000) since the beginning of the war to 1,881,000,000 marks (\$47,750,000), shown in the last report of the bank, is explained in German newspapers as being due to repressive measures of the government against trading in gold as a commodity at a premium and by the continuous urging, especially among the peasants, to induce them in the national interest to give up their gold hoards in exchange for notes.

In this the clergy, German newspapers say, has been especially helpful. German officers and privates also are said to have given up their gold pocket money with which they started for the front.

**Seaman's Bill in Peril.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—The seamen's bill had a narrow escape from death in the senate commerce committee. It passed both houses at the last session of congress and after being amended in the house was recommended by the senate instead of being referred to conference. The committee, by a vote of 7 to 5, decided not to report the measure, but then on reconsideration, agreed to take it up again for further consideration.

**Wireless in Family Use.**

CLARKSTON, Wash., Dec. 19.—To receive messages by wireless from their son, a senior in the state college at Pullman, has become quite common in the Goetchius household. Mr. Goetchius often takes messages of considerable length from his son. Everyday happenings form the conversations.

The wireless has become a common means of communication since Mr. Goetchius has learned the international code. Without doubt he takes as much interest in the instrument as does his son. Guy Evans and Walter Goetchius also quite frequently communicate, the former having his aerial at the Goetchius home. The aerial is 101 1/2 feet in height.

**Taxi Driver Hits Train**

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Dec. 19.—Blinded by the glare of a streetcar headlight, D. Johnson, a taxi driver, failed to see a Northern Pacific train behind the car at Isaacs and College avenue. He drove the auto into the locomotive, striking it near the driver's wheels. The engine threw the auto around and Johnson fell out of the machine alongside the track. He escaped with only a bad shaking up. The auto was badly damaged.

**40 OF EMDEN CREW ARM CAPTURED SHIP**

MANILA, P. I., Dec. 19.—Forty men of the crew of the German cruiser Emden, who were left on Cocos Island when the Australian cruiser Sydney discovered the Emden and forced her to run ashore some time ago, have captured a collier, mounted two Maxims on her and now are raiding commerce in the Pacific, according to a report received here.

The report came through officers of the British steamer Malacca, which has arrived at Jolo. The report has not been officially confirmed.

The men of the Emden had gone ashore on Cocos Island to dismantle the wireless and fled, but were unable to rejoin the ship, when the Sydney put in an appearance.

The German party, which is commanded by Lieutenant von Mueckle, left Cocos Island with a commandered schooner and plenty of provisions together with their own armed launch and two boats, says the report. Where they captured the collier is not announced.

The Malacca reports that she steamed to Jolo without showing lights at night.

**Steamship Sinks.**

VENTURA Cal., Dec. 21.—While landing here, the Pacific Coast Steamship company's steamer Coox Bay collided with the wharf and piled up in shallow water amid the ruins of the pier. The skipper declared the ship will be a total loss. No one, it was believed, was injured in the crash.

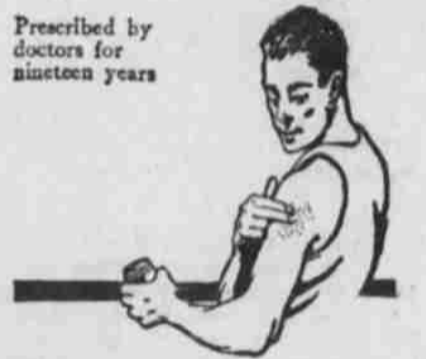

**Judges' Salaries Upheld.**

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 19.—Salaries \$4000 received by Superior Judges of King and Spokane counties for the past five years are validated by a decision of the supreme court, which incidentally gives each Pierce county superior court. Judge Christmas present of \$2000, increased salary for two years previous, which the county auditor had refused to pay. The decision upholds the legislative act, allowing first class counties to pay salaries of \$4000 in place of \$2000 fixed by the constitution.

The right of county game commissions to create game preserves in which hunting is prohibited is affirmed by the supreme court, upholding the constitutionality of the game code of 1913. The case was appealed by a gun club of prominent Seattle business and professional men had made a preserve of their private game reserve.
