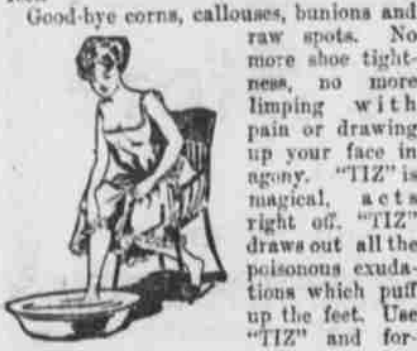

REFUGEES HAVE SIX NEWSPAPERS PRINTED AT SAN ANTONIO, TEX.

PAGES ARE EAGERLY READ BY MEXICANS FOR NEWS FROM THEIR COUNTRY.

5000 Refugees Are Making Their Homes in Texas City Pending Outcome of Trouble in Mexico and Awaiting Time They Can Return—Do Not Want Intervention.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Jan. 25.—Six daily newspapers printed here in Spanish are eagerly read for news from Mexico by the big Mexican population of San Antonio and vicinity. Five thousand or more refugees are making their homes here pending final settlement of the revolutions and counter revolutions in the republic south of the Rio Grande. Of the six dailies, three espouse the cause of Carranza, two champion Villa and one favors Felix Diaz.

The Carranza consulate here announced it paid out in telegraph tolls about \$1000 monthly for telegraphic advice from various Mexican points and exchanges with Washington. These dispatches appear in the local Carranzista papers and are copied by the opposition which interprets them in footnotes according to the Villista or Diazista standpoint. The newspapers bristle with news and comment on the Mexican situation, often going as far as to attack Carranza.

La Prensa, a Villista organ, published a cablegram from Madrid reporting that a paper there thought the United States government ought to intervene in Mexico in the name of the Monroe Doctrine and humanity. Intervention is deeply and sincerely hated by the Mexican refugees here. They want none of it and declare that if the United States intervene it will involve the Washington government in a great war which will eventually drag in Europe and Asia. These refugees maintain that Mexico will work out its own salvation and they prefer this method, even at the cost of many lives.

NORTH YAKIMA PEOPLE ASK MONEY FOR FAIR

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Jan. 27.—The state fair committee of the Yakima Commercial club has forwarded to Governor Ernest Lister and Senator H. H. Wende of Yakima county, a recommendation that the legislature put the state fair on a fraction of a mill tax basis so as to provide annually for expenses and improvements the sum of \$25,000, and has approved the governor's recommendation that the present legislature appropriate \$50,000 for the biennial of which \$20,000 shall be available for expenses and the balance for improvements.

Mourner Dies Suddenly.

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 27.—Becoming suddenly ill as he was about to enter the home of the late S. B. Liggett, secretary of the Pennsylvania lines west of Pittsburgh, to attend the funeral services, John H. Dury, cashier of the Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Chicago & St. Louis railroad was carried into a neighboring residence and died within 15 minutes from heart failure.

WHAT the Press Agent Has to Say of Present and Coming Attractions

David Belasco's great play of army life and Indian warfare, "The Girl I Left Behind Me."

The story of "The Girl I Left Behind Me" takes place in and about Fort Kenyon, a lonely frontier outpost where a small detachment of cavalry is stationed under the command of Major Burleigh, a bluff, hale soldier, the apple of whose eye is little Dick, his motherless son, and the pet of the post. Years before little Dick's mother deserted the major for another army officer whose name the major does not know. But he has carried on an insistent search for the man and sworn to kill him. The erring wife, cast off by the man who lured her away has died of a broken heart some time before in a distant city without disclosing her faithless lover's identity. General Kenyon after whom the post is named, comes during Indian summer, to visit and inspect the little garrison. He is accompanied by his daughter Kate Kenyon, whose engagement to Lieut. Parlow, Major Burleigh's second in command is about to be announced. Lieut. Hawkesworth, another young officer of the post also loves Kate and she secretly returns his affection. Her hand, however, is pledged to Parlow and she will not repudiate her promise. At a gay Halloween party a breathless scout rides furiously into the post. "The Blackfeet have taken to the warpath," he cries. It is the fulfillment of a threat made by old Scarbrow, the chief of the tribe, some time before, when Major Burleigh at the behest of the government, had forbidden the Blackfeet to hold their Immemorial Sun Dance.

The announcement of the scout throws the garrison into instant activity. The women are ordered into quarters and the men take up the defense at the stockade. But the number of defenders is pitifully puny to oppose the advancing hordes of redskins ferociously determined to avenge their fancied wrongs. Help must be obtained from Fort Assinaboin, the nearest fort where there is a strong garrison. The task of riding to secure the needed help, a mission that means almost certain death, is dodged by Lieut. Parlow. Hawkesworth then volunteers. The bag of dispatches, telling of the post's plight, is handed him by Kate Kenyon. As she slips the straps over his shoulders, she lets her arms linger there and whispers, "I love you."

With Hawkesworth gone the stockade is made as strong as possible. Before another day has passed the war-whoops of the Indians and their blood-curdling battle cries are heard. Defense is an almost hopeless task from the very first. At last it seems that the end has come. The brave old general with a white, set face, hands his daughter a pistol. She understands and prepares to kill herself when the garrison falls. But suddenly a trumpet call is heard. The twelfth cavalry sweep to the rescue driving the Blackfeet, panic-stricken before them. Hawkesworth, now that Parlow's craven nature is exposed, is accepted as Kate's future husband. Major Burleigh receives a fabled miniature from the city where his wife died. It is the picture of her betrayer which has just been found. Burleigh with a savage oath recognizes the face as that of Parlow. He is about to execute summary vengeance upon the wrecker of his happiness when Margaret Kenyon, the general's elder daughter interposes. The slaying of Parlow is prevented and ultimately the gray-haired major and Margaret Kenyon find happiness together.

Harvard to Aid Belgians.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Jan. 27.—The Harvard University Corporation has set aside \$100,000 to aid Belgian professors who have been driven from their own land by warfare. It was announced last night. Refugee educators will come to Cambridge at the beginning of the next college year to take charge of courses at Harvard and they will be paid for their work from this special fund.

The coming of the Belgians is the result of action taken by President Lowell, who, after a large number of professors who taught at the University of Louvain were driven from the city, called that Harvard University would care for some of them if they wished to teach in America.
