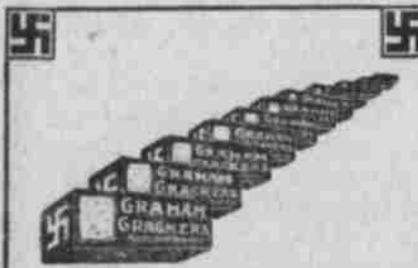

WOMAN WHOSE HUSBAND IS WELL KNOWN HERE TAKES CARBOLIC ACID.

In a moment of mental aberration following a year of illness, Mrs. Rose E. McElroy, wife of Prof. Willis E. McElroy, band leader who is well known in Pendleton, swallowed carbolic acid in Portland Wednesday and died within 20 minutes.

Mrs. McElroy had resided in Portland the past four years. She was born in Marion county in 1869 and passed the most of her life in or near Salem. She was affiliated with the Christian church.

In addition to her husband, Mrs. McElroy leaves her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George W. Johnson, of Salem; three brothers, George W. Johnson, Jr., Clyde E. Johnson and Paul Johnson, all of Salem, and three children, George E. of Chicago, aged 21; Agnes Marie, aged 17, and Earl, aged 10. No funeral arrangements have been made, but interment will be in Salem.

LANDERS HEADS H. S. ATHLETIC CLUB OF STATE

ORGANIZATION RECENTLY PERFECTED—RULES ARE JUST ANNOUNCED.

Supt. J. S. Landers of the Pendleton schools, is secretary-treasurer of the Oregon High School Athletic Association which was recently organized and the rules and regulations of which were announced yesterday by State Superintendent Churchill.

The board of control is composed of C. W. Boetticher, city superintendent, Albany, president; Superintendent Churchill, vice president, and J. S. Landers, city superintendent, Pendleton, secretary-treasurer. Following are the district directors: Columbia river district, Jesse McCord, principal Clatskanie schools; Portland district, H. H. Herdman, Jr., principal Washington high school; eastern Oregon district, J. F. Elton, principal high school, Baker; North Willamette district, George Hug, principal high school, Eugene; South Willamette district, C. R. Bowman, principal high school, Medford, and Coos Bay district, C. A. Howard, superintendent schools, Coquille.

Membership in the association is open to any of the public high schools of the state or to any secondary school not a public high school. Bona fide students under 21 years old of secondary schools enrolled not later than October 15 for the first semester and February 15 for the second semester, and who are under graduates of the school and are playing not more than their fourth season in the class of sport specified, are eligible. Students who have used their athletic skill for gain or who are under discipline in the school, or whose character or conduct is

\$30,000,000 FOR RIVERS AND HARBORS IS PROBABLE

FRIENDS OF THE BILL COUNT ON THIS AMOUNT BEING APPROPRIATED.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—Thirty million dollars for river and harbor improvements is counted on by friends of the river and harbor bill in congress. They believe both houses will agree on that sum to be spent on projects selected by the board of army engineers.

Hindu Mutiny Quelled.

LONDON, Feb. 25.—An official announcement given out by the bureau of information says that a riot at Singapore in the fifth light infantry over promotions, has been quelled. The loss of life in the proceedings was "somewhat serious."

A Tokio dispatch of February 19 gave some details of a mutiny of Hindu soldiers at Singapore, which would appear to be the same disorder as referred to in the foregoing dispatch. The Tokio message said 11 Englishmen and women were killed

in the fighting and some Japanese wounded. Marines were landed from Japanese and French warships to put down the trouble. The mutineers numbered 800 men and half of them were said to have surrendered.

Russia Buys Railroad Material
PITTSBURG, Feb. 25.—Inquiry has been received here by the Pittsburg Foreign Trade Commission from the Russian government for \$2,000,000 worth of railroad material, mostly axles, wheels and tires.
