Bills Introduced in Oregon Senate

The Measures Below Were Introduced in the Senate at Yesterday's Session.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 29.—The following bills were introduced in the senate:

S. B. 124, substitute for S. B. 22, by horticultural committee—Amending Industrial Welfare Commission act to give commission authority to grant overtime in case of emergency in certain industries.

S. B. 127, by Kellaher—Relating to the printing of the Oregon supreme court reports. Carries \$10,000 appropriation.

S. B. 128, by Kellaher—Relative to regulating newspapers and the publication of nothing but the truth.

S. B. 129, by Perkins—To place employees of the bridge and ferries department of Multnomah county under civil service.

S. B. 130, by Leinenweber—To repeal section 5175, Lord's Oregon laws, which provides for the annual maintenance and insurance of the state pilot schooner at the mouth of the Columbia river.

S. B. 137, by Moser—To prevent discrimination in the payment of salaries between men and women teachers in the public schools.

S. B. 138, by ways and means committee—Regulates term and compensation of supreme court reporter.

COYOTES SPREAD RABIES TO DOGS AT LA GRANDE

CAMPAIN IS STARTED BY POLICE AGAINST ANIMALS IN CITY.

LA GRANDE, Ore., Jan. 29.—That mad coyotes which have been threatening livestock in the vicinity of Starkey, have scattered their dangerous mania to dogs in La Grande has become almost an established fact and city officials last night launched a campaign against dogs. That rabies were present in certain coyotes killed at Starkey recently is an established fact and that dogs have been discovered in La Grande the past few days with every outward indication of being mad, is also a fact; hence the campaign to remove the dangers. It is believed that by beginning now the dreaded malady can be stamped out. The mountains are apparently alive with infected coyotes, which, during the dormant state, have no fear of man or beast and come close to farm houses, where they nip domestic dogs, they in turn spreading the disease to other dogs and in that way, it is explained, the spread has reached La Grande in isolated cases. Prompt action, it is hoped, will stamp it out. City Manager Latky and Chief of Police Oral are now working on plans to reduce the dangers.
