Britons Ask Democracy. LONDON, Jan. 9.—The Royal Commission on civil service, in its report recommends that some of the old traditions of the British foreign service be done away with and that the service be made more democratic. One of the recommendations of the commission is that the time-honored stipulation that all candidates for foreign posts in the diplomatic service must have a private income of at least 400 pounds be abolished.

Rooster Leads to Suit. ATLANTIC CITY, Jan. 9.—Sued in the district court for \$52, the balance alleged to be due on a contract by which he purchased 200 chickens for \$200, Richard Baesecke put up the defense in the court here that Mary A. Becht, the plaintiff had used a "big brown rooster" as a decoy to "entice 49 of his best chickens back to her coop." These 50 love-sick hens, he testified, were worth the \$52 and for that reason he refused to pay the balance. A decision was reserved.

CHICAGO WHEAT HITS NEW MARK

(Friday's Market.) CHICAGO.—Wheat market showed the effects of the enormous export demand and the higher price abroad for spot delivery. Market for options here opened with an advance of 7-8c for the May and 1 5-8c for the July and closed 2 1-2c up for May and 1 3-4c for the July.

The extreme strength of the July at the opening and shortly later was a big surprise to the trade and those that were short were quick to get from under and get long. Strength in the trade here received considerable aid from the report that England, Italy and Holland had combined to protest shipments from the United States to Europe.

For a long time, there seems little hope for Gresham but the great moment comes when he is able to save Alice's life by carrying her to safety through a wild day, in which both are at the mercy of overflowing waters from a dam that unheeded, during series of pictures is the work of a genius. None other could have planned such thrill producing moments, and only a genius could have found the means to carry out the conception that made so great a picture.

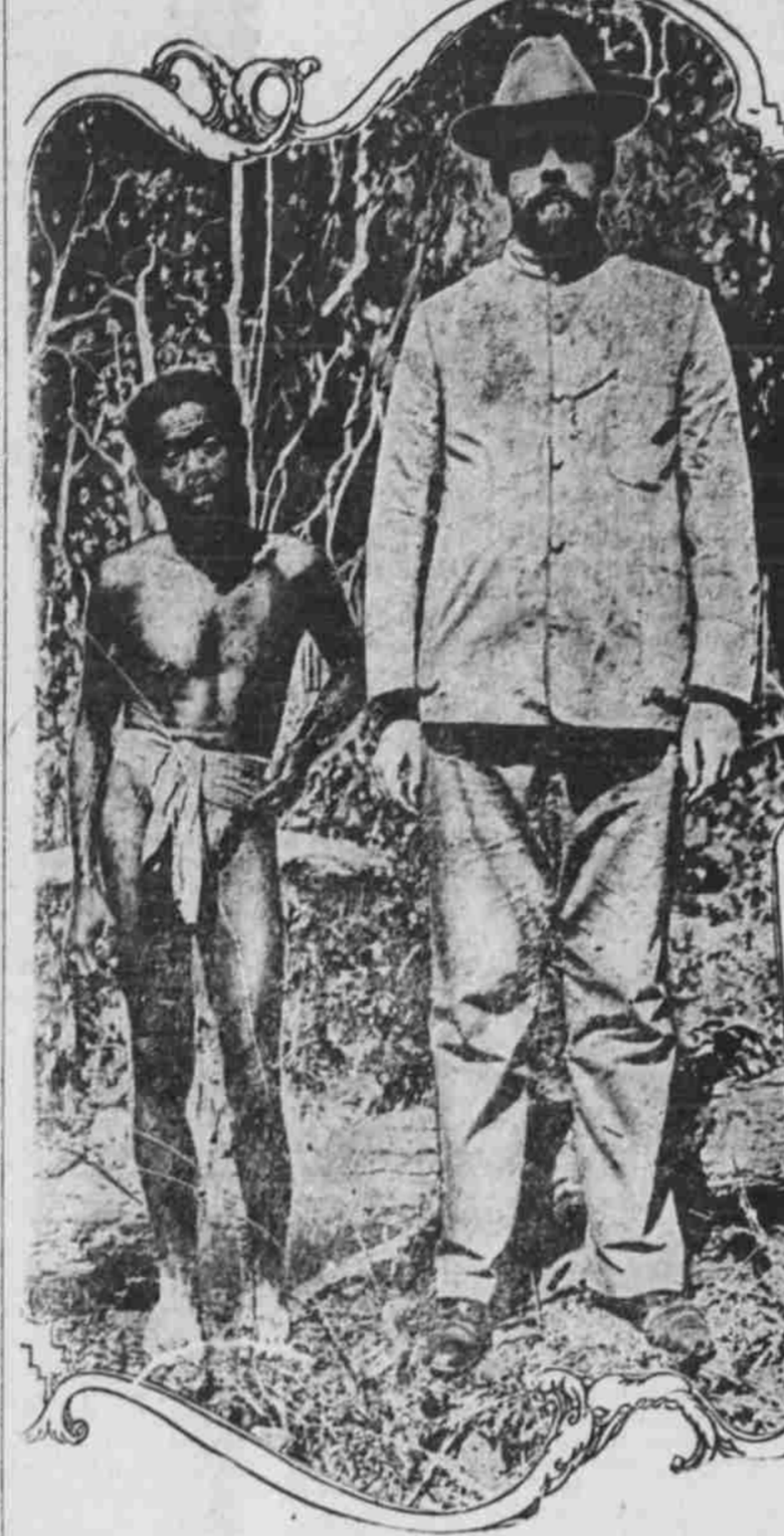
Pension Law Attacked.

PRESCOTT, Ariz., Jan. 9.—The Arizona mothers' pension law, approved by the people at the election November 3, was attacked in a suit filed in the superior court by attorneys engaged by the Prescott Chamber of Commerce. The validity of the statute, an inflated measure, is questioned, and the court is asked to enjoin its enforcement. Under the law all state charitable institutions, including the Pioneers Home, which shelters indigent men and women here, are to be sold to provide a fund out of which to pay pensions to widowed mothers and to aged dependents. Pensions to mothers are fixed at \$15 a month, with an allowance of \$5 additional for each child. Relief is to be accorded to indigent persons only if they are more than 60 years old and have been in the state five years.

Spain's Revenue Falls.

MADRID, Spain, Jan. 9.—The financial statement of the government for 1914 shows a deficit of 157,000,000 pesetas (\$31,400,000). The deficit is due to the shrinkage of the revenue during the five months of the war. This amount was partly made up by an issue of 70,000,000 pesetas (\$14,000,000) of treasury bonds. The loss in revenue was most pronounced in the sale of stamps and in customs, lotteries and traffic imports.

TIME NOT RIPE FOR PHILIPINOS' INDEPENDENCE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Dean C. Worcester, former Philippine commissioner, and secretary of state for the islands, before the senate committee investigating the Jones independence bill declared that it would be a very grave mistake for congress to enact that measure at the present time. This view was based on what he believed would be the best for the natives and for this country. He added that he needed a naval base in the waters surrounding the Philippines. Asked if he believed the Filipinos would ever be ready for independence, Mr. Worcester replied that although the natives had made more progress within a short space of time than any other people he believed that this progress would cease should the United States relinquish control of the islands.
