## NEWS OF FARM AND RANGE

**Fine Shipment of Hogs**—C. E. Rude buyer for Frye & Co. of Seattle this morning shipped 92 head of unusually fine hogs to the sound metropolis. He purchased them from Sparks Bros. and F. A. Michael of Birch Creek.

**Will Not Recess His Land**—Walter Crosswell, who is farming the Temple land, states that he will not recess his fields this spring despite the fact that the cold weather killed about one third of his fall sowing. However, he believes the remaining stand is better than he would get from spring sowing.

**Union Co. Will Not Recess**—Extremely little winter wheat land will have to be recessed, in spite of the unsatisfactory winter weather. In fact it is doubtful if there will be any appreciable amount at all. This is the opinion of wheat growers from various parts of the valley, and in contrast to the situation in Umatilla county, what seeding there is going on now is entirely new fields.—La Grande Observer.

**Inspects Hospital Cattle**—Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, is here to inspect the dairy cattle of the Eastern Oregon State Hospital as required once a year by law. So far he has found all of the cows healthy but has not yet concluded his work.

**450 Acre Wheat Land Sale**—Four hundred and eighty acres of land belonging to N. Delino and lying 12 miles northwest of Pendleton, have been sold to E. T. Wade and by that purchaser to Mrs. Catherine L. Struve. The price named in the deed is \$8000. The land in question consists of the SE 1-4 sec. 22; the SW 1-4 sec. 23 and the NW 1-4 sec. 26, all in tp. 3, range 30. Mr. Delino now lives in Couer d'Alene, Idaho.

### SESSION OF CONGRESS ENDS.

progressive leader, Victor Murdock, and Reps. Hukley, Neely of Kan., A. Mitchell Palmer, Burke of Penn., Burke of S. D., Stevens of Minn., Metz, Henry George Jr., Alney, Bowdler, Goldfogle, Knowland of Cal., Beall of Tex., Bartlett of Ga., Bartholdt, Hobson and Stanley.

### The New Lineup.

The senate had today 53 democrats, 42 republicans and one progressive member. The sixty-fourth congress will see 55 democratic, one progressive and 39 republican senators seated.

The house today had 286 democrats, 124 republicans, 17 progressives and one independent. The next house will have 221 democrats, 194 republicans, 7 progressives, one socialist and one independent.

Some notables who have "come back" and will be in the next house include "Uncle Joe" Cannon, William B. McKinley of Illinois, Ebenezer J. Hill of Conn., Nicholas Longworth of Ohio, and "Cy" Sulloway of New Hampshire.

In addition to the "big" legislation enacted by the congress adjourning sine die today were many important legislative features. Woman suffrage and national prohibition amendments were defeated in the house. The immigration bill, passed by both houses, was vetoed and killed by President Wilson.

"Lobby" investigations by both the senate and house were instituted. Cotton futures and cotton warehouses bills became law, but cotton currency legislation was defeated. The agricultural extension education bill was passed. The parcel post was inaugurated. A bill to regulate harbors appropriation bills were pruned by means of a filibuster. Radium, waterpower, the Alaska coal, and mineral and oil were conservation measures passed by the house. The Philippine independence bill and La Follette's seaman's labor and sea safety measures were also before congress.

Consideration of this government's martial preparedness for war was also a big issue during the closing session of the dying congress.
