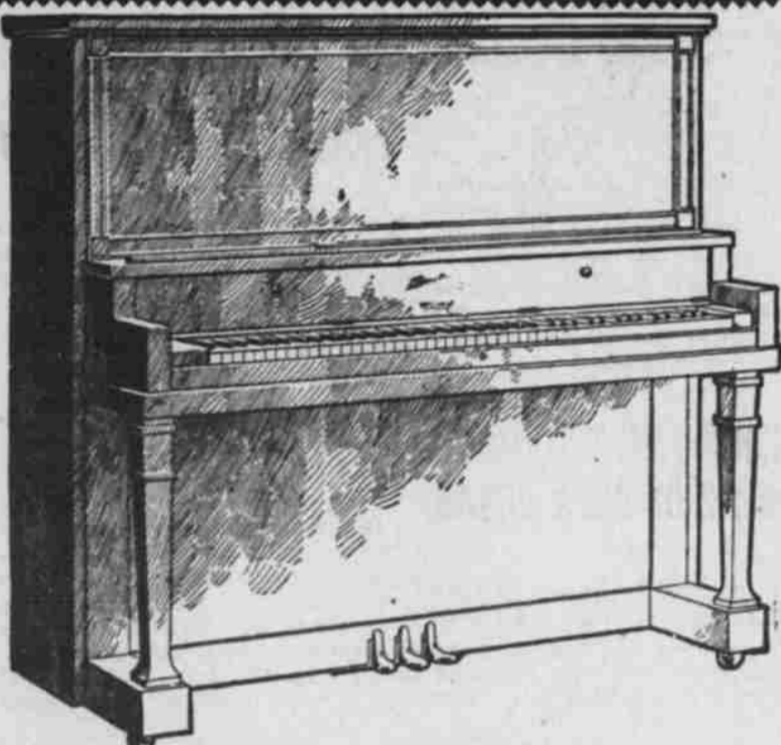

**Quarantine Vice.**  
DETROIT, Mich., March 10.—Quarantine as a weapon against the social vice is an innovation which may be tried out in Detroit. Police and health board officials, who have been co-operating in a plan to check the spread of disease resulting from wide open conditions in the red light sections, are about ready to launch a new campaign, it was hinted today.

The new plan, which is experimental in nature, will be the quarantining of any resort which is reported to the police as a menace.

The quarantine method, it is said, will be employed as a substitute for the old police method, now discarded.

of closing up resorts which failed to comply with the department's regulations providing for registration and medical inspection, or which failed to report inmates suffering from disease.

"Officially," Detroit has had no vice section for the past 18 months, the resorts having been closed by order of Police Commissioner John Gillespie, in October, 1913. It is an open secret, however, that the police have found themselves unable, under present conditions, to cope with the scores of vicious houses that are operating openly in many sections. To meet this new condition, without officially recognizing the failure of his "elimination" order, the commissioner is said to favor a trying out of the quarantine plan.

Under the proposed new method, any resort that is considered a menace, will be quarantined by the health officials, placarded and in other ways treated as though small-pox or some highly contagious disease existed there.

**Town Is Evacuated.**  
EAGLE PASS, Texas, March 10.—Piedras Negras in the state of Coahuila has been evacuated by the Carranzistas. A few troops will be left, however, until the Villistas arrive. Thousands of Mexicans and civilians have sought refuge here.
