PORTLAND, Ore.—Hog market was depressed with rather heavy supplies offering for sale at North Portland today. While two loads of stock, freight free to Puget sound, were sold to Northern buyers at \$7, the general market here was not above \$6.90, or a full dime below the best prices of yesterday.

LIKES GERMANY, SO ENGLAND DISLIKES HER



NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—"The longest way round is the shortest way home," in the opinion of Ferne Rogers the American actress, who after being ousted from her part in "Beauty and the Beast" at the Drury Lane Theatre, London, for her pro-German statements, had to cross the Atlantic to New York to get passage to Berlin. She will sail from here for Italy on the first steamer and will make her way thence to the German capital by rail. Miss Rogers' friends are urging her to protest to President Wilson at the way she was treated at the American embassy in London, where it is said, she was refused a passport to go to Germany direct because the official feared England might be offended.

Stories From the War Zone

PETROGRAD, Jan. 25.—(By Mail to New York.)—A popular subscription is being raised in Odessa for a suitable monument to the remarkable heroism of Mile Ludomila Alexinsky, of the Red Cross.

In the battle of Gumbinnen in August, while helping to carry a wounded man out of the line of fire, she was hit by a bullet in the hand. Immediately after her recovery she was transferred to the army in Galicia where she was present in three battles, during one of which she was under fire for 17 hours.

On another occasion a doctor whom she was assisting was killed by a shell, his body being blown against Mile Alexinsky with such force that she was stunned. After a brief rest she again returned to the front and helped to succor the numerous German wounded left behind at Ragow. Later she went to south Poland, and at the storming of Petrokov she was again wounded, this time in the

shoulder. Blood poisoning ensued and she died in great agony.

Mile Alexinsky was the seventeenth Russian Red Cross nurse either killed in battle or died of wounds.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of his literary career was spent by A. L. Kuppin, Russia's most popular author in the trenches along the Vistula. It was while a pupil of the Moscow military school that Kuppin began his activities as a short-hand writer. His first attempt nearly resulted in his expulsion from the school, the director finally consented to his continuing his studies only on condition that he relinquish the idea of becoming an author. "It is much harder to be an efficient officer than a mere writer," observed the director.

Kuprin was graduated with the rank of lieutenant, but resigned shortly afterwards. He enlisted in the army again on the outbreak of hostilities with Germany.

KICKED AROUND RAILROAD WILL BE SOLD AT AUCTION

CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 11.—Twelve thousand stockholders of the Wheeling & Lake Erie railroad, Ohio's biggest financial nut uncracked, are waiting patiently for April when some kind person with \$36,500,000 will be asked to come along and settle their difficulties by purchasing the most kicked around little railroad in the United States.

Hope that the state of Ohio would purchase the 460 miles of track, 9700 freight cars, 84 passenger coaches, 210 locomotives and various other equipment was today definitely abandoned and the "outfit" will be put on the auction block in April.

Eighteen thousand five hundred dollars is the required cash to cover underlying indebtedness and \$18,000,000 that may be assumed by the purchaser is described as just "plain indebtedness."

Most of the stockholders are easterners. Eleven of the 34 years of the Wheeling & Lake Erie's history have seen it in the hands of a receiver. Twice it emerged only to fall again in 1908.

The road was born in 1879 by Canadian capitalists who foresaw the possibility of tapping the southeastern Ohio coal fields with an outlet to Lake Erie. The Canadian pioneers sold out to New York capitalists who went receiver in 1885. Colonel Myron T. Herrick, who of late retired as ambassador to France was appointed receiver and organized a new company which sold out to Gould interests in 1902. In 1908 the Wheeling & Lake Erie again went into the hands of the courts and has there rested ever since.

The little town of Brewster, O., was founded when the W. & L. E. car shops were opened there. If the road quits business Brewster will quit too. The road now operates ten passenger trains and is a valuable artery to Canton, Zanesville, Toledo and a score of other Ohio towns and cities.

PRESIDENT INVITED FOR CELLO OPENING

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Senator Lane presented a request to the president that he visit the Cello canal opening day, May 9. The president's decision was deferred.

An objection by Republican Leader Mann prevented consideration by the house of the claim of Joe Davis, who lost an arm and eye by a powder explosion in the Cello canal. Representative Sinnott showed Davis received only \$720 of which \$285 went for medical attention. "That is a pretty speech for a jury, but not for statesmen," said Mann.

Pork Chops Are Cheaper.

BAKER, Ore., Feb. 11.—A decided cut in the retail as well as the wholesale price of pork was made. Pork chops, which for months have been selling at 20 cents a pound, are now being retailed at 17 1/2 cents a pound. Pork shoulders now are retailed at 15 cents instead of 17 1/2 cents, and pork roasts at 15 cents instead of 18 cents.

Pork sides are bringing the hog-raisers 10 1/2 cents now, a cut of 1 1/2 cents a pound having been made today. A reduction in the wholesale offerings of steers of 1 cent a pound also was made.

News of Troops Barred.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 11.—An order has been issued by the Canadian censor prohibiting the dispatch by telegraph of any information as to the movement of the second Canadian contingent. All the newspaper editors throughout British Columbia have been notified that anything containing such news will be refused.

These precautions have been taken at the direct request of the British war office, it having been asserted that there was too much publicity given the first overseas force on the occasion of its departure. The notification at this time indicates that the troops now in training are to be moved in a short time.
