**WAR ODDITIES.**

ROTTERDAM—All leaves of bread now sent into Belgium from Brahan are now, by order of the German authorities, cut in two, as many instances have occurred in which letters have been smuggled across the frontier by this means.

BERLIN—According to Herr Karl Scheffer, one of the German "apostles of idealism," the war was begun because "the artistic regeneration of Germany is only possible through catastrophe." After the war "German genius will develop impressions which will kill cubism and futurism."

**AMERICA STEAMER DACIA IS SEIZED BY FRENCH WAR VESSEL**

FORMER HAMBURG - AMERICAN LINER IS TOWED INTO BREEST.

Her Capture Will Raise the Question of Import—Claims Is Made That Sale Was Sold to Prevent Ship Being Interned as German—Bought by American.

PARIS, March 1.—The French minister of marine announced early yesterday that the American steamship Dacia was stopped by a French steamer which is escorting her to Brest.

The Dacia, originally a Hamburg American line steamer, was purchased by Edward N. Breitung of Marquette, Mich., and placed under American registry on January 4. She had been engaged in carrying freight cargoes between New Orleans and Galveston and other gulf ports and Bremen.

At the beginning of the war the Dacia was tied up at Port Arthur because of her German ownership and the fact that England assumed control of the seas. After her purchase by Breitung she was sent to Galveston, where she took on a cargo of cotton and after many days sailed for Bremen.

The sale of the Dacia at once loomed big in international affairs. The French government was the first to make informal protests, declaring that the sale was not bona fide, but a plain attempt by her owners to prevent her being interned for the balance of the war, in violation of the declaration of London.

Great Britain later joined France in her reports. Representatives were made to the American state department which, however, took the view that the purchase was bona fide and finally issued government insurance on the Dacia's cargo, though refusing to insure the hull of the steamer.

The German captain and crew left the vessel and she was placed in command of Captain McDonald, an American, with an American crew. She became an American steamer under the provisions of the amendment of August 13 to the Panama canal act.

The French and British governments based their claim on this clause in the declaration of London: "The transfer of any enemy vessel to a neutral flag effected after the outbreak of hostilities is void, unless it is proved that such a capture was not made to avoid the consequences to which such a vessel is exposed."

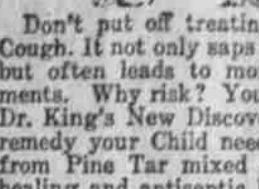
