PORTLAND WHEAT MARKET QUIET

(Tuesday's Market.)

PORTLAND, Ore.—With no ocean tonnage offering except at ruinous values to grain exporting interests, the market for wheat is a quiet affair.

Efforts to "corner" the oats market have failed. Dealers who tried this recently in the Pacific northwest have found to their dismay that farmers have plenty of oats left and they are feeding a sufficient supply to the market to overfeed the trade.

While no business has been closed recently for foreign account the general trade is not figuring upon its ability to secure vessels below 60 shillings. As high as 65 shillings was paid here a short time ago.

Flour market remains quiet with no change showing in values.

GAVE THEM A CHANCE: THEY PROVED HONEST DENVER, Feb. 15.—Out of 700 boys Judge Ben B. Lindsey, of the juvenile court, has sentenced to reformatories and sent them unaccompanied to the institution where they were to serve out their sentence.

Judge Lindsey celebrated the fourteenth anniversary of his system of putting convicted boys upon their honor only a few days ago. The day was marked by the receipt of word that Robert Gregg, 17, sentenced to the reformatory at Buena Vista had arrived there.

Judge Lindsey sent young Gregg unaccompanied to the institution. Gregg was convicted of contributing to juvenile delinquency by going through a false marriage ceremony with a girl. He was sentenced to serve from one to four years in the reformatory and Warden Capp declares that after delivering himself up the boy proved so earnest and capable that he is certain he will be an ideal prisoner.

Only five per cent of the youths sentenced from Judge Lindsey's court are sent to the reformatories under guard. Aside from the good influence the establishment of the honor system has upon the boys, the judge estimates that he has saved the state \$5,000 in traveling expenses and fees by doing away with the guards who formerly delivered the prisoners to the reformatory wardens.

(Courtesy Tuesday's Journal.) PORTLAND, Ore.—Market for cattle is fully 15 to 25c lower than a week ago. For the average offering of hay fed stuff at North Portland the market is down 25c for steers, with the average sales from \$7 to \$12.25, and a few lots going as high as \$7.35 for some very fair stuff.

Market for grain fed cattle was down about 15c, with split up loads selling no higher than \$7.85, compared with easy sales at \$8 during last week.

There was only a small supply of cattle in over night, four loads coming from Utah. The demand was limited, and the market showed practically no further change.

Radium Easier to Reduce. WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Announcement that the federal bureau of mines had worked out a process of reducing radium by simplified methods was made in the house by Representative Foster of Illinois, who congratulated the country on the discovery.

Members gathered about as Representative Foster displayed a case containing \$11,000 worth of radium produced from ore by the bureau. He headed to the house a letter from Dr. Howard A. Kelley, of Baltimore, saying that the work of the bureau inspired the successful treatment of many conditions in cancer cases.
