## PRESIDENT WILSON IS GRANDFATHER; SON IS BORN TO MRS. SAYRE

EVENT TAKES PLACE AT WHITE HOUSE AND EVERYBODY IS DOING WELL.

First Boy in Family Brings Smile to Face of President—Child May Be Named After His Grandfather—Christening Will Take Place Before Mother Returns Home.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—A son was born at the White House Sunday to Mrs. Francis Bowes Sayre, President Wilson's second daughter. Mrs. Sayre and the child were reported to be doing well.

The child was born at 4:30 o'clock, but the fact was not formally announced until 6 o'clock when Secretary Tammity gave out the following statement:

"Dr. Grayson, the White House physician, says that at 4:30 o'clock Mrs. Sayre gave birth to a fine boy. Everything went perfectly and both are doing well."

The boy weighed 7 1-2 pounds. President Manifests Joy. President Wilson made no effort to conceal his joy when informed that the child was a boy and that Mrs. Sayre was well. His face was wreathed in smiles for hours afterwards.

It was his first grandchild and the president had no boys of his own. Mr. Sayre, who is assistant to President Garfield of Williams College, was not at the White House when his son was born. Dr. Grayson reached him on the telephone at Williams-town, Mass., at 5 o'clock Sunday morning and he arrived here late in the evening.

The president did not go to church and Mrs. Sayre's sisters, Mrs. William G. McAdoo and Miss Margaret Wilson, with their cousin, Miss Helen Woodrow Bones, remained at the White House throughout the day.

Name for Grandfather Probable. A name had not been selected but it was expected that the child would be named for his grandfather. The christening is expected to be held in the White House before the return of Mrs. Sayre to her home in Williamstown. Congratulations poured into the White House.

Mr. and Mrs. Sayre were married at the White House November 25, 1913. After a honeymoon to Europe, they went to Williamstown to make their home. Mrs. Sayre has been visiting at the White House since Christmas.

## MARCUS AURELIUS COLUMN DAMAGED IN EARTHQUAKE.



The Marcus Aurelius column, one of the famous points of interest in Rome, was among the landmarks damaged by the earthquake of Jan. 12. The column is one of the great attractions of Rome, and is well known to Americans who visit Italy. The statue is situated in the Piazza Colonna. It is a doric column, extremely imposing, and was erected by Marcus Aurelius in 161-150 A. D. The statue is composed of twenty-eight blocks of marble, its base relief depicting the victory the emperor won in Germany. The top of the monument is reached by climbing 190 steps. On the summit is a medallion statue of St. Paul, placed there by Pope Sixtus V. The total height of the monument is 137 1-2 feet.

## STOCK BROKERS UP FOR EMBEZZLEMENT

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 18.—J. C. Wilson and B. A. Wilbrand, stock brokers, charged with embezzling some \$30,000 from their clients after closing of the New York stock exchange following the great war, appeared before Superior Judge Cabanis. They were instructed and arraigned and the cases were continued until next Saturday to be set for trial. They pleaded not guilty to the charge. It was intimated that the two men will be tried together.

BERLIN, Jan. 18.—Dr. Johannes Kaempf, speaker of the Reichstag, was present at a luncheon given at the American club which was attended by American Ambassador Gerard, American Consul General Lay and other prominent Americans. Ambassador Gerard welcomed Dr. Kaempf, who, in his response drew attention to the friendly relations between the United States and Germany and expressed the hope that they would continue undisturbed.
