CONVICTS HAVE HOPE IN A "SANTA" BLEASE

COLUMBIA, S. C., Dec. 19.—With Christmas less than a week off, convicts in the state penitentiary today were looking forward to the usual batch of holiday pardons from Gov. Cole Blease. He nearly emptied the "pen" with his pardons Thanksgiving, when he freed all varieties of criminals from "lifters" to drunks. If the governor follows his usual custom this Yuletide, he will make the condition that the prisoners going out into the world abstain from the use of liquor.

Most Wounded Recover.
PARIS, Dec. 19.—No fewer than 54 per cent of the French wounded returned to the firing line before December 12, according to interesting figures supplied by the surgical department of the ministry of war. Of the remainder 24 per cent had received convalescent leaves, 17 per cent were still in hospitals and 1 1-2 per cent were still in hospitals and 1 1-2 per cent of the wounded die. These statistics demonstrate the remarkable advance made in surgery and show a lower percentage of deaths from wounds than in any preceding war.

BITTER FEELING IS SHOWN BY ITALIANS AGAINST AUSTRIANS

TROOPS AND POLICE CALLED ON TO KEEP DOWN DEMON- STRATIONS AT ROME

Acts, Not Words, Are Urged—Several Arrests Are Made and Many Are Injured in Clashes—At Other Towns Police Are On Guard—Hostile Feeling Is Dominant.

ROME, Dec. 21.—The troops and police in many places in Italy were called to keep down riotous demonstrations against Austria at the celebration of the anniversary of the death of Oberdank, who organized the unsuccessful plot to assassinate Emperor Francis Joseph in Trieste in 1882 and was put to death for it.

During the night of Saturday, although they had been forbidden by the authorities to do so, parties to the movement placarded the streets with posters referring to Oberdank and also distributed leaflets, some of them with mourning borders, bearing the inscription, "Remember the sacrifice," and some demonstrators were slightly injured in clashes with the police.

Garibaldi's Son Cheered.
The republican deputy, Cola Ann, delivered a speech to a sympathetic audience, which frequently broke into applause as the speaker recited the history of the Triestian martyr and his ideals, and declared it was necessary soon to realize them. The demonstration reached its climax when Riccardo Garibaldi, son of the Italian patriot, Garibaldi, leaning on his crutches, arose and said:

"A voice is still ringing from Caprera Island, where my father is buried. It asks for acts, not words."

As Garibaldi ceased there was a tremendous outburst of applause and cries of "Long live Italy!" "Long live Trent!" "Long live Trieste!"

Police and Troops on Guard.
Several crowds of the demonstrators attempted to invade the center of the city, but were prevented from doing so by the police and troops.

The republican association held a procession and later unveiled a marble tablet in the republican club in honor of Oberdank.

At Ancona and Genoa demonstrations were suppressed by the police, while the town was strongly occupied by troops.

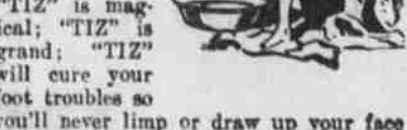
