Trains Running Late.

On account of snows in states east of Oregon all trains from the east are running late. No. 17, due here at noon, yesterday did not arrive until after 4 o'clock.

Skating at Hermiston.

Cash Lost is Discovered.

FOSSIL, Ore., Dec. 23.—An investigation of an apparent shortage in the accounts of the treasurer of Wheeler county revealed that a ledger deficit was a balance held in the hands of the treasurer that had not yet been deposited in the bank. It is the treasurer's custom to make a deposit of county funds once each month, and more frequently if taxes are coming in freely. He made this deposit of \$7000 October 10 and it would have been made whether the state accountant had come to Fossil or not, he says.
