Kills Mad Coyote—A story comes from Ukiah to the effect that a mad coyote recently attacked L. C. Mettie, a well known homesteader, and that Mr. Mettie, to protect himself, threw his coat over the animal's head and, thus holding it, stabbed it to death. The rabid coyotes in that vicinity are said to be numerous and considerable stock losses are reported. John Moon is said to have lost three hogs and a cow, the Mosses nine or ten head of cattle, J. W. Sturdivant some hogs and a number of other ranchers hogs and cattle.

\$50,000 Is Left Whitman
WHITMAN COLLEGE, Walla Walla Wash., March 4.—The Whitman College officials were pleasantly surprised when a letter was received by Dorsey Hill, bursar of the college, from the American Surety & Trust Company, of Washington, D. C., stating that \$50,000, which had been left to Whitman College by the will of Homer N. Lockwood, of that city, would be forwarded to the college as soon as the necessary legal arrangements could be made.

Just who Homer N. Lockwood was or why he was so interested in Whitman is a puzzle to the college officials, as no one about the institution seems to know anything about him. It is thought that the money was left in the hands of the American Surety & Trust Company to deliver.

American's Slayings Free.
WELLAND, Ont., March 5.—The bill charging manslaughter against a provincial police officer and three Canadian soldiers who last fall fired on two American duck hunters, Walter Smith and Charles Dorsch, killing Smith and wounding his companion, was dismissed by the Welland county grand jury here.

The shooting which resulted in diplomatic correspondence between the United States and Great Britain, occurred on the Niagara river.

After a protest had been made by Washington the dominion government paid to Smith's relatives \$10,000 and a lesser sum was given to Dorsch.
