Britain Has Year's Food. LONDON, Feb. 3.—In a booklet entitled "England's Food Supply in War Time," Dr. R. H. Rew, head of the bureau of statistics of the board of agriculture, declares that England is safe at least for a year, no matter what happens. "Bread," he points out "can be made from other cereals than wheat. By the simple expedient of altering the popular type of loaf, the country could add 10 per cent to its wheat supply while as a food it would gain in nutritious elements."

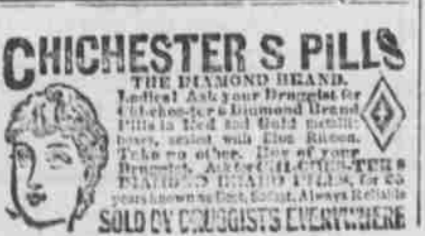

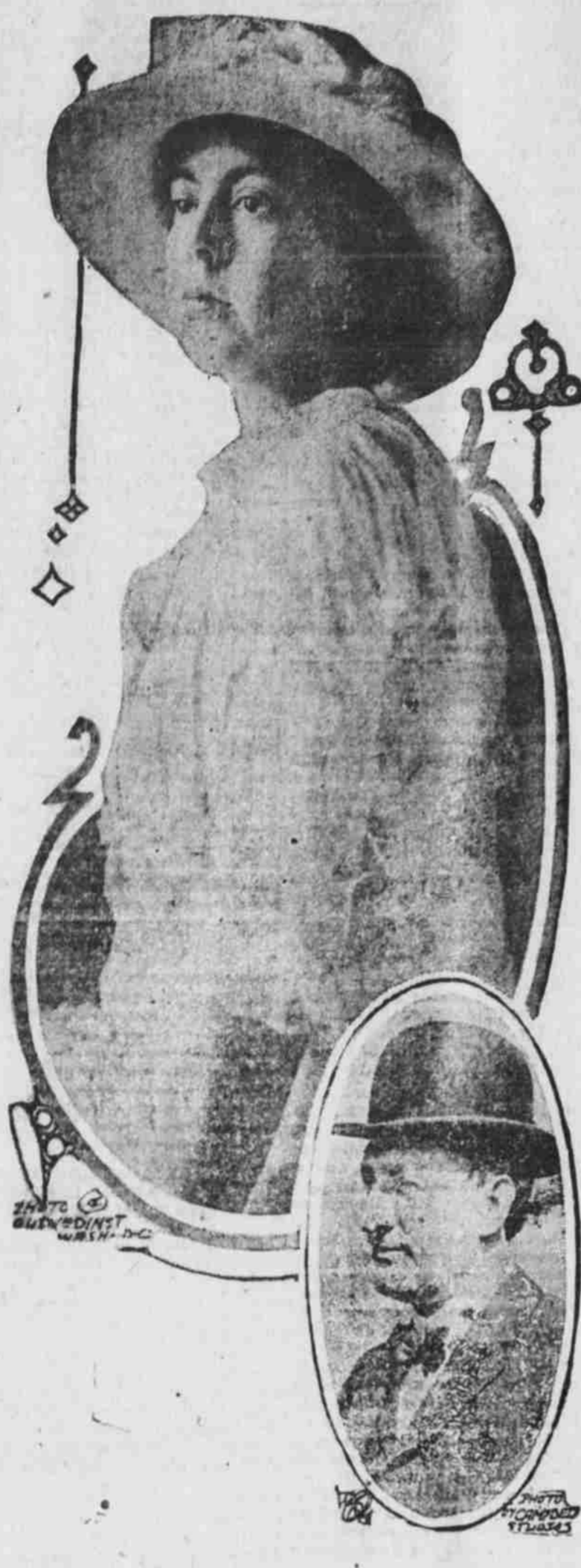

MILL TAX LEVY FOR GOOD ROADS CUT ONE HALF

HOUSE COMMITTEE DETERMINES ON REDUCTION AFTER AN OPEN MEETING.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 4.—Reduction of the proposed 1 mill general road levy to half a mill was determined upon by the house roads and highways committee in an open meeting which was attended by nearly 100 good roads enthusiasts from many parts of the state.

This is the chief road bill now before the legislature, and is the first general measure of the scope it exemplifies. By dividing the burden of road construction between the state at large, 40 per cent and the county, 40 per cent, and owners of property benefited, in proportion to the benefit, 20 per cent, the bill proposes to suggest a comprehensive plan which may be taken advantage of at the option of property owners of the various road districts created by them.

Mr. Covert and Attorney Roberts of Salem both spoke for the bill, showing how the proceeds of the general levy, matched by county appropriation afforded a system of road construction that would equitably distribute the cost.

It was at the suggestion of Governor Withycombe that the reduction from 1 mill to half a mill was decided upon, Mr. Covert voluntarily changing the bill in the light of the determination of the legislature to accomplish economy.

The committee made several amendments in H. B. 70, introduced by Mr. Lewis and drawn up by Thomas H. McCusker of Portland, who represents a number of automobile truck concerns. This bill allows the operation of trucks on public highways after the payment of license fees based on the tonnage of the vehicle. The tonnage scale is: Twenty dollars per ton up to 10 tons, and \$50 per ton for trucks in excess of the 10 ton capacity. Franklin T. Griffith, president of

WHEAT RECORD MADE AND LOST

(Wednesday's Market.) CHICAGO.—A new high record for May wheat was established at \$1.66 a bushel or 1c above the record of yesterday, but the market dropped to \$1.55 1-4 at one time and closed at \$1.59 1-4 or 5 2-4c a bushel below the level of yesterday.

Market for wheat opened with a loss of 5c for May and 2-4c for the July, but prices showed a sky-rocket character during the early session when longs began to liquidate and the big interests tried to shake out the fallenders. In this they were successful because when prices began to drop rapidly there was an abundance of wheat offering for sale.

Foreign interests continued to purchase heavily of wheat at Atlantic coast and gulf points and considerable business passed at Winnipeg. WHEAT. May—Open, 100; high, 166; low, 156 3-4; close, 159 1-4. July—Open, 138 3-4; high, 143 5-8; low, 137 1-4; close, 138 5-8.

WATERS REcede AFTER REACHING HIGH MARK—FREEZING WEATHER COMES.

PITTSBURG, Feb. 3.—All danger of serious flood in the upper Ohio region is passed. The waters began to recede today.

CLEVELAND, Feb. 3.—Alarm due to the rapid rise of practically every river and stream in Ohio, subsided. With freezing weather the waters are subsiding. Comparatively small damage has been done.

R. of the District of Columbia. Plans will be made for the national G. A. R. reunion which will be held here next September or October.
