### HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETES ARE GETTING INTO FINE FORM

#### CALL OF SPRING BRINGS OUT BOYS TO TRAIN FOR COMING SEASON.

With the call of spring many of the high school athletes are now getting out in their track suits, and taking prolonged hikes across neighboring hills. The track behind the school building is in constant use during the evening hours after school for the purpose of pole vaulting, jumping, hurdling and weight throwing.

Arnold Minnis, the prominent high school miler, has been getting out for some time and is already in excellent

shape. It is his great hope to bring home the eastern Oregon medal for his school this year, and there will probably be excellent chances for his winning.

There will be a greater number of men this year for the athletic field than ever before in the history of the high school, and it is thought by Coach Livingston that among the great amount of material there will probably be a great deal of efficient talent that has not been manifest yet in the high school athletics.

Besides the new material, most of the old track men are still in the school, and with the advantage of their experience and the new talent which will be in practice this year it is highly probable that the local high school will once more bring home the eastern Oregon championship as they did last year.

Invents Safe Combination.

Cabinet Discusses Situation.  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—All international complications with which the United States is now confronted were considered by the president and his cabinet today. Bryan was present and he submitted to the president the text of the second reply from Great Britain regarding the shipping protest of the United States. Extended negotiations over the matter is expected to continue. The cabinet gave particular attention to the note presented by von Bernstorff in which the offer was made in behalf of Germany to abandon plans of an attack on British merchantmen if England would remove restrictions on food shipments to Germany. It was feared here that the prospect for relieving the strained situation resulting from this controversy was dim.

## NEWS OF FARM AND RANGE

Mule Sale Feb. 24 — A. Wade, a prominent resident of Wallowa county, was here yesterday arranging for the sale of a carload of mules on February 24. The mules are of good grade and are to be sold at a public sale at the Oregon Feed Yard in this city. Mr. Wade is a resident of Enterprise and says the snowfall in Wallowa county has been less than usual this winter but that there is no lack of moisture there.

Farmers Holding Wheat—Checking up the wheat in the warehouse at Walla Walla reveals that about 25 per cent of the crop remains in the hands of the farmers, and that there is still some good sized lots in the warehouses.

Among those yet unsold are Thomas Martin, 25,000 bushels; George Struthers, 20,000 bushels; Lyons, 90,000; Welch and Harvey, 30,000; Dan Donovan, 20,000; Joe Harvey, 25,000.

Milton Man Trades—A transfer in real estate was reported this week by L. Couch, real estate dealer of Wallowa, in which J. M. Chapman exchanged his ranch on Bear creek for an acreage tract near Milton belonging to Boyd Johnson.

Mr. Chapman is a pioneer in the Wallowa valley, having resided upon his place here for 20 years. He intends to devote his time in his new home to raising fruit and garden and to the poultry business. Mr. and Mrs. Chapman will leave in a short time for Milton. They have a large circle of friends here who regret to see them leave here.

Mr. Johnson will convert his new place here into a stock ranch. He formerly lived in Lower Valley but has spent the past few years at Milton.—Wallowa Sun.

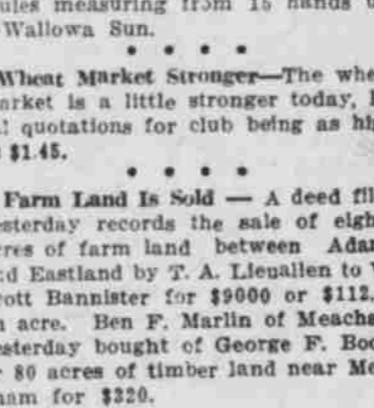

Kaiser Would be Friendly.  
THE HAGUE, Feb. 15.—The Kaiser is irritated at the growth of feeling against Americans in Berlin. He let the capital know he strongly disapproved of some of the angry comments of the newspapers. As a result the press is more restrained in discussing the American note regarding the extension of the war zone. Semi-official confirmation has been received to the report that Ambassador Gerard has been invited by the emperor to confer with him on the eastern battlefield. Gerard has accepted. He will accompany Chancellor Von Bethmann-Holweg.
