MEDICAL BOARD OF WASHINGTON SUED BY DOCTOR

WALLA WALLA, Jan. 8.—Because, he alleges, an adverse report as to his professional standing, made by Dr. C. N. Suttner to the California state board of medical examiners resulted in a refusal of the California board to issue him a license to practice in that state, Dr. Harry H. Hewitt, formerly of Walla Walla but now of Seattle, has filed suit for \$50,000 damages in the King county superior court against Dr. Suttner, as secretary of the state board of medical examiners.

Dr. H. P. Smith, president of the board, and other members, who are now in Walla Walla attending the board's sessions, are likewise made defendants to the suit.

"I am not worrying about the suit," said Dr. Suttner, "and neither are the other members of the board. We have been sued so often by doctors whom we have found unworthy that the action instituted by Dr. Hewitt furnishes us with no great cause for alarm."

Since leaving Walla Walla, Dr. Hewitt has attained considerable notoriety in Seattle and elsewhere through his association with Dr. Lucas. Lucas himself was prosecuted in the King county courts a few weeks ago on charges of practicing medicine without a license, was convicted and fined \$100. He has now appealed the case to the supreme court of the state.

Eaton Challenges Statement.

At the close of Eaton's address, E. L. Amidon, secretary of the Multnomah republican county committee, arose and told Eaton that he was mistaken in his statement regarding Hurlburt.

Amidon said that he was a member of a committee that interviewed all the members of the Multnomah delegation, and they favored seating Hurlburt, unless it was proved that he was a criminal or not a citizen at the time of his election.

"Mr. Hurlburt has been told by members of the Multnomah delegation that if he goes to Salem and votes for Mr. Selling he will be seated, and if not a contest will be filed against him," repeated Mr. Eaton, speaking directly to the shorthand reporter there for the Oregonian.

"Senator I. N. Day has gone to Roscoe P. Hurlburt to get him to start a contest, and then he has gone to Hurlburt and told him if he would vote for Selling the contest would be dropped. Is that clear?"

Amidon repeated that all the members of the delegation favor seating Hurlburt.

EATON SHOWS UP THE REASON OF SCHEMING ON PART OF PIPER

AMBITION FOR SENATORSHIP CAUSE OF INTEREST IN SPEAKERSHIP RACE.

Eugene Man, Candidate, Delivers Address in Portland Accusing Editor of the Oregonian of Desire to go to United States Senate—Policies are Scored.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8.—"E. B. Piper's interest in Oregon politics is a very personal interest at this time," declared Representative Allen Eaton of Eugene, candidate for speaker, in an address delivered at the Central library last night. "He wants to be United States senator, and is laying plans accordingly, and this is one reason why he is now backing Ben Selling for the speakership."

"Mr. Piper, it is known, hesitated a long time as to whether he should run for United States senator at the last election or let R. A. Booth run. Finally he decided to let Mr. Booth run. No doubt he considered that Senator Harry Lane will be easier to defeat four years hence than Senator Chamberlain would have been in the last election."

Never before in the history of the state has a candidate for speaker adopted the unique method of getting a hearing that was employed by Mr. Eaton last night in holding a public meeting. He showed how the Oregonian has set itself up as a dictator in Oregon politics, has refused to give his side of the contest, and is endeavoring to force the organization of the legislature so as to gain control of state affairs.

Withycombe Won Despite Handicap.

"Mr. Piper, through the Oregonian, supported Dr. Withycombe for governor, and in spite of that handicap Withycombe was elected," continued Mr. Eaton. "This was very gratifying to Mr. Piper. Then Mr. Piper told Dr. Withycombe that he had only one small request to make of him, and that was that Dr. Withycombe should appoint W. E. Burke as his private secretary."

"Dr. Withycombe refused. A second time he was requested to make the appointment, and again he refused. Then Mr. Piper threatened that if he did not make the appointment he could not have the support of the Oregonian for his administration."

"When Dr. Withycombe stood firm in his refusal to turn his office over to the Oregonian he strengthened the friendship of his many friends in the state as nothing else could have done."

Piper Organizing House.

Mr. Eaton said that Piper had already organized the senate, assuring the election of W. Lair Thompson of Lake county as president, and when he understood he was not to have control of the executive office he immediately began to organize the house by forcing the election of Mr. Selling as speaker. He said Piper put Burke forward as campaign manager for Selling.

"The people of the state may not be concerned in my opinion of Mr. Burke, but here is an opinion that should be authoritative," said Mr. Eaton, who then read an editorial published in the Oregonian, February 1, 1912, when Burke was a member of the legislature. The editorial said:

"Of all the cheap stinking creatures who ever entered a legislative body through false pretenses and base lies, Cole and Burke of Multnomah county or anywhere are easily chief. These creatures never had any consideration before—never will again. They eagerly embraced the only opportunity of their lives to be infamous—through misrepresentation of those who elected them. Cheap varlets, base cowards, they cannot ever live in Multnomah county hereafter because nobody will trust them. Multnomah county will not be betrayed again."

Exposes Oregonian's Misrepresentations.

Mr. Eaton read portions of many news articles and editorials from the Oregonian to show the manner in which the Oregonian had misrepresented his side of the contest and refused to give him a fair hearing.

"The contest has been from its inception an attempt of the Oregonian to organize the house as it has done the senate," he said. "It is a bull-dozing proposition, a game of bluff."

He declared that C. M. Hurlburt, who was discredited before the election and repudiated by the republican organizations in Multnomah and Clackamas counties, in which joint district he was a candidate for representative, would be seated in the house of representatives if he gives his support to Selling, and if not his seat will be contested.

"Was John Gill one who favors this?" asked Eaton.
"No," confessed Amidon, and the audience laughed.

"Was S. B. Cobb one?"
"I'm not going to answer any more questions," replied Amidon, to the great amusement of the audience.

"Was L. J. Wentworth one?" continued Eaton. But Amidon refused to answer.

Eaton gave some attention to Senator L. N. Day, pointing out Day's activities in the legislature in connection with the bill appropriating \$15,000 for the Cello power investigation and his maneuvering to get a large share of control in the expenditure of the appropriation. He cited the appointment of one of Day's business associates as engineer connected with the investigation at a good salary but with nothing to do, he said.

He cited these things, he said, to show the kind of a man who is now proposing drastic changes in the state government on the ground of economy.

Speaker Gives Reasons.

"The real reason I am in this fight for speaker is because of the policies for which I stand," declared Eaton, who read the statement he has sent out to the members of the house outlining the changes in the rules of the house which he declares would result in a saving of 25 to 50 per cent in the cost of the session.

He pointed out that at the last session Multnomah county had the presidency of the senate, the speakership and the chairmanship of the ways and means committees in both houses and of the judiciary committees, these being the four most important committees in the legislature.

"And the session was the most extravagant in the history of the state," he said.

Someone in the rear of the hall asked to be heard and urged Eaton to make his fight for the change in rules if he should not be elected speaker.

Eaton replied that he made a fight for a change in the rules at the last session. He said the rules were practically the same as when the state was first organized.

Speaker McArthur also advocated changes in the rules," he said. "He came down on the floor of the house and spoke. The number of committees was reduced from 43 to 41 and

the rule which said that the janitor must have a fire in the stove by 9:30 o'clock each morning was eliminated."

Six Revived by Pulmotor.

YORK, Pa., Jan. 7.—Members of five families were nearly asphyxiated by escaping gas from a broken main on West King street. At least six had narrow escapes from death, while nearly a score of others were overcome.

The pulmotor was used to save the lives of half a dozen. Those who suffered most from the gas were Nanny B. Lyons, Miss Ella E. Lyons, Mrs. Harry L. Saylor, Owen E. Lyons, Jacob Reichard, Miss Carrie Reichard, Philip Shrive and John H. Donnes.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 7.—Police whistles, with a note so piercing as to bring cops from any section of the town, will be presented to the wives of members of the Marion Civic association.

Decision to afford that additional protection to the women of the community was reached at a meeting of the association last night at the home of Dr. George D. B. Darby. It was felt that while the town is well policed, further precautions against highwaymen and burglars would not be amiss.

Reports read at the meeting give an idea of the varied activities of the association. Every month, for instance, chemical analysis is made of the water supplied by the town. The report for December shows the water to be pure.

Fire plugs have been covered with straw, so as to be ready for instant service during cold weather. By New Year's eve, another committee reported all of Marion will be lighted by new ornamental electric lights, which replace the old gas lamps.

Twenty-eight new members were

"In the interest of plain justice and of sound political principles," he said, "I recommend the passage of an act by the present general assembly granting presidential suffrage to women."
