BULLISH TONE IN WHEAT MART

CHICAGO, Dec. 21.—The biggest bull market since the early days of the European war was shown in the wheat pit Saturday.

Today's prices for the active months were advanced 2 1/4c to 3 1/4c and closed at the top. Late in the session it was next to impossible to execute buying orders in this market.

Everybody was on the bull side, export houses leading with heavy purchases against export sales here and at the seaboard. Fresh buying orders came from the public as they have not for weeks and naturally the bearish element, especially the large shorts, were buying in an excited manner. The action of the market was in line with the news Spot wheat was 1-2c higher at Liverpool, the demand showing no let up. Argentine news was less favorable. Western advices told of exporters and millers competing for all the cash wheat to be had in their territory. Exporters raised bids to secure wheat already sold to the east.

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PRICE OF HOGS TAKES A JUMP

(Courtesy Sunday's Journal.) PORTLAND, Ore.—There was a sharp advance in the price of hogs at North Portland for the week, following the offerings of rather limited supplies and a greater demand. Tops sold as high as \$7.60 during the latter part of the week and there was a heavier demand than offerings.

The week showed the Portland market in the highest position of all leading livestock markets in the entire country. The trade here has been greatly stimulated recently by the cooler weather and in the face of this receipts decreased from the total of 5119 last week to 5105 for the present week.

Cattle Prices Are Aided. Offerings of cattle at North Portland were smallest for the last six days than for many years during a like period. The decreased arrivals gave the market a very strong tone. Even the poorer grade stock sold higher while during the last few weeks such stuff showed absolute neglect. Top steers sold around \$7.50 during the week's trade and killers quickly snapped up best quality at this price.

Cattle market conditions in the east were somewhat less favorable during the week. While prices showed little net change for best quality, ordinary offerings are off.

For several weeks there has been almost a famine in the best quality mutton and lambs in the local trade and killers have been eager bidders whenever such quality has been available.
