Newsy Notes of Pendleton

Buys New Cadillac.

R. W. Rittner, county representative, has just purchased a new eight cylinder Cadillac automobile from the City Auto Co.

Deserted; Wants Divorce.

Alleging that his wife, Elizabeth, deserted him on March 6, 1914, and has since lived apart from him, Karl Ulbricht through his attorneys, Scott and Butler of Milton, has commenced suit for divorce.

Federal Court to Meet Here.

The annual spring term for eastern Oregon of the United States district court will convene in this city on the morning of Tuesday, April 6 and it is expected to continue several days. Judge Bean has asked Judge Phelps for the use of the court room for three or four days. What cases are on the docket has not been learned here.

Sends for County Pictures.

Wallace R. Struble, secretary of the general committee arranging for the celebration of the opening of the Cello canal, has requested the Commercial association for pictures typical of Umatilla county which may be used in the celebration literature. Secretary Cranston is forwarding one of a combined harvester and another of a pile of 100,000 sacks of grain at Mission.

Woman Sues for Commission.

Alleging that she was commissioned by T. A. Lieualen, prominent farmer to sell 80 acres of farm land for him and was promised \$600 if she would produce a buyer who would pay \$9600, Lillie Miller has filed suit for the \$600, alleging that she produced such a buyer in Scott Banister, who paid the \$9600. H. I. Watts is attorney for the plaintiff.

Want New Pendleton Description.

A new and up-to-date description of Pendleton, its location, climate, industries, principal buildings and other notable characteristics is wanted by Dodd, Mead & Co., who are getting together material for a New International Encyclopedia. A proof of the description at hand was sent to Secretary Cranston of the Commercial association, asking him for corrections, and he will furnish the new copy.

Will of Mrs. Watts Filed.

The will of the late Mrs. Lizzie Watts of Athena was admitted to probate today upon the petition of Maryville L. Watts, who is named executor and administrator. By the terms of the will she leaves \$1000 to her granddaughter, Vernita Watts, \$50 to her sister, Martha Van Winkle, the house and lots where she lived to her daughter-in-law, Jennie Gaines Watts, providing she does not sell it for 15 years, and the remainder and residue of her estate to her two sons, Marville L. and Homer I. Watts. The petition states that the administrator will be called upon to handle about \$8000.

It's Some Car Now.

One of the queerest looking automobiles seen on Pendleton streets for a long time made its appearance yesterday with Henry Rosenberg at the helm. Once it was a beautiful Franklin six but its beauty was marred in a fire while its owner was racing it up Yellowjacket grade. Everything burned that was burnable, but the engine, wheels and chassis were still intact. Rosenberg took the remains, bolted a couple of two-by-fours on the chassis, adjusted a bug seat, improvised a tank which supplied gasoline through a rubber tube and he had a car for use on his ranch. Stripped as it was and its six cylinders exposed, it presented a curious sight.

New Creamery to Open Monday.

Pendleton's new creamery will open for business Monday morning, according to an announcement made today by R. C. Rasmussen, the manager. The machinery has already been installed and everything put in readiness to manufacture butter and ice cream and handle milk and cream. Mr. Rasmussen announces that he will pasteurize all of the milk, cream and butter he uses. He has employed Horace Berg of Salt Lake, an expert butter and ice cream maker, to superintend the plant and he will devote his time to the management. The new creamery, which will be known as the Pendleton Creamery, will have a capacity of 1200 pounds of butter a day.

Dyestuff Problem Acute.

That the textile industry is feeling the shortage of dyestuffs due to the war is indicated by advices received by the Pendleton Woolen Mills from

eastern sources. All dyestuffs are imported from Germany and the Germans appear to be taking the position they will not allow dyestuffs exported to America unless this country insists upon being allowed to ship certain goods to Germany. The matter is up to the state department for consideration. According to C. M. Bishop, manager of the local mill, the plant here is not suffering from the shortage as it was possible for them to secure a considerable supply at the outset of the war.

Sad news for the horsethief and safecracker is contained in the brief announcement today that Sheriff T. D. Taylor has purchased himself a Buick automobile for use in the pursuit of his duties.

Joe Hayes in the Tolls.

Joe Hayes, well known Indian who has a penchant for trouble, was arrested by the police today at the instance of Supt. Swartzlander and he will be charged in the federal courts with introducing liquor upon the reservation.

Portland Auto Distributor in City.

F. W. Vogler, northwest distributor of Reo cars, who is now in the city, returned recently from the factory. In a talk with Mr. Olds, the builder, he anticipated one of the biggest years in the history of the Reo factory. In anticipation of this they built last season three additional wings to their factory, and are now turning out over 100 Reo cars per day. We have had shipped into the northwest territory over 60 carloads of Reos, or nearly 250 cars. We have contracted to deliver in the northwest 800 Reos for the 1915 season.
