HOG MARKET IS 15 CTS HIGHER

PORTLAND, Ore.—North Portland was generally showing a better feeling in the entire livestock trade for the day. While the general market for hogs was established at \$6.70, or a dime above the previous price, there was one load sold early in the day at \$6.75, or an advance of 15c.

Run of hogs in the yards was rather liberal for the day although less than last Monday's big total put in appearance this morning.

Outside buyers took hold of hogs rather well at the opening of the week's trade and this was considerable aid to the situation in the local trade.

Cow Market is Higher. Market for cows was rather firm in the North Portland yards at the opening of the week's trade. Sales were generally reported at an advance of a quarter for top quality.

Run of cattle in the yards was quite lively over Sunday, total showing being 1225 head compared with 578 last Monday and 529 head a year ago for this same day.

Market for steers was also slightly better with advances of about a dime over last week's prices, although to some extent this was aided by the better quality offerings.

CHICAGO WHEAT AT HIGH MARK

(Monday's Market.)

CHICAGO.—President Wilson's speech yesterday was indirectly responsible for the establishing of a new high wheat price record at \$1.46 1-2 for May and a closing at \$1.45 3-4, that was 1-4 cent better than yesterday. July closed 2-4c up.

Market for wheat was firm from the jump this morning, with May starting the day at an advance of 3-8c and July 1-4c. The high mark was reached early in the day.

There was a firmer market abroad with most values higher, and this in itself was an influence of importance.

Million Bandages Is Aim. NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Commander Eva Booth of the Salvation Army is inaugurating a campaign whereby she hopes to employ 100 girls at a rate of 10 weeks, and as a result of their labor, provide bandages for 1,000,000 soldiers. A fund of \$6000 is necessary, and the basis of the appeal for this amount is that the money is to be devoted to a genuine "100 per cent" charity.

The Salvation Army for some time has been carrying on an "old line" campaign. As a result a quantity of linen, sufficient to provide bandages for 1,000,000 soldiers, has been received from all parts of the country.

GERMAN AIRMEN SAID TO HAVE USED FRENCH FLAGS. ATTACKERS ON DUNKIRK DECLARED TO HAVE FOOLED ALLIED TROOPS. LONDON, Jan. 25.—Charges that German airmen painted the French flag on aeroplanes and wore uniforms of the allies' armies when they flew over the allied lines Friday and dropped bombs on Dunkirk were contained in dispatches from Flanders. The fact that twelve aviators, who participated were British, French and Belgian uniforms and carried the French flag, say the dispatches, enabled them to fly over the allied lines without detection. It was reported the pilot and observers of one of the German Taube aeroplanes which was brought down Friday were executed because they were British and French uniforms. The press bureau had no confirmation of the report.
