Prof. Lyman Here.
Hon. W. D. Lyman passed through the city this morning on his way home from Echo to Walla Walla. Mr. Lyman addressed the young people at Echo yesterday morning on the life, character and services of Abraham Lincoln. In the evening he gave an entertaining address on "The Romance and General History of the Columbia River."

Husband Failed to Provide.
Alleging that her husband, L. A. Williams of this city, has never given her any money or bought her any clothes since they were married in Grand Junction, Colo., in May, 1905, but has spent most of his earnings over the bar, Winnie F. Williams today filed suit for divorce. She charges also that he is morose, sour and sullen by temperament and has frequently left her for a month at a time. Fee and Fee are her attorneys.

False Alarm Turned In.
The fire department was called forth last evening about 9 o'clock by an alarm turned in from box 25 at the corner of South Main and High streets. A false alarm it proved. Whoever broke the glass and pulled the lever disappeared soon afterwards, nearby residents hearing him running away rapidly. The alarm was evidently some person's conception of a joke but the joke will prove serious if his identity is learned, as the city ordinance provides a severe penalty for such acts.

Will Oil Sand for Experiment.
The county court will this spring oil a stretch of sandy road in the west end of the county as an experiment and, if the experiment proves successful, some of the principal roads in that part of the county will be improved in that manner. The county court was in the west end yesterday and decided to leave the selection of the road to be oiled to Commissioner Waterman and the road supervisors in that section. A stretch about a mile and a half long will be oiled. The court also inspected the recently traveled road between Stanfield and Echo.

Suit to Quiet Title.
To quiet title to the northeast quarter of section 22, township 3, north of range 31, which he has held openly and notoriously for years, H. H. Wesel today brought suit against Robert and Lucy Walker, the Lombard Investment Co., Umatilla county, Charles S. Jackson, receiver of the insolvent National Bank of Pendleton, the heirs of Jeremiah Barnhart, O'Brien W. Bright, Frank Kempe, Alexander Bryant, L. C. Tread and Abraham M. Hyatt, all of whom claim some right in the land. Mr. Wesel is represented by Fee and Fee.

Child Welfare Week.
From February 17 to February 20 inclusive will be Child Welfare week in Oregon and preparations are being made here through the Parent-Teacher organizations here to carry on a flag sale for the purpose of raising funds with which to carry on the work in the state. The move is under the direction of the Oregon Congress of Mothers and the Parent-Teacher associations. The plan here is for all of the Parent-Teacher associations to combine in the work. They have agreed to take 500 flags at 10 cents each and they will be sold during the last four days of next week.

Fire Department Criticized.
Considerable criticism has been expressed against the fire department during the past few days for the recklessness with which the auto truck has been driven about the streets while the firemen were out for fresh air and practice. Yesterday afternoon the truck was driven down Court street and on to Main at a speed

dangerous to pedestrians and teams, and more so because no warning horn was blown. If the practice must be had, some of the citizens feel that the truck should be kept off the crowded streets and that proper warning should be given of its approach.

Divorce Is Granted.
Mary Heuberger has been granted a divorce from her husband, John Heuberger, by Judge Phelps.

A decree of divorce was granted today by Judge Phelps in the case of Barnes vs. Barnes.

Mrs. Myrtle Moller, who formerly lived in this city, has returned from Oakland, California, to accept the position of head saleslady at the Style millinery.

Suit to Collect.
A suit to collect \$450, interest and attorney fees, was filed today in the circuit court by E. T. Holland against J. D. Holden, Carter & Smythe being attorneys for the plaintiff.

Straw Leads to Self.
Alleging that he delivered to G. S. Holmington 80 loads of straw during the winter and was to receive six dollars a load, Peter Zedes has commenced suit for a balance of \$304.50 alleged to be due. Fee and Fee are his attorneys.

Deserted Month After Marriage.
Married in Walla Walla in October 1907, and deserted during the November of the same year is the story told by Lillie May Goodrich in her suit for divorce against her husband, Leonard Goodrich filed today. She asks also for sole title to land she owned at the time of her marriage. S. D. Peterson of Milton is her attorney.

Will Leave For Frisco.
Dr. M. S. Kern and wife will leave for San Francisco tomorrow on No. 17 to attend a meeting of the executive committee of the Panama-Pacific Dental congress. Dr. Kern is a member of the committee on organization for Oregon. Incidentally he will also take in the Lumbermen's convention, which is to be held the 17th and 19th inclusive.

Fare to San Francisco.
Walter Adams, local agent for the Northern Pacific has received the schedule of rates that will be in effect between here and San Francisco during the fair. The round trip fare from here to the exposition city, by rail or steamer, will be \$40.45 for the 30-day limit, and \$44.70 for the 90 day limit.

Streets Flushed Again.
The remonstrance against the sweeping of the streets has resulted in calling the flushers forth again to cleanse the main thoroughfares and the change in policy is one greatly appreciated by the merchants and citizens in general. Many favorable comments were heard today upon the substitution of the flusher for the sweeper.

69 Autos at Sale.
There were 69 automobiles at the Jack McCarty ranch yesterday during the sale of the Mentzer-Elliott equipment and the crowd present was probably the largest at any sale held in the county in recent years. Many Pendleton people were numbered among the throng. All of the equipment was sold and bidding was quite lively. The owners of the stock were well satisfied with the prices received.

Jay Estate Probated.
Mrs. Phoebe Jay, widow of the late James C. Jay, was today appointed administratrix of the estate which is valued at \$1200. The heirs are Mrs. Jay, Isaac Jay of this city, a son, Gertrude Alice Keator of Nebraska, a granddaughter, Dean Chambers of Canada and Harry Chambers of this city, grandsons. John Kimbrell, S. P. Hetchin and John Bentley have been named as appraisers of the estate.

Mrs. Kate Sensney Dies.
Mrs. Kate Sensney, an aged lady who has been living in Pendleton for several years, died yesterday morning at 10:45 at her home, 400 West Alta street, death being due to senile infirmities. The funeral was held this afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Baker chapel, Rev. C. A. Hodshire of the Methodist church officiating. Mrs. Sensney was 70 years old. She came here from Indiana.

Peterson Opens Baseball Game.
Junner Peterson, star third baseman on the Pendleton pennant winning team last season, will tonight open an automatic baseball game in the room on Main street formerly occupied by the Pendleton Tribune. The game is a new invention and has caught the popular fancy everywhere. An automatic arm does the pitching and the man at bat swings just as he does in a game. The ball strikes a canvas which is labeled to determine the score.

Egg Is 6-1-4 by 9 Inches.
VANCOUVER, Wash., Feb. 13.—A pullet, only five months old, has set a record by laying an egg that weighed a quarter of a pound. It measures 6-1-4 by 9 inches. The fowl is owned by A. Woolf, of Lake Shore. It is a Rhode Island Red.
