The precipitation in Pendleton Wednesday during the all day rain was 34 of an inch, according to the records kept by E. P. Averill, local observer. The rain was of the kind too that all goes into the ground and was of much benefit to the farmer.

Wheat Market Dormant.
There is not sufficient activity in the local wheat market today to justify the buyers in securing prices. They assert there is no wheat being offered for sale. On the basis of Portland prices yesterday the local price for club should be a trifle above \$1.40 per bushel.

New Minister to Be in Pulpit.
Rev. J. E. Snyder, the new minister of the Pendleton Presbyterian church, will preach his first sermon here tomorrow. He will occupy the pulpit both at the morning and evening services. The church has sent out printed invitations to the congregation and friends to attend the services and make the acquaintance of the minister and his family.

Four Fine Fish.
In the window of the La Dow store Friday were exhibit four of the largest trout seen here for a long time. They were caught by Albert Humphrey near Umatilla. The largest was two feet long and the smallest about 18 inches. Spurred by the sight of the catch, W. D. Humphrey and F. E. Welch yesterday got out their poles and went down the river to try their luck.

Local Boys Defeat Union.
After a hard fought game on a foreign floor the local high school basketball team succeeded in defeating the Union squad by the close score of 24 to 22, last night in that city. This was the second game played on the trip. The first one was played Thursday night at La Grande with the high school of that city, resulting in the defeat of the local squad. A third game will be played at La Grande with the M. I. A. team.

Brands Do Not Have to Be Renewed.
Contrary to a story printed yesterday to the effect that all brands must be renewed each year, County Clerk Salling declares the law does not require this. Count Judge Marsh being mistaken in his interpretation of it. A law passed in 1913, he states making it necessary for all brands then registered be renewed within the next year or be cancelled. This was for the purpose of cleaning the records of registrations which had been made twenty years ago. There was no provision, he states, requiring re-registration every year.

Everybody Wears Flags.

Everybody on the street has one in evidence as the result of the active campaign conducted by the ladies of the parent-teachers' association for the benefit of child welfare work. At several public places booths have been maintained while other workers have been circulating about the streets. Few refusals to buy have been met with and the result is that the ladies will have a considerable fund to turn over to the Oregon Congress of Mothers.

Indian Sued for Money.
Simon Whitman, well known Indian, was today made the defendant in a collection suit in which W. M. Peterson is plaintiff. Peterson claims he holds Whitman's note upon which \$220, interest and \$20 attorney fees is due and that he holds another note executed by the defendant to William Barnhart, another Indian, and which has been assigned to him. Upon this note \$150, interest and \$15 attorney fees is due, he alleges. B. L. Ballard, his law partner, is his attorney.

Docket Partially Cleared.
This morning at 9:30 Judge Phelps assembled the various attorneys and called the docket. Some cases were dismissed and settler, motions were made in others, demurrers filed in others and still others were decided. Altogether the docket was cleared up to a considerable length and many cases put at issue. Among the cases disposed of within the past few days are the following: B. L. Ballard vs. James Baldwin and F. A. Bailey, settled and dismissed; Integrity Lodge, No. 92, I. O. O. F., vs. T. F. Howard, default and judgment for plaintiff and order to sell attached property; George Carnes and Owen Carnes vs. Francis M. Smith, findings and decree for plaintiff; E. E. Koontz and Marion Jack, adm. of estate of T. J. Kirs, vs. F. B. Boyd and wife, judgment for \$150, interest and \$100 attorney fees, and order foreclosing mortgage on Athena property.

Wm. Walton Dead.
William T. Walton, 43 years old, a resident of Pendleton, died at a local hospital at 5 o'clock this morning says the Walla Walla Bulletin of yesterday. Mr. Walton was brought to the hospital Tuesday, suffering from an attack of Bright's disease. He came to Freewater on Monday to visit his brother and was seized with the illness which caused his death while there. Mr. Walton is survived by a wife and two children, who are at present visiting in Portland, by his brother at Freewater and a sister, Mrs. D. F. Baker, who lives near Walla Walla. He had resided at Pendleton for several months. The body is resting at the Cookerly Cantonwine parlors, pending the completion of funeral arrangements.
