WALLA WALLA, Wash., Feb. 26.—The pardoning of "Six-Shooter Charles" Carnahan from the Oregon penitentiary, recalls to the mind of Charles Campbell, of Walla Walla, a narrow escape from death at the hands of this one time notorious character.
