#### Alaska Wants Goethals.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—It is reported that Colonel Goethals, now head of the Isthmian canal commission, may later be placed in charge of the construction of the government railroad in Alaska.

Colonel Goethals desires to remain at the Panama canal until it is operating smoothly, but he may do that and then take charge of the railroad work in Alaska by the time the plans are completed. If Colonel Goethals is to be sent to Alaska later he probably will be consulted by the engineers of the Alaska railroad commission when he comes to Washington next week and will be asked to go over their surveys before they are submitted to the president for approval.

#### British Bombard Turks.

PARIS, Dec. 22.—The Havas Agency has given out a dispatch from its correspondent at Athens, who quotes a message from the Island of Tenedos to the effect that the re-

cent bombardment by a British fleet in the Gulf of Saros, immediately north of the Dardanelles, completely destroyed the Turkish barracks on shore and seriously damaged the fortifications.

#### Woman Hurt; Babe Saved.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Dec. 22.—Although Mrs. J. B. Markman was knocked unconscious and her shoulder broken when she fell downstairs, the 18-month-old babe and a cut glass pitcher that she carried were unhurt.

Mrs. Markman slipped on the landing and fell the entire flight. She was hurt seriously but physicians say that she will recover.

#### E. S. Sweet Is President.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Dec. 22.—E. S. Sweet, of Grangeville, Idaho, was chosen president of the Northwest Livestock Association; D. S. Wallace, of Lewiston, vice president, and P. M. Rothrock, of Spokane, was re-elected treasurer. These officers will later choose the secretary.

#### Christmas Mail Moving.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—Postmaster General Burleson, in a statement issued promised the public "successful dispatch and delivery" of Christmas parcels and letters. The vast bulk of mail, he said, already has begun to move and was being handled promptly and well.

The "mail-your-parcels-early" suggestion recently made by the department, had good effect. Traffic began in large volumes earlier than last year.

#### Sandinavian Kings Meet.

MALMOE, Sweden, Dec. 22.—King Gustave, of Sweden, King Haakon, of Norway, and King Christian of Denmark, arrived here for their conference, at which they are to formulate an agreement designed to combine their respective interests during the period of the war.

The meeting of King Haakon and King Gustave was of unusual interest, since it was the first time that the rulers of these countries had met since Norway severed her connection with Sweden in 1905. The conference is expected to establish closer relations between these countries.

#### Wharf Washed Away.

OVNARD, Cal., Dec. 22.—Several hundred feet of the Bueneume wharf, property of the Heuneme Wharf and Warehouse company, was washed away by heavy seas. The damage was placed at several thousand dollars.

#### GOVERNOR MAY GO WITH SHIP TO BELGIUM

WEST HAS BEEN ASKED TO ATTEND PERSONALLY TO DISTRIBUTING SUPPLIES.

SALEM, Dec. 22.—Regarding a suggestion from the Oregon Belgian Relief committee that if he would announce that he would go personally to Belgium with the Belgian relief ship to attend to the distribution of supplies, many would be induced to contribute, Governor West said:

"While it is going to be a rather difficult matter for me to adjust my affairs so as to meet this situation, I feel it my duty to respond. However, I will endeavor to give the committee a definite answer within the next few days."
