These are the first photographs of the leading characters in the strange tragedy of Loris Elton Rogers, the New York lawyer, and Mrs. Ida Sniffen Walters Rogers. This peculiar case has been in the newspapers for nearly two weeks and the country has been scouring for pictures of Mrs. Walters and her husband without result until recently.

Mr. Walters was married to Arthur Walters some twelve years ago. She was then Ida Sniffen. A divorce was obtained later, and she went to Suffern, N. Y. There Rogers

who had been married to an Alabama woman some twenty years ago, met her. He had then been divorced from the southern woman, but kept up his acquaintance with her. His acquaintance with Mrs. Walters resulted in the birth of two children, one about two years old and the other less than a year old at the time of the tragedy.

But prior to this Rogers had married Miss Catherine Giddings, sister of Professor Giddings of Columbia University, perhaps the best known man in that institution. Professor Giddings has, in fact, been mentioned several times as a majorly possibility in New York City. It was Rogers' custom to leave his downtown law office early in the day for the home of the woman who had divorced him. Then he went on further uptown to Mrs. Walters' home, where he remained until 8 or 9 o'clock. Later he went to the home where his wife lived on Riverside Drive. This peculiar situation continued until Mrs. Walters, giving up hope of having Mrs. Rogers get a divorce so she might marry the lawyer, gave her two children poison and took some herself. She got well, but the children died, and now she must face charges by the grand jury of Bronx county.

HOG PRICES ARE GOING DOWNWARD

(Courtesy Sunday's Journal) PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17.—Downward trend of hog prices continues at practically all American livestock centers. The big killers of the east have the situation in their own hands and the usual wallowing of values is the outcome. The big killers of the east influence the market along the Pacific coast for the very good reason that they establish the price of hams, bacon and lard throughout the country.

Omaha packers name the price of hams, bacon and lard on the Pacific coast means that no matter how many hogs are produced in this territory there will be but a certain per cent of the trade controlled by the local product. As long as eastern interests can ship their provisions from the east and make a profit on them just so long will the demand for hogs and pork products show little growth here.

through the week the trend of the mutton and lamb trade was strong. In all lines offerings brought substantially the same prices that have been here during the last few weeks.

Action in the oats market depends very largely on the turn in wheat and corn. The morning break was to 55 3-4c for May and 53 3-8c and 53 3-8c. Local receipts were 368 cars. Shipping sales were limited to 150,000 bushels.

WHEAT MARKET VERY ERRATIC

(Saturday's Market.) CHICAGO—It was a remarkable day for the local wheat trade. The thing in order was a break of 5c in the May from the Friday close. The early range was \$1.44 1-2 to \$1.43 1-2, the first trade, and then a storm of stop orders selling which forced the break to \$1.40. There was not the necessary volume of buying orders in the market to check such a selling drive. It took the leaders and the big houses a few minutes to rally, their forces and they began taking wheat on a scale which gave the price a rebound of 3c in a few minutes. The best recovery from the low point was from \$1.43 1-2 an hour before the close, and at this point the 3/4 trade saw signs of additional selling by big individual leaders in this trade. On this there was a break of \$1.41, with the close on a rally at \$1.41 5-8, or 3 3-8c net loss from Friday's close, July wheat sold as low as \$1.23 3-4. It had nearly 2c rally at the one time and closed at \$1.25.

WHEAT MARKET VERY ERRATIC

Most of the Argentine news was bullish, the recent heavy rains causing damage in Buenos Aires and other provinces.

WHEAT MARKET VERY ERRATIC

It looked like a serious check in the bull program for corn early today, when prices had a reaction to 75c for May, 71 3-4c for July, following the violent action in wheat. An hour later the support was most remarkable, giving prices an upturn to 78 1-4c and 79 1-8c. Cables made the claim that Argentine shipments are likely to be much lighter. Claims in regard to a letup of country offerings of corn appear to be conflicting.
