**HOOD RIVER THEFTS MAY BE CLEARED UP**

HOOD RIVER, Jan. 12.—Chief of Police J. K. Carson believes that he has discovered a clue in the arrest of Lee Markley, Harry and Fred Williams, Saturday, that will solve the mystery of the numerous robberies that have occurred in Hood River during the last six months.

In making a search of the boys' clothing Monday afternoon, a revenue stamp was taken off an express bill of lading was found in the watch pocket of one of the boys, and thereupon Mr. Carson made a prompt investigation at the office of the American Express company in this city, and found five boxes of stolen goods that had been taken to the office Saturday and billed to the order of one of the boys at The Dalles, Ore. The boxes contained about \$150 worth of goods including canned goods, revolvers, boots and shoes, bayon, pipes, clothing and numerous other articles. The boys at first denied that it was their goods, but when confronted with the articles, confessed. It is thought by the authorities here that the boys have confederates at The Dalles who are disposing of the stolen goods.

**Lets Remarks Stand.**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—The president was informed today that certain remarks he made in his Indianapolis speech had been interpreted as an announcement of his candidacy for reelection. The president reiterated his recent declaration that he didn't mean to "start anything." It was regarded as significant that the president made no effort to correct the impression.

**2 FAMOUS BUCKERS OF THE ROUND-UP HAVE BEEN FOUND**

**ANGEL AND RAMBLING SAM DISCOVERED ON RANGE IN BAKER COUNTY.**

"Angel" and "Rambling Sam," two of the most famous of the Round-up buckers who have been missing for two years, have been found and the news of their recovery is joyful tidings to Pendleton. They were discovered on the Burnt River range of Baker county and will arrive here this afternoon.

It was a week ago that Sheriff T. D. Taylor, president of the Round-up, received a telephone message from Guy Church of Baker, stating that he believed the lost buckers were mixed up in the Ellis herd on Burnt river. Sheriff Taylor sent a detailed description of the two horses and yesterday received a second message, stating that there could be no doubt of the identity of the animals as both carried the Round-up brand as well as the brands, which were on them before they became the property of the local association. Sheriff Taylor authorized Ben Jory, a former Round-up rider, to bring the animals over and they are scheduled to arrive this afternoon.

"Angel" and "Rambling Sam" disappeared from the Manning ranch near Pilot Rock two years ago this winter and since then no information has been received concerning them. With "Isee" they had been purchased from Ted Angel of the Isee country just prior to the 1912 Round-up and it was supposed that they had tried to work their way back to their old stamping grounds. Sheriff Taylor thinks they got over the divide and strayed to Burnt river. The report from there states that they wintered with the Ellis herd a year ago.

The animals are two of the hardest buckers of the Round-up string. It was upon "Angel" that Lou Minor rode into the championship in 1912 and that was his last appearance here. He is a beautiful big bay and one of the hardest horses in the country to ride. "Rambling Sam" is a big sorrel about six years old. He is a hard bucker but not as consistent as his mate.

**Roumania Not Needed.**

PETROGRAD, Jan. 12.—The recent Russian victories in Bukovina and the occupation of Radautz and Suczawa (Bukovina) enables the Russians in their position on the banks of the Tisza, Sereth and Moldava rivers to cut off Roumania entirely from Austria-Hungary. This is the situation as outlined in dispatches received in Petrograd from the fronts.

This position of the Russians considerably alters the military and diplomatic situation, military men say, since the yielding of Transylvania to Roumania no longer depends on Austria-Hungary and any possibility of the latter invading the Russian southern province of Bessarabia and Bessarabia through Transylvania is now destroyed.

The question of Roumania's future attitude, that is whether she will join the allies, is now also less important, it is asserted, because the victorious Russian armies, in their wedge like position between Roumania and Austria-Hungary, would paralyze any hostile action of either against Russia.

Until the government built its large plant at Trollhattan, all the hydroelectric plants in Sweden were owned as private enterprises. The government has two other large plants under construction at Dalef and Forjus in Lapland, which as soon as completed will furnish the power for the state railways in northern Sweden. The waterfalls of Sweden have been calculated to contain 6,000,000 horse power, about 16 per cent being utilized at present.
