Another Small Rain.

Another small rain yesterday evening followed a wind storm of short duration. The precipitation amounted to .03 of an inch.

Suit to Collect.

Robert R. Chapman today filed suit against J. N. Wills to collect \$324 and interest and \$110 attorney fees alleged to be due on two promissory notes executed in the early part of 1914. S. D. Peterson of Milton is plaintiff's attorney.

Mortgage Was Insufficient.

Alleging that the sale of the barley upon which a mortgage was held failed to bring sufficient money to cancel the obligation and defray the costs, the Farmers' Bank of Weston has commenced suit against Malcolm Stevens for a balance of \$307.71, plus \$50 attorney fees. Defendant owed plaintiff \$950 principal and \$34.84 interest, according to the complaint, when the mortgage was

foreclosed. The foreclosure proceedings cost \$224.09 and the proceeds of the sheriff's sale amounted only to \$901.22. Fee and Fee are attorneys for the plaintiff.
