LOCAL MANUFACTURING PLANTS VERY BUSY

Regarding progress by the Empire Mfg. Co. which has taken over the plant of the Pendleton Iron works the following statement is made by the management:

"We will build an office building and remodel the interior of the old building to make room for the new machinery which will arrive in a few days.

At the present time we have more general repair work and special work than we have ever had at this season of the year and the indications are that it will be necessary to run two shifts of men.

Unsolicited orders for the new rotary pump are coming in every day and at the present time we have on hand orders enough to tax the present capacity of the plant for several weeks. It is the plan to have pumps made in Portland and elsewhere should we find that local plant will not be able to supply the demand, and the present indications are that we cannot hope to fill more than a very small per cent of orders.

STATE EMPLOYMENT BUREAU BILL KILLED

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 17.—Despite the pleas of Representative Oscar Horne and Allen Eaton, the house summarily killed the Eaton bill creating a state employment bureau. The house had wrangled for nearly three hours over the amendments to the same and fishing laws and when the question of state aid for the unemployed came up it was in no amiable mood.

In committee of the whole, the house approved each consecutive section, striking out one which excluded the operation of private agencies at Mr. Eaton's request. When it came to the final section, however, appropriating \$20,000 for the support of

the bureau, Mr. Keilly moved that this also be stricken out.

Mr. Eaton protested that such a procedure would nullify the whole bill and said that if the house is in good faith it should at least adopt the section and then accept or reject the whole bill on the final vote.

The only votes cast in favor of the bill at roll call were: Allen, A. A. Anderson, Barrow, Cardwell, Childs, Collins, Dillard, Eaton, Gill, Irvin, Horne, Lafferty, Legwis, Pierce, Schuebel, Miss Towne, Vawter, Wagner and Weeks.
