ACCEPTED LOCAL PULPIT**

using poison as a weapon. Stanfield residents alone have subscribed enough money to purchase 100 ounces of strychnine. The residents of Echo, Hermiston and Butter Creek have also invested in this poison and a day will be designated for its distribution.

The plan is to have the poison put out simultaneously in all sections of the west end so that the bunnies will have small chance to dodge it. Mr. Jackson will personally superintend the mixing. He uses one ounce of strychnine to six ounces of water and spread this over 15 pounds of chopped alfalfa. This he scatters in small quantities over the rabbit's country, taking precautions against its being eaten by sheep or cattle. Of all of the methods for the extermination of rabbits, Mr. Jackson thinks this the most efficacious.

Last year he visited this county also and conducted some experiments on a small scale.

**HANDCUFFED MAN PICKED UP
HERE MAKES ESCAPE AGAIN**

FUGITIVE WALKS OUT OF HOSPITAL WARD AT JAIL IN WALLA WALLA.

Batiste Ruben, the Swiss-Italian picked up here last week with handcuffs embedded in his arms, is again at large. Having been taken to Walla Walla Friday night by Immigration Officer Wells, he was placed in the hospital ward of the county jail and last evening made his second escape from the officers. This was the substance of a message received by local officers last evening over the telephone.

He had been placed in the hospital ward to receive treatment for his arms which were in a serious condition as a result of being bound round with iron bands for 19 months. He was not locked up during the day and last evening while Jailor W. J. Honoycutt had stepped into another part of the jail with a physician, the Italian walked quietly down the stairs and outside. A man seated in the office heard him walk out but thought nothing of the matter. He had only about ten minutes start of the officers but in the darkness had the advantage of them.

**7010 BOYS AND GIRLS OF
SCHOOL AGE IN THE COUNTY**

THIS NUMBER IS ABOUT THE SAME AS CENSUS OF A YEAR AGO SHOWED.

There are 7010 boys and girls of school age in Umatilla county, according to the figures received from the various districts by County Superintendent I. E. Young and checked by him. This number is just about the same as the census of a year ago showed. Of the total 3565 are boys and 3445 girls.

From the state irreducible school fund, the county receives about \$1.85 for each child of school age in the county and this number will net the county about \$13,000 from the state. In addition the county appropriates to each district \$19 for each child of school age.

The census figures show Pendleton to have 1652 children of school age. Milton-Freewater is second in the
