ITALIAN BLUEJACKETS LAND AT AVLONA AND TAKE CHARGE OF CITY

MASSACRE BY MOSLEMS BEGINS NEAR SEAPORT AND MANY HAVE BEEN KILLED.

City itself is threatened—Albanian issue may draw Italy into the war—Revolution is spreading—Country is prey to anarchy and civil war—Many endangered.

AVLONA, Albania, Dec. 26.—At the request of the Italian consul here a detachment of bluejackets from the warship Sardegna landed and peacefully occupied the city.

The Moslem rebels are threatening the city and have been strongly reinforced. Rebel sympathizers in the city attacked the prison and released large numbers of their adherents. The rebels are now engaged in looting and massacre just outside the city walls.

Italy May Enter War.

It has been generally understood in Rome that if the Albanian question developed to the point where Italy would be compelled to intervene by landing troops and occupying any part of the territory of that Balkan territory, Italy's active participation in the general war would be certain. Italian troops were sent to that region several weeks ago and took possession of the island of Saseno, off Avlona, but it was explained officially at that time that that was not "actual intervention" in the Balkans.

ROME, Dec. 26.—An official dispatch sent by wireless from the Italian warship Mistrata at Durazzo says that the Albanian rebels at Tirana are threatening to move against the government of Essad Pasha, who is friendly to Italy.

Revolutionary Movement Spreading. Essad is about to proceed to Dibra. Meanwhile he has sent a supply of guns and ammunition to Caciala, where his adherents have been massacred by the insurgents.

The dispatch adds that the revolutionary movement is spreading at an alarming rate.

Recent dispatches from Athens by way of Paris said that anarchy reigned at Avlona and the region around the Albanian seaport was a prey to civil war. Partisans of Kemal Bey last month forced the government to haul down the Turkish flag and hoist the Albanian colors. Essad Pasha, the commander-in-chief of the Turkish forces in Albania, then sent 100 soldiers to Avlona and they disarmed the inhabitants and restored the Turkish flag.

Previous Expedition Unsuccessful. Italian naval forces occupied Avlona on October 26, but the expedition was in the nature of a relief and sanitary organization, which purposed to aid the large population which had taken refuge in the city to escape the persecutions of the insurgents. Everything was done by the Italian government to remove from the expedition anything savoring of political or territorial occupation. VATICAN AND FRANCE ARE NEAR AGREEMENT TO RENEW RELATIONS

NEGOTIATIONS HAVE PROGRESSED TO A MOST FAVORABLE POINT.

Diplomatic Relations May Again Be Established As Result of Activity of Pope Benedict—Present War Appears to Be Cause of Willingness of France in Matter.

ROME, Nov. 13 (By Mail to New York)—The resumption of diplomatic relations between the vatican and France today became practically assured when it became known that negotiations to that end initiated by Pope Benedict have already progressed to a favorable point.

The efforts of the vatican in this direction are being taken at Rome as only one more example of the quick, decisive action which has marked every step of the pontificate of the new pope. As a matter of fact, this resumption of official relations between the vatican and Paris, important as it is in itself, is only one step in the bigger plan of Pope Benedict, to bring about a settlement of the famous "Roman question" and to establish peace between the vatican and the Quirinal.

Pope Benedict's plan to this end provides for the vatican having an official representative at the peace conference which will adjust the affairs of Europe at the close of the present war. Negotiations to attain this result have already been opened directly with England and it has now become desirable that the vatican also negotiate directly with France. For the moment, owing to the rupture of diplomatic relations which has existed since the separation of the church and state in France, this she cannot do.

It is also highly desirable for the vatican that when the peace conference begins its labors that she be on friendly relations with all of the powers that will be represented. At the present time France is the only one of the European nations engaged in the war with whom the vatican is not in accord. Austria, Russia, Germany, Belgium and even Serbia have regular ambassadors accredited to those courts. Although England does not have these official diplomatic relations with the vatican, the latter has direct communication with the English government through Cardinal Bourne, archbishop of Westminster. For the peace conference to be convened without the vatican being in official relation with France would unquestionably prove a great drawback to Pope Benedict's desire to settle once and for all the quarrel between Italy and the vatican and to place the latter on a thoroughly guaranteed basis of temporal independence.

Much as it is to the vatican's advantage in the present moment to be on friendly terms with France, it has been no secret for several years past that France also was in a most receptive mood. Where the protection of large Catholic populations in the orient has been entrusted by the vatican since the separation of the church and state in France, to other powers, France has found herself steadily losing prestige in those countries. This prestige has been going largely to Germany and Austria, who have at all times maintained friendly relations with the Holy See.

Galling as this has been in the past to France, it would certainly be more insupportable when the present war is over were she to see her two enemies continue to enjoy these advantages, and for that reason both France at the present moment appears fully as disposed to make peace as is the vatican.

From highest vatican resources it was declared today that the negotiations for a resumption of diplomatic relations have been progressing for fully a month past. Cardinal Amette of Paris has been delegated with the task on behalf of the vatican while former Premier Briand has conducted the negotiations for the French government. They are declared to have arrived at a basis that is now ready for submission to the vatican and Bordeaux. With the urgent necessity of the two powers getting together before the present war ends, it is now thought likely that either will raise any obstacles that might be of an unmountable nature and a speedy settlement is being universally expected.

WAR'S FORTUNE BRINGS PAINTINGS TO AMERICA

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 24.—By an odd turn of events the European war will draw into unofficial participation in the Panama-Pacific international exposition, it was announced today, three European countries which otherwise would not have been represented. With the beginning of hostilities the annual International Art exhibition at Venice was closed, making available for the exposition, paintings from all the belligerent countries. Among these were Serbia, Poland and Belgium. Canvases from these countries, none of which would have participated, will be sent to San Francisco.

Johnson White Is Dead.

DEPU, Ore., Dec. 25.—Johnson White of Portland, dropped dead here as he was about to take the train for The Dalles en route home. Mr. White who was a veteran of the civil war, was about 73 years of age and had been visiting a brother, Solon White, at Fred.

Essad's Palace Is Fired. LONDON, Dec. 25.—A dispatch from Durazzo, Albania, to the Central News says that the palace of Essad Pasha at Hيرانa has been set afire.

Essad Pasha, always prominent in Albanian military and political circles, was named provisional president following the recent retirement of Prince William of Wied, who had been selected by the powers to rule Albania. Essad Pasha was last reported as advancing on Scutari, and it was said that he had proclaimed a holy war in Albania.

Russians Defeat Turks. PETROGRAD, Dec. 26.—The following statement of the general staff of the Russian army in the Caucasus was issued.

"On the 22d the Turks again showed evidence of great activity in the direction of Olti (55 miles west of Kars). They made a series of attacks in the direction of Sary-Kamysh, but these failed.

"The Turkish offensive in the direction of Van was turned into a defensive movement, which, however, troops succeeded in breaking after stubborn resistance. We captured from the enemy several prisoners with their arms."

WITH CLOTHES ABLAZE MAN STICKS TO POST

ALBANY, Ore., Dec. 25.—Heroinically sticking to his post with his clothing ablaze, George Hofflich, assistant foreman in the local Southern Pacific yard, probably saved from death or injury several passengers on the Portland train while it was standing at the depot.

Hofflich, by the use of a hose, was transferring lighting gas from a tank on a car on a side track to one of the coaches of the train. Due to a defect in the connection, the gas leaked and was ignited in some way by Hofflich's lantern. Instantly the escaping gas blazed. Though his clothing was ablaze, Hofflich managed to disconnect the hose and shut off both tanks. Bystanders rushed to his assistance and tore his clothing off. Save for a few minor burns, Hofflich was not injured. Had the fire reached the gas in the tanks an explosion would doubtless have occurred.

J. B. Farrell in New Bank.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 26.—Organization of a new \$100,000 Central bank, with men worth millions behind it, was announced. W. J. Patterson, now cashier of the Hayes & Hayes Bank of Aberdeen, will be president; O. C. Spencer, son of R. R. Spencer, leading Seattle banker and capitalist, will be vice president; and George Mason, of Centralia, former trust company cashier, will be cashier. J. D. Farrell, of Portland, will be

one of the directors and it is expected that the bank will become the leading institution of southwestern Washington. The old quarters of the Centralia Trust company have been procured and the bank will open January 4.

Pope Receives College.

ROME, Italy, Dec. 24.—Pope Benedict received the members of the Sacred college in solemn audience for the exchange of Christmas greetings, the ceremony taking on the pomp of the times of Pope Leo.

Addressing the cardinals, the pontiff expressed his regret at the absence of some of the prelates, owing to illness, referring especially to Cardinal Agliardi and Martinelli. He added that the latest news regarding Cardinal Agliardi made it apparent that his recovery would be speedy.

The Pope then enumerated the efforts he had made to render the war less terrible and said that he would continue to devote all his energies to the suppression or limitation of the inhuman sacrifice of life.

GERMANS SAID TO HAVE DRIVEN OUT PORTUGUESE

LONDON, Dec. 26.—The latest German invasion of Angola, a Portuguese possession in Africa, adjoining the Kaiser's territory, has been acknowledged officially, it was stated in a Lisbon dispatch received today. The Teutonic expedition was said to have been 1000 strong and to have been provided with artillery.
