COUNTY FAIR AT BAKER NOT TO BE HELD THIS YEAR

GROUNDS TO BE EVENTUALLY TURNED OVER FOR AGRICULTURAL PURPOSES.

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 13.—There will be no county fair in Baker this year. This was accepted without question by the members of the Commercial club and those connected with the Baker County Fair association and the Baker County Speed association which owns the race track. William Pollman, one of the principal stockholders of the speed association, said that the fair grounds would eventually be turned over for agricultural purposes. The property has been given to the fair association for its use without charge save that the fair association has paid the taxes and has paid for the up-keep of the grounds.

Those who have been prime movers in the work of carrying on the fair said today that yesterday's action by the county court in refusing to appropriate \$1000 for the county fair has effectually stopped all efforts to hold a fair. There was some talk of getting the farmers to start a petition to the county court but the majority doubted whether this would avail, no matter how liberally it was signed.

Women May Get More Pay. ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 13.—Oregon school boards will be required hereafter to pay women teachers as much as men if a bill to be introduced in the legislature by D. H. Allen representative from Marion county, passes.

Under the present system it is asserted where men and women teachers are doing exactly the same class of work the women receive from \$5 to \$25 less each month than the men. Women teachers insist this is not fair.

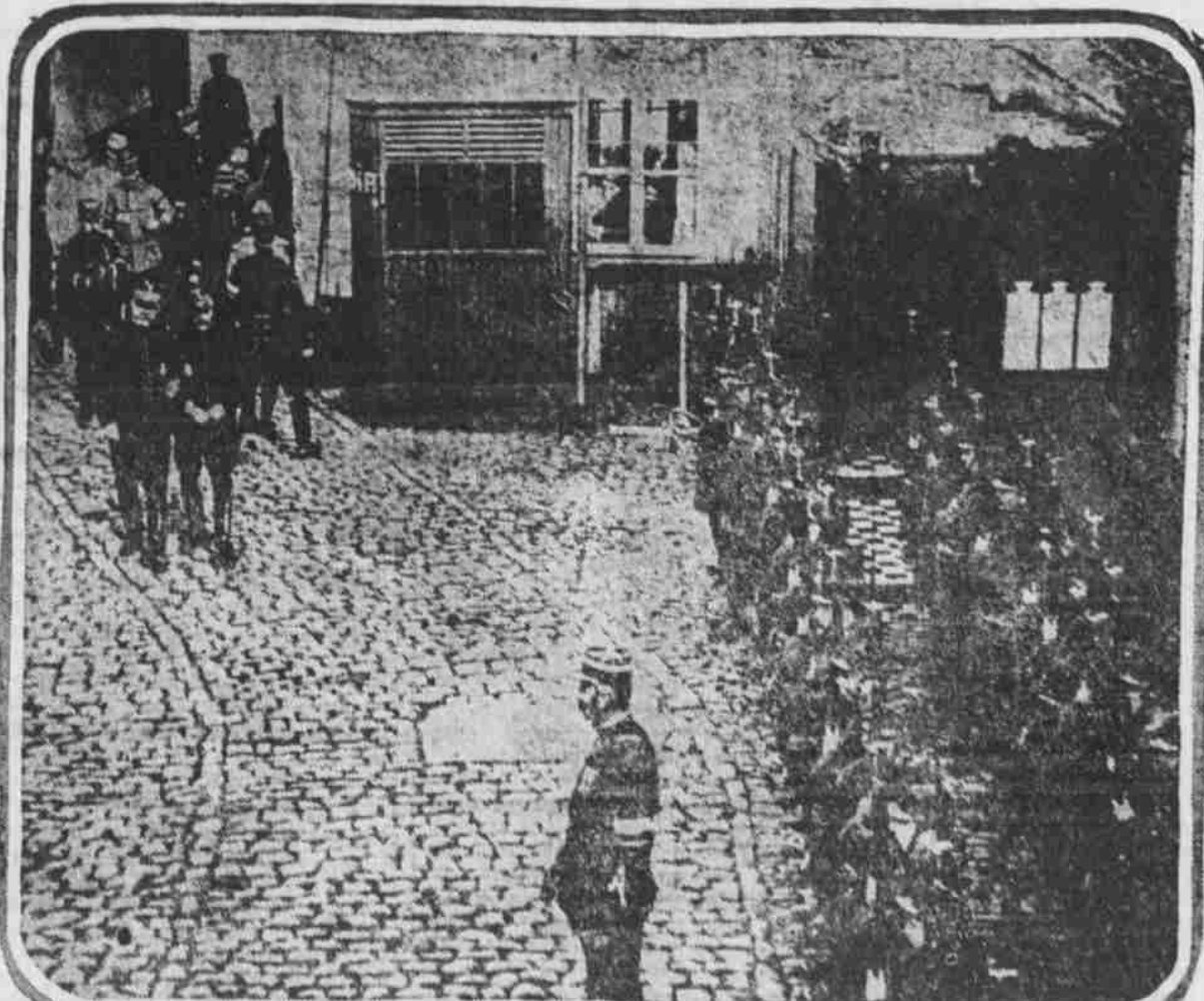
