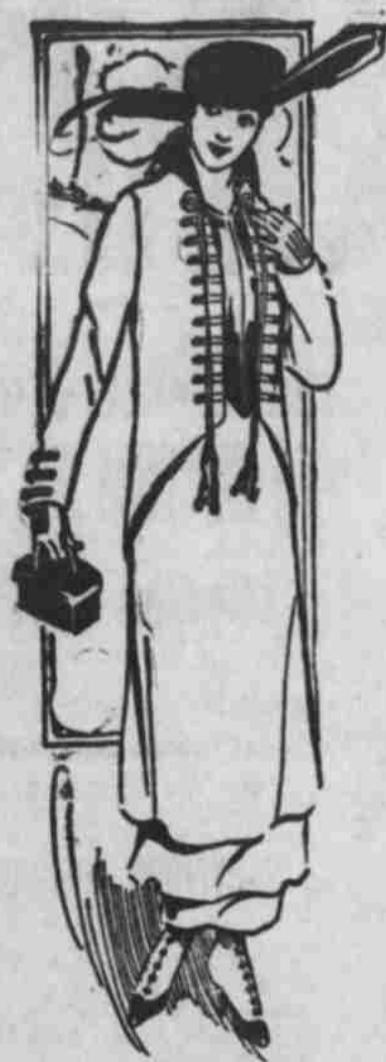

COMMISSIONER HOBBS BEGINS DUTIES IN NEW OFFICE TODAY

MISS FERN IS ONLY WOMAN MEMBER OF INDUSTRIAL BOARD.

Private Secretary to Governor West Was Appointed by Him to Fill Important Place and She Will Draw a Salary of \$3600 a Year—Figured in Copperfield Case.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 1.—After acting as private secretary to Governor Oswald West, who retires from office January 11, for several years, Miss Fern Hobbs today became a member of the state industrial accident commission. The position pays a salary of \$3600 a year and is one of the best appointive offices in the state. Miss Hobbs will be the only woman member of the commission. Miss Hobbs' tenure as private secretary to the chief executive was marked by activities that attracted nationwide attention. She conducted a number of investigations in connection with moral crusades in various towns of the state. Her most spectacular performance was a year ago, when, accompanied by a squad of state militia, she invaded Copperfield a town of the old "wild west" sort, closed all saloons and caused to be confiscated the stocks of liquors, gambling paraphernalia and firearms.

THE FIGURES EARTH IS 100 MILLION YEARS OLD

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 31.—That the earth is about 100,000,000 years old is one of the deductions of Geo. F. Becker, of the United States Geological Survey, presented in a paper read at a meeting of the Geological Society of America, meeting here in connection with the annual convention of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The missing link between man and his ape-like ancestors has been identified in the Pithecanthropus Erectus, whose skull, found in Java, showed all the characteristics intermediate between man and ape, according to James H. McGregor, assistant professor of zoology at Columbia University, who presented a series of restorations of skulls and reproductions of the appearance of primitive men.

Henry F. Osborn, also of Columbia, delivered an address on the migration of human types during the old stone age in Europe, and traced several distinct specimens of man, which, he said, had disappeared utterly from the earth.

King Decorates Premier. ROME, Dec. 31.—King Victor Emmanuel has decorated Premier Salandra, with the Order of the Annunziata, the highest Italian decoration, which entitles the bearer to call himself a "cousin of the king." The king decorated the premier at the ceremony of baptism of the newly born Princess Maria. He spoke warmly of the services rendered to the state by the premier.

Custom House Now at Tampa. TAMPA, Fla., Jan. 1.—Headquarters for the customs collection service of Florida were removed here today from Jacksonville.

Stories From the War Zone

GENEVA, Dec. 3.—(By Mail to New York.)—A stranded tourist in Switzerland nearly brought about the death of a friend living in Germany by sending him the following telegram: "Kale all gone. Wire thirty beans." The German censor took it to mean that some German town, Kiel probably, had been attacked and wiped out.

The person to whom the wire was addressed was arrested as a spy and probably would have been shot if, luckily, a German officer who had lived in America hadn't been able to convince the authorities that the message was merely a request for monetary aid.

PARIS.—(By Mail to New York.)

When the Germans entered Cond-sur-Escaut, say the Paris papers, they tried to pull down a statue erected there to the memory of the popular French General Pothou de Saint Marie. Fifty men with ropes tugged at the monument but were unable to budge it. Losing their tempers, they then fired hundreds of shots at the figure, but the bullets only flattened themselves against the solid bronze with little effect.

The municipality of Conde has now decided to leave the marks of the German bullets undisturbed as a standing testimony to German impotence to break French resistance.

NISH.—(By Mail to New York.)

Servia boasts the youngest non-commissioned officer in the ranks of Europe's warring armies. This is Dragoljub Jelitich, a twelve-year-old school boy, who has just been promoted corporal. The lad took the field to avenge his father who was killed at the battle of Kumanovo. Owing to his youth he was unable to join the regular army but he took service with a group of comradis, and from the first displayed extraordinary bravery. He has been through seven of the hottest fights of the war and is just recovering from a serious wound received at Sontcha.

COPENHAGEN.—(By Mail to New York.)—The Danish police are endeavoring to track down a particularly inhuman genius, who profiting by the paralyzed postal service has been

extracting from German and Russian refugees money sent by their friends and relatives. The swindler, who has an accomplice, managed to learn the methods of assisting the refugees, and by forging the name of a Russian official who was sent to Copenhagen to look after them, he has inflicted financial suffering and misery on scores of wretched victims of the war. The fraud was only discovered when the Russian officials began to receive letters from different persons informing him that money had already been sent.

Wife Calls Man "Unfit."

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—Mrs. Kathryn Browne Decker, wife of Henry E. Decker, an heir of the founder of the Sheffield-Farms-Slawson-Decker company, who inherited \$500,000 from the Decker estate, won a separation a few days ago in Supreme Court Justice Blanchard's court. The alimony, pending the decision of a referee as to the amount, remains at \$25 weekly, as awarded by the court pending the trial of the suit. Mrs. Decker, recalled to the stand,

denied she refused to have children by Decker. She said: "I want to have children when I was first married, but after my husband called me a low woman and so abused me, I did not think he was fit to be a father."

Decker resumed the stand and was cross-examined. He admitted he had a detective follow his wife for two months.

He also testified he did not want his wife to return to the stage, but that he interviewed Augustus Thomas, the playwright regarding it. "Do you know a detective named 'Ascher'?" asked Miss Lucille Pugh, attorney for Mrs. Decker.

"Yes," replied the witness. He then denied having accused the slench of having accepted a bribe from his wife.

"Who is the manicurist at the Ansonia, who has been manicuring your nails for the last three years?"

The witness admitted knowing a Miss Cullom and sending her flowers.

Regarding the previous testimony of Mrs. Decker objecting to being fol-

lowed by a detective, Justice Blanchard remarked: "Almost any self-respecting woman would object to a detective following her."

Woman, Accused, Dies.

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 31.—Mrs. Maude Hendricks, wife of a Stockton, Cal., engineer, was found dead in a grove near Hayward, a suburb of Oakland. Near the body a revolver with one chamber discharged and two letters, one to her husband, the other to her asking forgiveness for

her deed, established suicide as the cause of death.

Mrs. Hendricks was brought to a Hayward hotel by an unidentified man who dropped from sight at once. The dead woman came into the public view several days ago when San Francisco papers printed news of an alleged elopement in which Mrs. Hendricks and Rev. R. A. M. Browne, formerly of Hamilton City and Chico, were named as principals. Browne disappeared from San Francisco Christmas day, leaving his baggage unclaimed in a hotel alleged to have been occupied by himself and Mrs. Hendricks.

In the letter found near her body addressed to her husband, Mrs. Hendricks said that Browne "had nothing to do with her suicide."

Housewives to Be Taught.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—A general meeting place for housewives, said to be the first in this country, will be opened in this city January 4 by the National Housewives' League that has been active in the campaign to reduce the cost of living.

Mrs. Julian Heath, the president, in announcing the opening date of the headquarters, said that classes for housewives would be given Monday mornings. There will be a staff of domestic teachers. Moving pictures will be shown to demonstrate proper and improper methods and sanitary and insanitary methods employed by dealers.

There will be lectures on poultry, fish, marketing and all things pertaining to household matters.
