Nearly \$35,000 Loaned. The total loans made by the city water department from its sinking fund totaled \$34,421 on March 1, according to Supt. Hayes' monthly report and this means that the commission has loaned out the entire fund except \$16.67. The cash receipts from the sale of water during February were \$1,937 and the total receipts from all sources \$1,965.20. The disbursements, including \$298.59 for the repair of the reservoir and \$629.56 interest to A. S. Bent on the balance due him, amounted to \$1,541.31.

Funeral Delayed; Held This A. M. The funeral of Geary Judson, former Pendletonian who died last week at the Will Evans place near Pilot Rock, was held this morning at 10 o'clock at the Folsom chapel, having been postponed from yesterday because of the inability of the sister and son of the deceased to reach here from Illinois until this morning on the early train. Rev. C. A. Hodshire of the Methodist church conducted the services, the Woodmen of the World assisting. Interment was made in Olney cemetery.

"Til" Gets in Crawfish. Sheriff T. D. Taylor evidently ran afoul of Dean Collins, editor of the Monday Morning Crawfish which the Oregonian runs once a week. Moving to La Grande. Frank Ross, who has been employed by the Pendleton Meat Co. for some time past, is moving his family to La Grande, having accepted a position in that city.

Suffering from Blood Poison. George Strand, well known young farmer of Vanavale, is taking treatment in the city for blood poisoning of the hand. Recently he cut his hand slightly and the wound became infected. While at La Grande last week on a business errand, his hand and arm pained him so severely that he was forced to consult a physician who found that blood-poisoning had developed. He ordered the patient to the hospital where the hand was lanced. Mr. Strand returned to Pendleton yesterday morning and will remain until the doctor permits him to return to his ranch.

Funeral This Afternoon. The funeral of Andrew Hubbard, who took his own life a few days ago at Campbell station, was held this afternoon at 1 o'clock at the Brown chapel. Two daughters of the deceased, Mrs. J. E. Perfo, with whom he had been making his home, and Mrs. Cal Davis of Pomeroy, Wn., were in attendance.

Douglas Phay is Buried. Yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Christian church, funeral services were held over the body of the late Douglas Phay who died at St. Anthony's hospital Saturday morning following a long illness. Many old friends were present. Rev. T. F. Weaver conducted the services while the Woodmen of the World had charge of the graveside rites.

Administrator is Appointed. Fred G. Kamrath was this morning appointed administrator of the estate of the late Herman F. Kamrath, his father. The estate consists of two lots and a dwelling in this city, estimated to be worth \$1200, and notes in the amount of \$2500. Godfred Newman, John Harvey and Fred Marsh have been appointed appraisers of the estate.
