MRS. DUDLEY, TWO CHILDREN, AND FATHER



This is "Mrs. J. Dudley," or Miss Lois Waterbury and her two children, Lois, aged two and one-half, and Virginia, aged four years, as well as Virginia Mayo, the wealthy Connecticut manufacturer, their father, whose name has been mentioned in connection with the death of Lillian May Cook, the young Brooklyn girl who was employed in his factory at New Haven.

Mrs. Dudley, who has a beautiful home in a good residence part of Brooklyn, was once a stenographer in Mayo's office. Later he bought her the house in Brooklyn and there he visited at week ends. She has lived there for a long time with her two children.

The police brought her name into the case of Miss Cook when they learned after the disappearance of the latter that she was a maid in the Dudley household before she went to the Mayo factory in New Haven as a file clerk. Miss Cook's body was found at West Rock, near New Haven, after she was missing a week. She had shot herself through the heart, and she also had a bottle of poison.

Life Term Interrupted.
SAN RAFAEL, Cal., March 12.—Alfred Sells, who arrived at San Quentin penitentiary to begin his life sentence for a Los Angeles robbery, served three hours of his term, was close cropped, received a number and prison garb, and left here in charge of Oakland officers to face a charge of murdering Mrs. Elsa Vogel, who was killed with her husband at Fruitvale, Cal., February 11.
Sells was surrendered to the Oakland officers on an order signed at Oakland by Superior Judge Ogden.

STAGNANT TONE FOR CEREALS

(Friday's Market.)
PORTLAND, Ore.—While there is a very liberal demand for wheat from Europe, the trade here is unable to do any business because of the absence of ships. Regular liners are now asking 40 shillings for parcels compared with 30 shillings several months ago, while only a limited amount of space is available at any price.

Noticeable increase in interest in oats is shown from Europe and already some business is passing from California. This naturally has a tendency to stiffen the local situation in sympathy, and for spot the trade here is freely offering \$34 a ton, basis tide-water, track delivery.

There is also a better foreign inquiry for barley, with exporting interests bidding \$28 a ton freely, coast delivery. Were it not for the lack of adequate shipping facilities the business would likely be liberal.

Club and bluestem wheat were each a cent higher for bids on the Portland Merchants Exchange for spot delivery, although a sale of 5000 bushels of prompt club was made at an advance of 20 cents over yesterday's bids. A sale of 5000 bushels of April was made at \$1.41 and 5000 bushels of prompt red Russian at \$1.30.

Oats showed a gain in strength for spot today on the exchange, bids being again at \$34 or an advance of 25¢ over yesterday's. Barley spot bids lost 75¢ a ton for the day on the exchange with no sales.

TERRE HAUTE OFFICIALS GO ON TRIAL TODAY

INDIANAPOLIS, March 8.—One hundred and fifteen Terre Haute politicians were to be arraigned today for trial in the federal court on charges of gross election fraud. Ruling of the court a few weeks ago upheld the indictments.

Of the 115 indicted, 83 have pleaded guilty and five not guilty. Mayor Don M. Roberts and Judge Eli Redman of the Vigo circuit court, and Sheriff Dennis Shea are among the most prominent who will fight the case. With them are most of the Terre Haute official family.

MUTTON BEING HELD BACK

(From Friday's Journal.)

PORTLAND, Ore.—Famine stricken, the local mutton trade is eagerly scouring the entire region west of the Rocky mountains for supplies. Since the small run of Monday but four head have appeared in the North Portland yards. Even the temptation of higher prices for mutton and lambs have proved unalluring to the sheep interests.

Sheep men generally are disposed to hold their mutton until shearing time because of the extreme prices likely for fleece. While there are quite fair supplies in the country, practically none are available for the market at the moment.

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NEW YORK, March 10.—Mrs. Hetty Green, reputed to be the richest woman in the world, is living in one little room just off the butler's pantry of a brown stone house in 52d street, near Madison avenue. A single cot and a straight backed chair and an old fashioned bureau comprise the principal furnishings in the room. Heat is furnished by a small oil stove.

It had been rumored Mrs. Green was ill. "How am I?" she asked. "Why I never felt better. I've outlived four executors and six doctors who gave me less than a year to live. Sound sleep, good food and a clear conscience will keep anyone well. I never had time to eat lobsters and look at women in pink tights with Wall street brokers; so I've some thing to show for my life."

SHARP UPTURN COMES IN WHEAT

(Friday's Market.)

CHICAGO.—Sharp upturn followed the announcement today of liberal export inquiry and short coverings in the wheat market. Options closed 2 3-4¢ up for May, 1 5-8¢ for July and 1 1-8¢ for September. Market opened with a rise of 1-2 to 1 1-8¢.

With the exception of in September option the opening price was the low mark for the session. There was gradual improvement until the high mark was reached. After this the trade became erratic but the price suffered a fractional loss with profit taking.

Employer Asks Benefits.

ROSEBURG, Ore., March 3.—Claiming that he is entitled to benefits under the workmen's compensation act, although he is the owner and operator of the mill in which he was injured, J. B. Lang of Dillard, has appealed from the decision of the state accident commission to the circuit court of Douglas county.

Mr. Lang was injured recently while at work in his mill, near Dillard. He filed his claim with the state accident commission. The accident commission held that Mr. Lang, as an employer, was not entitled to benefits under the workmen's compensation act, which provides for payments only to employees. Mr. Lang alleges that the state accepted his premium and as a result he is entitled to recover as insurance a sum compatible with the premiums for the injuries he received.
