MEASURE ABOLISHING LIVESTOCK SANITARY BOARD HAS NO FRIENDS

STOCKMEN DENOUNCE PLAN—NO ADVOCATES OF BILL APPEAR AT SALE.

Even Representative Olds, Parent of the Measure, Turns Against It—Delegation of Breeders of Cattle, Horses, Sheep and Goats, Appear in Favor of Board.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23.—When the question of abolishing the livestock sanitary board came up for hearing before the house livestock committee not one advocate appeared to urge the repeal of the law creating it. Representative P. P. Olds of Yamhill county was the father of the bill, but when he heard a delegation of breeders of cattle, horses, sheep, goats and swine tell how the board in its brief existence had saved the state untold thousands of dollars in loss from contagious and infectious disease, he announced that he would not insist that it pass.

William Schulerich, a Washington county dairyman, was spokesman for the protesting breeders. He pointed out that of the \$50,000 appropriation for the work of stamping out disease, \$24,000 had been turned back to the state unexpended. Rather than abolish the department he favored its existence through the employment of additional inspectors who could cover more territory and inspect more cases of suspected disease.

As it has been, the agitation for pure milk has caused an excessively large expense to dairymen who could not be supplied with a state inspector. These were obliged to employ private veterinarians to administer treatment and tests to suspected animals before they could dispose of their product.

He cited the experience of Illinois, which turned down its sanitary board resulting in a spread of disease which required federal interference to check. M. S. Shrock spoke briefly against the bill, and declared that with no state supervision, it will be impossible to ship livestock out of Oregon because adjacent states require inspection. Members of the committee felt that it would be highly injudicious to repeal the law, and instead of recommending the Olds bill for passage, suggested methods of strengthening the present law, so it would be a larger benefit to the small dairyman as well as the owner of large herds.

FESTIVAL BALLOONIST SUES FOR \$500 PRIZE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—John Watts, pilot of the "Kansas City," the balloon which won the Rose Festival ball race last June by covering 82.75 miles, sued the Rose Festival association for \$500, the amount set aside as first prize for the race. He alleges that the distance covered was determined by the race officials and the award of the prize to himself made, but that the money has not been forthcoming. Attorney J. N. Hart represents Watts, whose home is in Kansas City, Mo.

Cannot Change Dredge.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Dag C. Kingman, chief of engineers, United States Army, has reported to Senator Stone that the dredge Oregon, now at Grays Harbor, cannot be sent to Coquille river at Bandon, being needed for work in Tillamook bay.

Steel Belt Nearly Done.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 22.—The Canadian Northern Pacific will be completed so far as steel-laying is concerned on Saturday at noon. Only four or five miles remain to be laid. This is on the North Thompson, and when the last rail is laid and spiked home there will be a new belt of steel across Canada.

The last spike on the line will be driven some time in the early spring, probably by Sir Richard McBride, the premier, performing the ceremony.

BUCKEYE CONVICTS HAVE HOME RULE

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 23.—Prisoners at the Ohio penitentiary now have "home rule" government. This innovation marks the latest move in Warden P. E. Thomas' plan to get in closer touch with the convicts.

Included in the "home rule" plan is the appointment of six representatives, one from each division of the cell blocks. Each representative is subject to "recall" by the prisoners. These representatives are known as "councilmen." Each will be allowed to visit all prisoners in his "ward" during the evenings.

In this way, Warden Thomas believes they will keep in touch with the wants of their "constituents," hear their complaints and note improvements they believe would be to the benefit of the prisoners.

WAR OF PLANETS IS BLAMED FOR QUAKE

LYNN, Mass., Jan. 23.—In an address here Professor Elihu Thompson of the General Electric company announced a theory for the recent earthquake in Italy which may prove important in its future scientific bearing.

Professor Thompson declared that it was probable that the recent earthquake was caused by the pulling of three planetary bodies through the force of gravity and that the pull in three directions resulted in a crack or earthquake. According to the professor the earthquake is to be considered as a war of planets.

Besides being an inventor Professor Thompson maintains a private observatory on his estate in Swampscott, where he spends much time in the study of astronomy.

ONE DAY OF REST IN EVERY SEVEN

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 22.—Private prosecutors stand a gambler's chance of earning a \$25 fee in pushing to court violations of a proposed law introduced in the house by Representative Horne of Multnomah county making it unlawful for any employer to work his employees more than six days a week.

The bill prescribes that every employer of labor shall designate which of his employees shall have their holidays on certain week days in cases where Sunday work is required and shall post lists, also filing a copy with the commissioner of labor.

Exceptions to the "one day of rest in seven" idea are made only in the cases of bakery workers who sort sponge and watchmen and furnace tenders.

Breaking this proposed law is punishable.
