**Steamer Is Destroyed.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 1.—The sinking by German warships of the steamer Drumuir, owned by the Hind, Rolf company, of San Francisco, is reported in letters from J. C. Eagles, captain of the ship. He is now at San Antonio, Argentina. The letters assert a German squadron of five warships and three colliers, under Admiral Von Spee, scuttled the Drumuir December 6th. All but two German ships were themselves sunk two days later by Admiral Sturdee's British squadron. The Drumuir was sunk because it flew the British flag. The ship was valued at \$75,000 and the cargo at \$100,000. The Drumuir's crew was transferred to the German steamer Seydlitz and landed at San Antonio.

OREGON CITY, Ore., Feb. 1.—Yellow after 69 years, but still legible, a copy of the first newspaper printed on the Pacific coast, the Oregon Spectator, will be sent to the Panama-Pacific exposition and occupy a prominent place in the Coos county exhibit.

The paper is the property of Jack McDonald, of Marshfield. It has been framed to protect it from further wear. The first issue of the Spectator appeared in February, 1846. It was followed by the Argus and the Enterprise. The Enterprise, established in 1866, is the only one of the three still published.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 2.—The following bills were introduced in the house:  
H. B. 445, by Blanchard—Fixing rights of assignors in disposing of bankrupt estates.  
H. B. 446, by committee on education—Safeguarding tenure of office of teachers in merged school districts.  
H. B. 447, by Michelbook—Requiring state maps be referred to Oregon geologic board for correction.  
H. B. 448, by Wentworth—Prohibiting trespass upon railroad property.  
H. B. 449, by Stanfield—To regulate pawnbrokers.  
H. B. 450, by committee on banking—Defining trust companies and regulating their activities.

### Bills Introduced in Oregon Senate

The Measures Below Were Introduced in the Senate at Yesterday's Session.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 2.—The following bills were introduced in the senate:  
S. B. 160, by Leinenweber—An act to provide for bounty on seals.  
S. B. 161, by Kellner—To simplify procedure in district and justice courts.  
S. B. 162, by Cusick—An act to regulate trust companies.  
S. B. 162, by Moser—To provide for the publication, distribution, etc., of session laws, senate and house journals, etc.  
S. B. 164, by Moser—To authorize an attachment of amount covered by a policy of insurance.  
S. B. 165, by Strayer—To reimburse Sol Friedenthal in the sum of \$435.  
S. B. 166, by Strayer—To give to county courts right to determine the number of papers in which delinquent tax list shall be published.

### 80,000 Paving Blocks Ordered.

ST. HELENS, Feb. 2.—John Phillips of this city, has just received an order from Jeffrey & Burton for 80,000 paving blocks for use on the contract awarded him last week for paving a portion of Front street. Block makers here who have been idle for months like this as an omen of the opening of the market for Belgian blocks.

### OHIO CITIES ARE FACING FLOODS

DAYTON, Ohio, Feb. 1.—With flood prevention work tied up in litigation, Dayton, Hamilton and other Ohio cities are facing conditions similar to that previous to the floods in 1913. The great Miami river has risen from four to six feet in two days. Ice floes have been dynamited here. The levees are being strengthened. A serious flood is predicted unless freezing weather comes.

### Bridegrooms are Stingy.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 29.—Bridegrooms are holding tight to the purse strings these days than they did at the time the mothers and fathers of the present generation entered into wedlock.  
"Giving \$5, and usually \$10, was the custom of bridegrooms years ago," said Bishop Owen B. Corrigan, when talking to his congregation recently at the high mass in St. Gregory's Catholic church. "Now we priests are lucky if we get \$1 for a wedding ceremony."  
"The older priests of this city," the bishop continued, "thought nothing of it to tell a young bridegroom after the wedding ceremony. 'Here, young fellow, you make a donation of \$10' and they got it. Tell a young bridegroom these days to make a donation of \$10 and he will tell you that he 'will go where it can be done cheaper.'"  
"The faith of the young folks in the olden days was strong and they realized that the church had to shoulder heavy expenses."

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—Directors of the mail order house of Sears, Roebuck & Co. arranged to "cut a melon" Saturday. A 25 per cent dividend, amounting to \$10,000,000, probably will be declared.
